Savings for local family soar with solar energy

Interlake business helping customers reduce their hydro bill to nil

A new Interlake business has clients walking on sunshine by installing solar panel systems that reduce their hydro bill to nil.

Darryl Langrell and Chris Walsh launched Sun Rise Solar Inc. about five months ago with a focus on installing solar panel systems throughout the Interlake. They bring to the business a combined 40 years of trades experience, since Langrell has worked as a mechanical contractor for 20 years and Walsh has worked as an electrician for 20 years.

For Langrell, the interest in the industry began with his wife Renee, who wanted to offset their power bill with solar. He started investigating and calling around for quotes, but he wasn't impressed with the results of his research.

While sitting at a Jets game with Walsh, who owns Walsh Electrical Services out of Warren, the pair of tradesmen lit up at the idea of starting their own solar company.

The Interlake is an ideal location for solar installations since it falls along the sunniest strip in Canada.

"We're in this little loop that runs roughly between Kenora and Regina that has been the sunniest part of Canada on average for the last 100 years," Langrell said."Manitoba is actually a great place for solar."

He speaks from experience, since they recently wrapped up a solar panel installation and hydro grid tie-in at his home located about three miles east of Woodlands. It's only been up and running for a little over a week, and he is already noticing the benefits. On a new meter installed by Manitoba Hydro, his property has produced more energy than it has used in the past week — even with all

the recent cloud cover.

Even after the installation of the solar panels, Langrell's property remains connected to hydro. Whenever his solar panel system amasses more energy than he uses at his property, that solar energy is redirected back into the grid — and Langrell gets credit for it on his hydro bill.

"I'm actually trading hydro. There are no batteries and no storage because it's tied back into the grid," he said.

"During the summer when I'm in low usage and high production, I'm feeding back into the hydro grid. In the winter, you don't have the same amount of daylight but the panels get more efficient as the temperature drops."

In general, solar installations cost between \$3 and \$4 a watt, or \$3,000 to \$4,000 per kilowatt, Langrell

explained. Manitoba Hydro currently provides rebates through its Power Smart Solar Energy Program for grid tie-in systems after they are installed, inspected and approved. The solar panels could be either mounted to a roof or to the ground, depending on the property.

"They're giving rebates on systems beginning at two kilowatts all the way up to 200 kilowatts. Their numbers are based on your past two years of usage, so my usage was at 22,500 kilowatt hours," Langrell said.

"In order to build a system that would ef-

fectively get me to net zero, I would have had to have built a system that was roughly 17.5 kilowatts. I ended up building a 15-kilowatt system because the biggest single inverter that they build is for 15 kilowatts."

For anyone who might be interested in solar energy, Langrell encourages them to act now since the Manitoba Hydro rebate could potentially end or change.

"As far as rebates go, there are tax incentives to building new systems as well, so they are a write off. You can save money in a couple different directions," he said. "We had to put out a fair bit of money to build the system, but as the hydro rate goes up, so does our return and it pays itself off faster."

Next up, Sun Rise Solar Inc. will be installing another system north of Balmoral. The company also specializes in finding ways to maximize energy efficiencies within homes and businesses.

"We're trying to reduce people's energy consumption," Langrell said. "We can go in and show them how to effectively bring down their energy consumption before they build a big solar system so that maybe they can build a smaller system. We want to help people to find ways to be more efficient."

On Oct. 1 from 12 to 3 p.m., the Stonewall Veterinary Hospital is hosting a fundraising walk through Quarry Park while also raising awareness about animal health.

Stacey Klippenstein, hospital administrator for Stonewall Veterinary Hospital, encourages everyone to get involved in the event.

"We would like it if people want to dress up their dog for Halloween. Kids can get dressed up too - and even the adults, if they're brave enough," she said with a laugh.

"And for the dogs that are participating, we will send them home with a little gift bag. I'm hoping that it will be a fun, relaxing afternoon for everybody."

Prizes will be awarded to winners of a costume contest, and face painting will also be available to add to the fun.

The event coincides with Animal Health Week, which is being recognized across Canada from Oct. 1 to

7. This year's theme, chosen by the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association, emphasizes the importance of animal welfare by safeguarding the five animal freedoms: providing proper nutrition, ensuring proper socialization, providing adequate shelter, providing appropriate veterinary care and allowing animals to exhibit normal behaviour.

The fundraising dog walk also acts as a lead-up to National Veterinary Technician Week, which runs from Oct. 15 to 21.

The Oct. 1 event will also provide an opportunity for the veterinary team to meet with the community outside of a clinical setting. At the same time, other pet-related businesses will also be on hand to provide information and freebies to participants.

In addition, doggie demos will add to the excitement of the day. The S.M.A.R.T. team will showcase their pet training and handling skills through flyball demonstrations. As well, a drug dog will attend to demonstrate crime-fighting abilities.

Helicopter dumps golf balls on Teulon



Welcome, sport and commercial fishers.

Last Thursday I was sitting on the anglers' walkway along the water break wall of the Gimli pier taking in the harbour's serenity. The air was motionless and warm under heavy clouds. Voices of workers echoed across the marina as they craned a sailboat from the water onto its trailer.

An old Massey yard tractor then putted along, pulling it up to a storage lot and I felt a sadness that the summer marine season was ending. The odd fisher quietly glided out of the bay in grey skiffs to do their afternoon lift. I turned to the guys behind me fishing off the wall and asked the one nearest me if he had a story for his fellow anglers. He turned his ruggedly featured face to one side in thought, shifted his husky body against the water break wall and then in a surprisingly articulate voice said, "I was at this spot last week and caught a master walleye. As I was bringing it up the wall, the line snapped and I lost it. That loss bothered me all week so I bought a huge net with long extensions. Fishing here yesterday, a lady beside me caught a master walleye and I used my extra long net to land it for her. It wasn't my fish but it felt good knowing next time I'd be ready."

His name was Calvin Barbour, and as we chatted, a tall, thin chap with white face stubble slowly rolled up on his bike. The biker was a local man, Murray Vann, who spends much of his time fishing off the wall. He joined our conversation with

a story that happened on the pier a few weeks ago. He had caught a good-sized pickerel but, like Calvin, didn't have a long enough net so he had to walk back along the pier to the shoreline holding his rod high so his line would clear the wall. When he got off the pier at shore, two boys waded into the water and got his fish for him.

Last Friday, I had an itch to see the anglers at McArthur Falls on the Winnipeg River again.

There, by himself, was Kirk Paquette from Winnipeg sitting in a folding chair surrounded by the beautiful rock outcroppings so typical of this area. He was a wiry guy with long, dark hair, goatee, rim glasses and a deep voice. He recalled how, not long ago, his love of fishing found him in his boat, much to his wife's displeasure, fishing here on a stormy, rainy afternoon. He got a strike, and with wet, cold, slippery hands on a soggy rod handle, he began hauling up and reeling down. His catch tugged his line in spasms and then would become a dead weight as he hauled in. In time, a three-foot sturgeon lazily showed its white belly to the sky right beside the boat and then sank out of sight.

Kirk let some line out but soon realized the fish was swimming around the boat and the anchor rope. Oh heck, he thought as he began lifting the anchor rope, now totally tangled with fish line. Kirk could only guess the sturgeon was off somewhere in the water resting quietly. It took time, but eventually Kirk got things untangled. As he raised the lazy sturgeon to release it, he swore the fish looked at him as if to say,"I've been very patient. Can I go now?"

On Tuesday last, I witnessed a most charming thing that renewed my faith in how a couple in love can care for each other. I had pulled up beside a husband and wife fishing on the Selkirk pier and, staying in Old Red, I lowered the window to ask how the fishing was going.

Drivers urged to slow down for snakes

A local biologist is hoping that drivers will be on guard for garter snakes crossing Interlake roads and highways.

Maureen Forster, a biologist with her own environmental consulting firm, lives just west of Teulon. She often drives along Road 6 East and Highway 7 during her commute to Winnipeg.

Lately, she has noticed an abundance of dead garter snakes along Road 6 East, particularly between roads 89N and 90N. One day, she counted 44 dead snakes on the gravel road and about the same amount on the highway.

"Every year there are a few snakes here and there, but this year it was like carnage," she said.

"I don't know if people even notice them half the time. They just zoom down the road and don't know what it is. But there are so many snakes, and if you're watching, you can see them moving."

Since the snakes are mainly clustered along a one-kilometre strip, Forster believes they must be headed to nearby hibernacula, or winter denning sites.

A spokesperson from Manitoba Sustainable Development said that it's likely the Gunton quarry hibernacula, which is a good site for snakes since it has limited traffic. Currently, people need to walk into the area, although some local ATV traffic also occurs.

"The Interlake region is home to many significant red-sided garter snake hibernacula sites and these sites are attractive to the snakes be-

cause they allow access to the limestone crevices and caverns below the frost line enabling them to survive our harsh winters," said the provincial spokesperson in an email.

"While some snakes cross roads while travelling to and from this quarry, there is also surrounding habitat areas without roads that helps ensure the local population persists. Currently red-sided and other similar snake species are widespread, abundant and secure in Manitoba."

At this time of year, the snakes often bask on the roads to keep warm since roads soak up heat. As a result, these snakes are vulnerable to vehicle traffic.

"People can help by driving slower in areas when and where they encounter snakes," said the provincial spokesperson, "while ensuring they are driving safely."

Drivers should be especially vigilant during the early hours when they might encounter snakes on their morning commute. NatureNorth.com indicates that garter snakes usually bask along trails or roads in the early to mid-morning, especially during the fall and spring months when the mornings are chilly.

For Forster, she hopes that people will heed the advice and slow down for the snakes. She also suggests that signs could be put up to draw attention to the snake crossings, which will be busy again in the spring when snakes emerge from their underground winter dens.

"I think a lot of people don't really care too much about snakes, but

they're part of the ecology. They're important in the area for tourism too," she said.

"Most people aren't going to slow down or try to avoid them, but I do. I slow down in the evening for the frogs too. Maybe we should all just be going slower."

In an effort to raise awareness about the issue, Forster reached out to Rockwood Environmental Action Community Taskforce (REACT) Inc.

"Maureen advised us of the concern, and we had our executive meeting a terwards. We discussed the situation and we definitely felt that the best approach would be education through the media to let people know what was out there," said Karl Daher of RE-ACT.

"There could be people that are just unaware of what's going on. They could be driving and see something on the road but not know what it is. We felt that awareness was the best way to approach the situation. It's good to get the information out."

Stonewall council news in brief

Representatives from the Red River Basin Commission spoke to Stonewall council on Sept. 20 to provide information about the group, which they hope the town will join.

The International Red River Basin Commission launched in 1909 with input from Manitoba, Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota, since the basin spans all of these areas.

Then the Red River Basin Commission formed more than 30 years ago to provide a grassroots approach to water management and water conservation stewardship to people on both sides of the border. The organization is partially funded by the provincial government as well as by dozens of member municipalities that include the RMs of Rockwood, Rosser and Woodlands.

The group hopes that the Town of Stonewall will also join forces with them. The cost of involvement is calculated on a per-capita basis, and Stonewall's cost would be approximately \$1,135 per year.

"We are believers in partnerships because success doesn't come from one — it comes from all," said Manitoba director Steve Strang.

Manitoba is divided into two areas, the North Chapter and the South Chapter, and they each operate as individual entities.

The organization works with governments on both sides of the border to protect water throughout the basin. They also provide outreach and education on water-related issues, and they collaborate with scientists and engineers to find best practices and solutions to drought and floods.

Locally, they are hoping to collect LIDAR data for the Red River Basin in Manitoba. This technique uses laser instruments mounted on aircraft to take accurate elevation measurements, which are useful for planning related to drainage, water movement and infrastructure.

They also discussed topics such as dredging the Red River at the mouth to Lake Winnipeg and Netley Marsh restoration.

Their goal is to have 20 per cent water retention and 45 per cent nutrient reduction in phosphorus entering Lake Winnipeg.

The public is invited to join the Red River Basin Commission's North Chapter at the Netley-Libau March for Marsh Day on Thursday, Oct. 12, with a rain date of Oct. 13. A marsh specialist will take attendees on a guided boat tour that will last approximately 2.5 hours (life jackets will be provided). Several time slots are available but space is limited. To register, email info@redriverbasincommission.org and indicate which time slot is preferred (morning, afternoon, early evening or any time). Admission is free and light refreshments will be provided.

• Stonewall council gave first reading to a procedural bylaw.

• Council granted a variance request made by Doug and Joanne McIntyre. At a recent council meeting, they asked for permission to the minimum rear yard setback for their 18-foot-round above-ground pool. The allowable setback is five feet, and they requested a setback of two feet, 10 inches.

A neighbour had expressed concerns, especially since the pool has already been installed. Council decided to have the public works department look into the matter. Hotdogs, drinks and chips will be available for purchase, with all proceeds going towards helping animals that need veterinary medical care. Sometimes stray kittens get dropped off at the clinic in need of a home, and the clinic does everything it can to help.

"We do try our best to rescue and find homes for some of the kittens that are brought in by the town. If we're able to and if the kittens are of a good nature and adoptable, we will get them tested to make sure they don't have any communicable diseases, vaccinate them and have them spayed or neutered. Then they're boarded here and socialized until they get adopted. We can't do it all the time and we don't like to do it for very long periods because it's very stressful in here with the dogs," Klippenstein said, adding that they work with rescue groups if there are large dogs that need homes.

"We have an adoption fee to help cover the costs of the kittens being in here. We do have some kittens in the clinic right now. If they don't get adopted before the event, we will have some pictures to show."

Funds from the sale of snacks will go towards a dedicated in-house fund to

help cover costs for vaccinations, deworming, and testing for feline leukemia virus and feline immunodeficiency virus — which all help stray kittens to find homes.

Evening thundershowers did little to dampen the spirits of participants at the second annual Relay for Life in Stonewall. Community members celebrated those who have won the battle, honoured those who are still fighting and remembered those who have since passed away.

Strong winds and rain forced a number of registered participants to stay away, but those who braved the elements continued the fight in support of the Canadian Cancer Society, raising over \$25,000. The funding is used by the non-profit organization for cancer treatments, ongoing research and patient care.

Alycia Gareau shared the story of her own family's battle with cancer and how research saved her young daughter's life. At just six years old, Gareau's daughter Natalie Smith was diagnosed with Acute Myeloid Leukemia (AML).

"Childhood cancer is very rare and to have a child diagnosed with AML is extremely rare. The doctors told us Natalie was just one of two children diagnosed with AML within all of Manitoba that year. It was like she had won a lottery, just one that was horrible," explained Gareau.

"Thanks to ongoing research on this cancer, they can determine from a simple blood test what the best treatment choice is for a patient with AML. You can tell from this blood test if someone would respond better to chemo treatments or a bone marrow transplant."

Natalie's blood test revealed she would respond better to bone marrow. Fortunately, her older brother Zachary was a perfect match, and on March 7, 2016, she received one litre

of bone marrow from him. Just three months later, in June, doctors diagnosed Natalie as cancer-free.

With that life-saving research, Natalie has been in remission for one year and three months. She and her mom joined other local cancer survivors for the first lap around the track led by the Khartum Pipes and Drums band. Following their lap, the survivors released their balloons together, featuring the number of years they have been in remission.

Trevor King's band Broke n' Busted played throughout the night to help keep participants motivated as they walked and ran the SCI track lap after lap.

At 8 p.m. a luminary ceremony was held to remember and honour those who have been affected by cancer. The entire track was lit up, signifying the important work that is being done for cancer research.

With thundershowers continuing into the evening, the event wrapped up early but organizers reminded participants just how important their fundraising efforts were and the impact the funding will have for years to come.

"We are walking because we want to make a difference in the fight against cancer. Last year across Canada, there was 432 Relay for Lifes held and they raised over \$28 million for the Canadian Cancer Society," said Sharon Mulder, who is the Canadian Cancer Society Interlake Rep.

"Communities are coming together to raise awareness. They are being strong and celebrating life, cancer survivors and the continued fight against cancer."





Manitoba's new red tape measure

The Manitoba government took another major step towards being a North American leader in cutting red tape when it announced its baseline count. The count is the most comprehensive in Canada including government rules found in legislation, regulations, policies, forms, and guidelines. According to Finance Minister Cameron Friesen, Manitoba's baseline count includes 906,824 regulatory requirements.

"Red tape is a huge hidden tax on everyone. It increases prices, reduces job opportunities and stresses people out. Manitoba deserves high praise for making that hidden tax more visible today. It's a very promising step towards making things better, not just for those who directly get tangled up in red tape but all Manitobans who suffer as a result," said Laura Jones CFIB's executive vice-president and chief strategic officer.

Last spring, the government became the first province in Canada to legislate a cap on the number of government rules. Bill 22 mandates that for every new regulatory requirement created, two existing requirements with double the administrative burden of the new requirement must be removed (two-for-one rule) until March 31, 2021. After March 31, 2021, it will be replaced by a "one-for-one" rule. "To date, British Columbia has been Canada's undisputed leader in red tape reduction, but Manitoba has announced a more comprehensive measure and has beat B.C. in being the first province to legislate a cap. If things continue this way, it will be the Manitoba model that everyone is talking about," said Jones.

"The government still has a lot of work to do in actually cutting red tape, but they have all the right ingredients," said Jonathan Alward, CFIB's director of provincial affairs for Manitoba.

CFIB estimates the annual costs of all regulations on businesses in Canada to be \$37 billion annually, with onethird of that (\$11 billion) considered unnecessary red tape. In Manitoba, all federal, provincial and municipal regulations cost businesses \$1.2 billion annually, \$360 million of which is considered red tape.

"Seven out of 10 business owners in Manitoba say red tape is limiting their ability to create jobs. The government's focus on this couldn't be more timely or more important," concluded Alward.

CFIB's ninth annual Red Tape Awareness Week[™] will take place between Jan. 22 and 26, 2018, and will challenge governments to reduce the hidden tax of red tape for the good of all Canadians.


