It's never too early or too late to make your mark in the realm of the arts.

After a lifetime of dabbling in fine arts, Marion McMahon will have her paintings on display for her first public show as Teulon library's artist of the month for January.

Starting from when she was a young girl, McMahon always exhibited exception skills in art.

"I had that natural gift and natural ability to draw, right from when I was a little kid," she said. "Over the years, it fell by the wayside. I got married and had a son and I never had time for that sort of thing. I did a little bit of watercolours at one time, but I'm not even sure where they are now."

But about three years ago, McMahon rekindled her interest in the arts by taking a daytime painting class with Julie Lamoureux of Winnipeg.

"I started painting and I found that very interesting, so I got some small canvases. I started practising and I took more of her classes," McMahon said.

"Then Margaret Bezan used to teach here in Teulon on a Saturday, so I took some of her classes. I just practised and practised and practised. I got into Julie's techniques and then I learned Margaret's techniques."

Since then, McMahon has honed her skills and developed her own style for oil painting.

"I like realism. I do scenery, and I'm attempting to do some animals and some birds and flowers," said McMahon, who lives west of Teulon.

"It's sort of my escape from the world. When I'm doing it, two hours can pass and I don't even realize I've been sitting there for two hours. I just enjoy doing it and try to do it the best I can and try not to make any mistakes I can't correct."


Although she's a little nervous about having her first public show, she has already taken the plunge by sharing her paintings at a recent workshop. In October, best-selling author Daphne Shepherd hosted a two-day workshop based on inspiring insights from her book *Path to Abundance: It's Your Time.* At the event, held at the Heritage Arts Centre, another participant encouraged Baldwin to bring in a painting to show the group.

"I couldn't just pick one, so I picked six smaller 8-by-10s that aren't framed. I took them in for the group to see," she said. "They were the ones that really got excited about this and said that I should be

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Teulon-Rockwood Fire Department looking at new fire hall

Plans are heating up for a project to build a new fire hall.

At the Dec. 14 meeting, Rockwood council heard from Chris Dawson, fire chief of the Teulon-Rockwood Fire Department about the plans.

The initial architectural estimate rang in at about \$400,000 to \$500,000 for a renovation of the existing hall. However, later assessments jumped to \$800,000 to \$1.2 million. For that cost, the fire department felt that they would be able to build a new building rather than renovate the older facility.

A property in Teulon became available on the existing rail property between Vidir Machine and Crescent Creek. The building is set back from Highway 415 by about 300 feet. It would require the closing of Main Street South from the Crescent Creek access to Highway 415.

They began working on a site plan proposal, which they discussed with council. The goal timeline would be to be open by 2019.

At the same meeting, council also heard from father-son duo Jake and Joel Maendel, who were looking to take a mobile home off their property and put up a permanent ready-tomove home. The current trailer doesn't meet conditions originally set out by the RM, but the family would like to keep it there while they build the new home. They need to correct the problems in order to proceed.

Council put in place a \$20,000 performance bond, which will be returned after the all the conditions are met.

Seasons greetings, everyone! This is our time of year when we share love in all its ways as well as helping others in need. It reveals the best in us. The stories that have been given to us this week are fine examples of that.

Jim Zagozewski told me of an experience he had about this time years ago when he and friends were ice fishing off Sandy Bar by Riverton. Five guys on three sleds came by their ice shack lost, asking for directions to make landfall because it was starting to blow.

Jim showed them what direction to go using his GPS. The group climbed back on their sleds and disappeared into the growing storm. Looking out the window once back in his shack, Jim soon realized they were in a white-out situation. He couldn't see 10 feet away. His gang loaded their gear into their bombardier and were about to head for shore and home when out of the vial of blinding snow, the men on the sleds reappeared.

They had become totally lost and had gone around in a gigantic circle. Worse, some of them were not dressed for a storm on the ice of Lake Winnipeg. One was wearing running shoes.

Jim's bombardier was packed to the roof, but they made room for the chap in running shoes whose feet were badly frozen. Then away they went in a convoy, Jim in his bombardier leading using his GPS with the sledders following. The bombardier bounced viciously over ice crack pileups that couldn't be seen in the

storm.

Soon the early darkness of the winter night covered them. The small lights of the bombardier seemed frail against the wind-driven blizzard, but Jim faithfully drove according to his GPS. Then abruptly through the swirling maze, the shore popped up right in front of them. Tensions eased as everyone busied themselves loading the sleds onto trailers.

Lastly the chap with the frozen feet had to be carried to his friend's truck for a trip to the hospital. Jim, you and your friends did just fine. We're proud of you!

A few days ago, I was on the ice of the Red River, which is about a foot thick now, by Sugar Island downstream of Selkirk. I walked from one portable ice shack to the next, passing the time with our fellow anglers.

It seemed everyone couldn't get over how many pickerel they were catching!

Later, out on the flat snow pack, I saw two men putting their gear into a toboggan, obviously quitting for the day, so I trudged over to them and asked how they had made out.

These very pleasant fellows, John Klassen and his son Kyle from Oak Bluff, quickly held up some of their catch, which I took a picture of. I then asked if they had a fishing story for us. After thinking for a moment, they remembered an unusual happening.

Last summer, they were boat fishing on the Winnipeg River. There was another boat maybe a halfdozen boat lengths away from them.

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Rosser council news in brief

The Municipal Board rejected the RM of Rosser's bylaw application to authorize borrowing and spending money to build wastewater collection and water distribution systems to service 520 acres of developed land.

The proposed project included feeder mains from the Cartier Regional Water Cooperative and a low-presser sewer connection to the City of Winnipeg wastewater line.

The RM of Rosser wanted to borrow \$16,360,070 of the total estimated cost of \$22,560,070.

The Municipal Board received objections, and public hearings were held from Aug. 3 to Aug. 5 at the Grosse Isle Community Hall.

The proposed bylaw identified 117 properties in the local improvement area that would benefit from the proposed project because they would receive urban standard sewer and water service. It required the owners of those properties to pay for the proposed project as potential taxpayers.

However, the Municipal Board noted that it became clear as the hearing progressed that "Rosser's main impetus in proceeding with the proposed project was to fulfill its servicing responsibilities in the Rosser CentrePort area, in keeping with CentrePort's vision."

Rosser acknowledged that the benefitting properties don't need the project, and if it weren't for CentrePort, no part of the municipality would be serviced. Engineers recommended that the urban standard sewer and water servicing for the Rosser CentrePort area start in the Local Improvement Area, and the RM heeded the advice.

"The Board understands that although this may be a logical starting point to service the Rosser CentrePort area, it questions how Rosser, Centre-Port partners or the Board of Directors could conclude that the benefit of the Proposed Project was solely for 117 Benefitting Properties and should be paid by 85 potential taxpayers," the ruling reads.

The board provided its opinion that the proposed project is necessary and expedient to move forward with the development of the Rosser Centre-Port area. From that perspective, the board supported the proposed bylaw. However, the Municipal Board end-

ed up rejecting the application due to other concerns.

"The Board does not support Rosser's decision to limit the benefit of the Proposed Project to the Local Improvement Area and the payment of the debenture to the Benefitting Properties," the ruling reads. "In the Board's opinion, the benefit of the Proposed Project, within Rosser, is much broader."

The board suggested a blended taxation approach that recognizes that the project would benefit the entire municipality.

"The Board encourages CentrePort as well as the Province to take an active role in assisting Rosser to develop and analyse more equitable debt servicing options that better reflect the beneficiaries of the project, both direct and indirect," the ruling reads.

Before ordering any changes to the bylaw, the RM of Rosser needs to give notice to potential taxpayers who would be affected.

Then the Municipal Board will reconvene the hearing at a future date to give all parties a chance to speak.


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Apparently those anglers had enough fishing and started pulling in their lines. The driver started the motor and gunned it. What he hadn't remembered was that the anchor was still out.

Stonewall students' experiment set to soar

A group of Stonewall students is over the moon about being chosen to have their spaceflight experiment launched into space.

At an assembly at Ecole Stonewall Centennial School on Dec. 19, Grade 8 students Carter Ives, Graeme Perrie and Adam Stamler discovered that they are the winning team in the Student Spaceflight Experiment Program. All three students are in the extracurricular Space Club organized by science teacher Maria Nickel.

In total, Stonewall Centennial students submitted 57 experiment proposals, which were judged at a local level, then by a panel of judges in Winnipeg, followed by a panel at the Smithsonian Erin Space Museum in Washington, D.C.

The winning project is an extension of the classroom-based Tomatosphere program operated in Canada by Let's Talk Science for the past 15 years. Through this program, students investigate the effects of outer space on seed germination. Classrooms receive two sets of tomato seeds, with one set that has been exposed to space-like conditions and the other set that is an

untreated control set. Students plant the seeds and record germination information.

The winning team's project re-exposes these Tomatosphere seeds to space conditions. The seeds will be flying to the International Space Station on the upcoming Mission 11 that is tentatively set to launch on June 2, 2017, from the Kennedy Space Center in Florida.

This flight will mark the first time that the Tomatosphere seeds will receive a second exposure to a space environ-

Grade 7. They had grown seeds that were on the International Space Station and had the same type of exposure - cosmic radiation and the conditions of microgravity in space. Then those seeds were brought back down. The kids grew them, but we asked Tomatosphere if they had an extra package," Nickel said.

"They said yes and the kids came up with the idea of resending them and trying to grow them again, even though they will have been exposed for a second time. They want to know if the seeds are going to be damaged. If so, we need to find a way to protect them because of the re-exposure to the harsh conditions of space."

The partners who oversee the Tomatosphere project include the Canadian Space Agency, Heinz Seed, Let's Talk Science, Stokes Seeds and the University of Guelph.

Stonewall is one of two communities

in Canada to be involved in Mission 11 of the Student Spaceflights Experiments Program. The local project will be the first junior high experiment in the province to be part of the program and to be on board the International Space Station.

In addition, about 200 Grade 5 and 6 students from Stonewall Centennial participated in a competition to design and illustrate a mission patch to be sent to the International Space Station. French immersion Grade 6 student Wallace Galaspie submitted the winning design.


"I put a rocket to show that we can use science to learn more about our solar system, and I put the Earth to represent where we live and who we are. I put the Stonewall quarries to represent our awesome town," Wallace wrote in his submission.

"I put rings around the Earth to encompass the Earth with our school name to represent that we can do anything when we put our mind to it. I also put stars in the background to represent that we only understand approximately four per cent of the cosmos."

As part of the celebrations, students at the assembly enjoyed a Skype presentation by Mike Dixon, creator of Tomatosphere and professor that the University of Guelph. As well, they heard from Brian Ewenson, a top aerospace expert in Canada and with NASA's space programs.

The students were overflowing with excitement, as was Nickel herself.

"I'm pretty overwhelmed and really proud that it was a group of kids from my Space Club. A lot of hard work and a lot of hours were put into that, and some of that came to fruition," Nickel said. "My kids from the club put in extra time and they got rewarded for it, and that made me feel really, really proud as an educator."



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

A Christmas miracle for Syrian refugee family

Business owners band together for ultimate family present

Being forced from your home country and told your new home will be in a province where temperatures are well below freezing six months of the year is not an easy thing, but for many Syrian refugees who now call Manitoba home, that is reality.

When Stonewall resident Kurtis Bouskill heard of a way that one Winnipegger was trying to help a Syrian refugee family make their transition to life in Manitoba a bit easier, he jumped on board to lend his expertise and time.

Bouskill, the owner of two Miracle Dent Repair auto body shops in Winnipeg, heard that his neighbouring mechanic shop, Silver Auto on Portage Avenue, had been donated a 2007 Honda Civic. Although the car was in rough shape, the car's owner hoped that Dustin Jackson of Silver Auto would be able to donate his time for repairs and then donate it to a refugee family.

After Jackson and his staff conducted substantial mechanical repairs and were able to get the car up to Manitoba Public Insurance's safety standards, there was still many cosmetic repairs needed.

The entire passenger side of the car was dented and pushed in, along with minor dents and scratches along the rest of the body. Bouskill brought the car into his shop to fix the exterior.

"It was definitely a collaboration. We saw the car while Dustin was working on it and we offered our services knowing the back story and how one Dustin's friend donated it. There were some pretty significant dents down the passenger side. We did the work and afterwards it looked brand new," said Bouskill, who added it took him and his staff and afternoon to complete the job.

With the car repairs finished and looking new, Jackson and the car's initial owner are working with refugee organizations in the city to find a suitable family that the car can be donated to, hopefully just in time for Christmas.

"It is nice to be able to lend a hand this time of year for sure," added Bouskill.

Province releases flood forecast outlook for 2017

According to the province, a single major weather storm, similar to the one that occurred in the summer of 2014, could cause major flooding in Manitoba.

The 2016 Fall Conditions Report released last week didn't bring the good news that many Interlake residents were hoping. Instead, talk of major flooding and watersheds being closely monitored were big talking points in the 34-page report. Manitoba Infrastructure

Minister Blaine Pedersen said that it is still very early in the timeline of flood forecasting and that a number of factors are at play when looking ahead. The report notes that higher than average precipitation through the summer and into the fall caused lake levels to rise. The report states that Lake Manitoba is expected to remain near 812.4 to 812.5 feet throughout the winter and that Lake St. Martin is expected to reach near 803 feet before the spring runoff.

The conditions outlined in this report indicate there is a chance of moderate to major flooding in some locations in Manitoba. "As spring approaches, the province will further assess the flood potential and work with our municipalities to prepare as required," said Pedersen.

Lake Manitoba is still below the flood stage level of 814 feet, but the report said that a quick spring melt or one major winter storm could mean major flooding. The report also mentions that the accuracy of this information at this stage is ambiguous.

"It is not very practical or feasible to provide a long-term flood forecast for spring 2017 as conditions could change significantly during the coming months," said the report.

The unfortunate part for Manitobans is that Saskatchewan saw"above normal to well above normal" soil moisture conditions and high base flow conditions. Much of that water makes its way down the Assiniboine River and is diverted through the Portage Diversion into Lake Manitoba.

Curiously, there was not a single mention of the Portage Diversion in the entire report.

"Overestimating or underestimating the flood potential four months in advance of the spring runoff is very risky. The hydrologic forecast centre will continue to monitor the basin conditions closely and will release spring flood outlooks through the winter as required," said the report.

The first flood outlook is expected to be available in February with the final flood outlook released in March. Anyone interested reading the 2016 Fall Conditions Report can do so by visiting www.gov.mb.ca/flooding.

RCMP remind anglers to stay safe out on the ice

Ice fishing and snowmobiling season has officially arrived across the Tri-S area, but local RCMP officers want to remind residents how they can stay safe when they venture out onto the ice.

"There is no fish in the world that is worth risking your life for," Selkirk RCMP Const. Jim Dao said.

Dao knows that rows of ice fishing shacks will soon begin popping up on the Red River near Selkirk and on other Manitoba waterways.

He said anyone that goes out on the ice should first know what the ice conditions are and never head out on the ice blindly.

"Check with a local tackle shop for ice thickness suitability and find out if it is safe for human traffic or for vehicles to drive on," he said. "Keep in mind that fast-moving water underneath may change ice conditions without notice."

Dao added there are ways that those who go out on the ice can distribute their weight.

"Use a sled to carry your gear instead of backpacks so that the weight is spread across the ice and does not weigh you down if you happen to go through the ice," he said. "Stay away from open water and areas of ice jams as this would mean that the integrity of the ice may have been compromised."

Dao also cautioned that residents should never head out on the ice alone.

"Try not to go fishing alone," he said. "There's a greater chance of being able to summon for help in an emergency if there is more than one of you."

Dao knows that colder temperatures also means vehicles, including trucks

and snowmobiles, will start heading out onto the ice.

Dao said those in vehicles or on snowmobiles should always know what kind of ice they are about to head out on and should first consider walking to their destination beforehand if possible.

"Driving vehicles onto the ice greatly increases the risk factor due to its weight. Try walking across instead to your ice fishing spot," he said.

The snoman.mb.ca website states that ice should be a minimum of six inches thick for it to be safe for snowmobiles to head out.

RCMP officers in Manitoba have been forced to deal with a number of incidents involving snowmobiles this month, including one that ended in tragedy.

On. Dec. 1, a 51-year-old teacher from Nelson House went missing and was later found dead when his snowmobile went through ice near Nelson House. On Dec. 10, Treherne RCMP rescued two men that had got lost snowmobiling on trails in Spruce Woods Provincial Park.

RCMP said the men were located after being lost for more than six hours in -35C temperatures, but they survived "because they were prepared."

Both men were dressed for the weather and were able to start a fire, RCMP said.

Last week, RCMP released tips on what snowmobilers who ride on waterways and on trails in Manitoba can do to stay safe.

RCMP tips for Manitoba snowmobilers:

Don't ride alone.

• Be prepared: carry spare fuel, survival gear and ensure you are dressed for the weather conditions.

• When travelling in areas you are unfamiliar with, always make sure to carry a charged cell phone and GPS when you can.

Travel on marked trails when in areas you have never travelled before.

• Always advise someone of what route you plan to take and when you plan to return.

• The law requires that you always wear an approved helmet.

• Snowmobiles are not to be operated on roadways, shoulders or sidewalks unless circumstances fall under other provisions laid out in the Off Road Vehicles Act.

• To cross a roadway on a snowmobile, a driver must have a valid driver's licence.

• Like any other mode of transportation, only operate a snowmobile when sober and alert.

Anyone under the age of 14 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian who is a minimum of 18 years old.

• Young persons over the age of 14 can ride without parent accompaniment, but cannot cross a roadway until they obtain a valid driver's licence.

Before coming to Canada, the family spent 11 years living in a refugee camp in Sudan.

The family now lives in a house in Selkirk which has been filled with donations from community members who have warmly welcomed them to the city.

Last Friday evening the family was busy decorating a small Christmas tree with donated lights and ornaments from Selkirk Walmart.

"We're excited," Yaya Ramadan said with a smile about celebrating Christmas.

The family also experienced their first major snowfall earlier this month.

Yaya said they're finding the weather to be "very cold."

"I don't really like the snow but this is the first time," he said.

Some of the family members have also taken up a part-time job this winter shovelling snow.

"I like it. It's good. It's fun, "Yaya said. "We want to work more."

The family is still working on their English and have been taking lessons in Winnipeg since September.

Wilma Nicol, a volunteer with the RRCRT, said the family will be heading to her house for Christmas celebrations on Christmas Day.

Another volunteer will host the fam-

ily on Boxing Day and then the Selkirk United Church is hosting a special celebration for them on Jan. 1.

Since all of the family members don't officially have birth dates, they will celebrate their first birthdays in Canada on the same day.

Nicol said they are making sure they will have birthday presents to open.

She added the amount of donations the family has received from the com-

munity has been overwhelming.

"If we didn't have things donated, we'd have to buy them," she said."Everything that's given is something we don't have to buy."

She added although warm winter clothing has been donated to the family, they don't always wear it because they aren't used to the cold.

"So they have to learn about that a little bit still," Nicol said with a smile. Nicol said the team also plans to bring another refugee family to Selkirk sometime next year.

Change to foreign worker program excellent news: KAP

The federal government yesterday rescinded the "four-in, four-out" rule of the Temporary Foreign Worker Program that was put into effect in 2011.

Under the rule, foreign workers, who are a vital part of the workforce in the agriculture industry, could only work four years in Canada before having to leave the country for four years. Farmers invested heavily in the training of these workers, only to lose them. "This has created not only a major labour shortage in the agriculture industry, but it has also resulted in a huge skills gap," said Dan Mazier, president of Keystone Agricultural Producers.

Mazier pointed out that foreign workers take the jobs Canadians aren't able to fill; not many people are located in the rural areas where these jobs are.

"There is a limited to non-existent

labour pool in rural areas," he said.

KAP raised this issue with Employment Minister MaryAnn Mihychuk, as did other farm organizations and the Canadian Agricultural Human Resources Council.

"We are pleased that she listened and acted," said Mazier. "This will help many farm operations in Manitoba, but especially the beekeepers who were hit hardest by this rule."

Mazier also noted that a request

was made to help eligible temporary workers to become Canadian citizens. This would allow them to contribute to rural society and help stabilize shrinking rural communities.

"I thank Immigration Minister John McCallum and Minister Mihychuk for listening to us on this one, too," Mazier said. "They have indicated they will be exploring ways to do this." PTH #7, Teulon

that clearly connect his adopted son to the line of the great king David. Matthew indicates that Joseph was not the physical father of the Christ child; but, this genealogy immediately fulfills dozens of Hebrew prophecies about the Messiah. Joseph is again the focal character in Matthew 1:20-23. In a dream an angel tells Joseph of the overshadowing of Mary, by the Holy Spirit, and Joseph is commanded to name the Child"Jesus". Paternal naming of a son is again in complete compliance with Jewish traditions; but, what a name! Jesus is a direct connection to the Jehovah of the Old Testament." Jehovah saves" and "Jehovah has become my salvation" are just two of the transliterations of this powerful name.

It's not just about our need of a Saviour; it's also about His desire to be with us.



The Stonewall Jets won a hockey game on Sunday but still did not make up any ground in the MMJHL standings.







Herb-Roasted Garnet Sweet Potatoes



3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil 1 teaspoon fresh thyme leaves, minced

1 teaspoon minced fresh sage

1 teaspoon minced fresh oregano 3 medium garnet sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into 1Ú4-inch dice

Meatball and Vegetable Stew

8 oz (227 g) ground extra lean veal 8 oz (227 g) ground extra lean beef or pork

1/3 cup (75 mL) dry bread crumbs 1/3 cup (75 mL) salsa

2 tbsp (25 mL) chopped fresh parsley 1 tsp (5 mL) Worcestershire sauce

2 1/2 cups (625 mL) sodium reduced beef broth

1 pkg (227 g) mushrooms, sliced

1 small onion, chopped

- 1 cup (250 mL) baby carrots
- 1/2 cup (125 mL) chopped celery

2 cloves garlic, minced 3 tbsp (45 mL) cornstarch

- 3 tbsp (45 mL) water

2 cups (500 mL) chopped cabbage 1 can (796 mL/28 oz) diced tomatoes 3/4 cup (175 mL) long grain brown rice 1 cup (250 mL) sodium-reduced vegetable or beef broth

In large skillet with lid, heat canola oil over medium. Sauté onions and garlic about 5 minutes.

Add ground beef. Brown about 5 minutes over medium-high heat. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Add cabbage, tomatoes, rice and broth and stir well. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat to low simmer, cover and cook for 30 minutes or until rice is tender. If preferred instead, after bringing mixture to a boil, bake in oven-proof skillet with lid in 180 °C (350 °F) oven for about 40 minutes.

Kosher salt

1. Preheat the oven to 375 F. Spray a large roasting pan with nonstick cooking spray. In a large bowl, thoroughly combine the olive oil and herbs. Add the sweet potato dice to the mixture, and use your fingers to coat them well. Season with salt to taste. 2. Transfer the mixture to the prepared roasting pan. Bake for 45 to 60 minutes,

until your desired consistency is reached, whether you want them a bit firm or fork-tender.

Edible Tip: A good alternate variety to Garnets are Red Jewels, which are easy to come by at both farmersÕ markets and local grocers. Look for a deep, bright color, and be sure to cook them fairly quickly after purchase. Unlike potatoes, sweet potatoes do not store very well.

Hot pepper sauce (optional) Directions

In a large bowl, combine veal, beef, breadcrumbs, salsa, parsley and Worcestershire. Roll mixture into 1 inch (2.5 cm) meatballs and place on parchment paper lined baking sheet. Bake in 180° C (350° F) oven for about 15 minutes or until no longer pink inside.

Meanwhile, in soup pot, combine broth, mushrooms, onion, carrots, celery and garlic; cover and bring to a boil over medium heat. Uncover and simmer for 5 minutes. Add meatballs and stir to combine. Whisk together cornstarch and water; stirring into broth. Cook for about 2 minutes or until slightly thickened.

Tip: Make the meatballs ahead and freeze for up to 2 weeks for a quick addition for your weekly meal routine.

Stop Worrying!

Stress seems to be a fact of modern life. If we analyze stress, a large proportion of it is created by worry. Worry that we will be late, will not get finished on time, will not do well. Add to this the worry we have about others: will they be safe, happy, make good choices. Then there is the worry about the world: the wars, the economy, global warming, and pandemics.

It is no wonder we are stressed! The reality is, however, that most of the things we worry about will not come to pass. Most of our worries are based on "what if?" thinking. We imagine negative outcomes, and then fret about how we will survive them.

Generally all is okay in the present moment, but we do not notice that because we are too busy thinking about the future. How many present moments, days even, slip out of our grasp because of our negative

imaginings?

A real worrier can even steal peaceful moments from right under the nose of another by obsessing about possibilities, and somehow expecting the other to make it all better. No matter what reassurances are offered, the worrier is unlikely to be satisfied. Further, a parent who is a worrier can create the worry habit in his or her children.

I could get worried about all these worriers. There is a better plan. Worrying is only useful if we see a potential problem and take action to avoid it. If we worry about a small child getting into things, we put safety latches on doors and cupboards. If we worry about someone stealing our car, then we lock it. If we worry that finances are running low, we cut back on spending. We deal with it, and stop worrying.

The insidious kind of worrying has no useful purpose and accomplishes nothing, other than making us upset and robbing us of the joy of the present moment. We need to train ourselves to STOP! when we find ourselves worrying about things over which we have no control. It is hard to break the worry habit, but the freedom and peace that are gained make it well worth the effort.

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
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
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Here's How It Works:
