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Local family shares cautionary tale about Lyme disease

A Marquette family cautions others in the area to be vigilant about ticks after their young daughter contracted Lyme disease.

It all started in September when Krysta and Keith Prevost noticed their four-year-old daughter Leighton started getting large red rashes and complaining about sore legs.

"For about an eight-day stretch, she had these rashes all over her body. They were red rings with a clear centre and her knees hurt so bad that she could barely walk," Krysta said.

"We took her to three doctors and they all diagnosed it as a virus that just had to run its course."

However, over the next month or so, she continued to experience on-and-off pain in her knees, along with flare-ups of the rash.

"She also pulled or pinched a nerve in her neck and jarred her hip, which both lasted for about five days of being in pain. We took her back to the doctor and explained what has been going on and she agreed that it wasn't normal," Krysta said.

"She then ordered blood tests, and that's when it was discovered that she had inflammation in her body. She was referred to a rheumatologist at the Children's Hospital and another set of blood tests were ordered, including the Lyme disease test."

At the end of January, the Lyme disease test came back positive.

"Now she is on a heavy dose of antibiotics for four weeks and is expected to be symptom-free afterwards," Krysta told the Express in mid-Februarv.

"Since starting the antibiotics, she hasn't had any symptoms of the disease."

Although they don't know for certain where Leighton contracted Lyme disease, the Prevosts think a tick likely bit her in September in the Marquette area where they live.

"We don't recall taking one off of her, but she could have scratched or taken it off herself. Some Google searching on the symptoms she was experiencing was what convinced us it may be Lyme disease. We also have an influx of deer ticks in our area in the fall, with dogs that carry

them in," Krysta said.

"I think that because she didn't have the classic bull'seye rash that people associate Lyme disease, it wasn't seen as a possibility that it could be it. She was referred to numerous doctors before they figured out what it was."

Krysta suggests that everyone become familiar with symptoms of Lyme disease, such as expanding rashes, headache, fatigue, chills, fever, muscle aches, joint pain, stiff neck or swollen lymph nodes.

"If you check off multiple symptoms on the list, ask to be tested for it," she said.

"If you live in an area with a high tick population, let your doctor know that whatever may be going on with you or your kids could be Lyme disease."

Now that Leighton is being treated for Lyme disease, she is on the road to recovery.

"She's doing great, back to her typical four-year-old self," Krysta said.

"She is on antibiotics for four weeks and has been symptom-free since starting it."

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

Red River Co-op's annual equity cheques are in the mail

Red River Co-op is pleased to announce a \$38.1-million equity return to its members for the 2022 fiscal year.

The Red River Co-op's board of directors approved an allocation to its membership of:

• 6.24% on fuel purchases or 10 cents per litre,

• 2% on food purchased, and

• 4% on the full price of pharmacy prescriptions purchased.

The local co-operative has over 319,000 members and are sending out cheques totalling more than \$34.1 million in cash to its membership in Winnipeg and surrounding communities. The remainder of equity earned stays in members' equity accounts with Red River Co-op.

"The 2022 operating year for Red

River Co-op was very positive. As a result, the board and management are pleased to reward our loyal members with this significant allocation for supporting us this past year," said Doug Wiebe, CEO of Red River Coop. "Red River Co-op is a different kind of business, and this year's equity return and the sharing of our profits with our members is just another way we differentiate ourselves from the competition."

It's been another year of growth for the co-operative with the acquisition of thirteen Husky gas bars in Winnipeg and northwestern Ontario, which will begin their conversion to the Coop brand this spring. Red River Coop opened their much-anticipated Lagimodiere gas bar in September and the revitalization project at their Selkirk gas bar was completed with their first multi-bay wand wash facility. Their energy division also introduced four electric vehicle charging stations in the Winnipeg area. In the food division, Red River Co-op is currently completing the modernization project at their Selkirk food store. This includes the introduction of a brandnew pharmacy for the community.

Giving back to communities is another pillar that makes Red River Co-op a different kind of business. In 2022, Red River Co-op contributed \$1,640,218 in cash and in-kind donations to the communities they operate in. Primary care in the community

Primary care providers are available throughout the region to help meet the health-care needs of community members closer to home.

Primary care providers are generally the entry point into the healthcare system and include physicians and nurse practitioners, said Connie Nixon, director of primary care health services for Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority.

"They provide preventative care, teach healthy lifestyle choices, identify and treat medical conditions, and refer to other health-care providers and specialists when needed," she said.

"Primary care teams in our region may include clinicians such as primary care and chronic disease nurses, dietitians and mental health workers to assist in providing comprehensive health care."

Primary care providers conduct physical exams including regular screening and provide patients with immunizations, prescriptions and renewals as needed. They provide care for most common illnesses and injuries, such as cold and flu symptoms, stomach aches, mild or chronic headaches, chronic back pain, and minor cuts and burns.

"Data shows that half, if not more, of our emergency department visits are for things that are non-urgent and could be seen in a primary care setting," Nixon added.

"By setting up an appointment with your primary care provider, it can help the emergency department focus on those patients that are seeking life-sustaining care. It also can help to save a lot of your time waiting."

Anyone who has a medical emergency that can't wait should call 911 or visit their closest emergency room. Examples of situations that require a visit to the emergency department include sudden or new chest pain, numbness, loss of vision, slurring of speech or an object in the eye or ear. Other emergency situations include loss of consciousness, severe injury, severe back pain, pregnancy complications or suicidal thoughts.

"Since your primary care provider



knows the most about your history," Nixon said, "it is of benefit to use them for this continuous ongoing care so that they can help you navigate your health needs and make decisions with you that best work for you since each client is individual."

Manitoba hospitalizations for COVID remained fairly elevated in mid-February, according to the provincial government's respiratory surveillance report for Feb. 12-18 (reporting Week 7).

There were 44 new hospitalizations for COVID with two people requiring intervention in the intensive care unit, according to differences in severe outcomes between weeks 6 and 7. There were 61 new hospitalizations with eight ICU admissions reported the previous week.

Four people died from COVID in Week 7, compared to the 17 deaths reported the week before.

Manitoba's COVID death toll was 2,456 as of Feb. 11, according to the federal government's COVID webpage, and Canada's death toll now stands at 51,061.

There were 94 new COVID cases detected by PCR testing in Week 7, a slight decrease from the 108 reported the previous week.

Provincial COVID data are an undercount of the true number of cases as the government restricts PCR testing and rapid antigen tests aren't tracked. The provincial government also no longer provides in its surveillance reports the names of personal care homes and hospitals experiencing COVID outbreaks. Wastewater surveillance data for Winnipeg and Brandon up to Feb. 14 once again showed sustained activity of the virus.

The Week 7 report shows one new case of influenza A and one new case of influenza B. There were no new hospitalizations and deaths reported.

New respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) cases continue to hold strong. There were 61 new RSV cases reported in Week 7, down 3 cases from the 64 reported the previous week. The week before that saw 75 cases.

- Canada's National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI) released recommendations in January in response to requests from provinces and territories for additional guidance on COVID vaccine booster doses in 2023.

NACI recommends COVID vaccinations continue with a bivalent omicron-containing mRNA vaccine for people aged five years old and older. COVID is expected to continue to evolve and is showing no evidence of a

seasonal pattern, whereby it increases in the fall and winter and drops off in spring and summer. The virus continues to infect and kill people in all four seasons.

NACI says COVID hospitalizations, ICU admissions and deaths "continue to occur at a higher baseline frequency since the appearance of Omicron in late 2021 compared to the pre-Omicron period," and with more immune-evasive sublineages increasing. As far as the duration of vaccine protection, there is a decline against infection but some lasting protection against severe disease. However, the duration of protection conferred by new vaccine formulations against new COVID variants is still unknown.

"Thus far, vaccine protection has been shown to wane over time, with protection against severe outcomes persisting longer than protection against symptomatic disease. For BA.1 and BA.2 sublineages of Omicron, the duration of protection against severe disease such as hospitalization has remained high, with most estimates above 70% out to 26 weeks following receipt of an original (non-bivalent) COVID-19 vaccine booster dose," states NACI's report. "Duration of protection against severe disease for more recent variants and new vaccine formulations is not known at this time and continues to be monitored."

- The Manitoba Conservative government announced on Feb. 22 the release of a seniors' strategy titled "Manitoba, A Great Place to Age: Provincial Seniors Strategy," which contains initiatives to support seniors at home and in the community.

"Our government's plan is based on the vision that older Manitobans are valued and empowered to live healthy and productive lives in our communities, making Manitoba an ideal place to age," said seniors and long-term care minister Scott Johnston in a Feb. 22 news release. "This new seniors strategy maps out a plan to support older Manitobans through filling gaps in services, making it easier to navigate services and supports, finding affordable options, supporting unpaid caregivers, and reducing ageism and ableism."

Among the initiatives announced are funding for a selfand family-managed care program, whereby people can arrange their own home care service, the provision of \$1.3 million in 2023-2024 for palliative care starting in the Southern health region, and the provision of \$200,000 in 2023-2024 for the Rainbow Resource Centre to serve seniors 55 years and older who identify as 2SLGBTQ+.

The opposition NDP's health critic Uzoma Asagwara said the PC government's track record on seniors includes the disposal of affordable housing for seniors, privatized home care services and the loss of long-term beds.

"The PCs promised a strategy for seniors years ago, and in that time they have sold off affordable housing for seniors, cut and privatized home care services, transferred seniors hundreds of miles away from their families for hospital care and actually cut long-term care beds," said Asagwara in a statement. "They have also refused to create an independent Seniors' Advocate, which we believe is critical to giving seniors the dignity and respect they deserve."

Asagwara went on to say that as of August 2022, there were 193 fewer personal care home beds in Manitoba; former premier Brian Pallister had promised in 2016 to build 1,200 new PCH beds. The PCs also raised fees for seniors living in personal care homes by up to \$1,600 a year.

In addition, the PCs showed little recognition of COVID's ability to kill seniors in personal care homes.

"A former PC Health Minister said deaths of seniors in personal care homes during the pandemic was 'unavoidable' and he 'questioned the motives' of health care professionals who spoke up," said Asagwara in their statement.

Survey gathers input on Stonewall cemetery plans

Plans are in the works for the future expansion of Stonewall's cemetery, and residents can provide their feedback on two potential options.

An online survey is open until Friday, March 3 to allow residents to share input about the cemetery's future growth.

Brett Chatfield, parks and arena manager, explained the reasons behind the project.


"As time goes on here at the cemetery, we keep adding rows and adding columbariums. We figured we should come up with a better vision to make the cemetery more functional and look better. With a plan, we'll have a good idea of what we have left for the future," he said.

"The columbariums are the biggest consideration because they are so popular. We want to have a design that looks good and functions well too. With these plans, we'll be able to phase it in."

The town is working with HTFC Planning & Design, which had representatives on hand to answer questions during an open house event last week.


They've come up with two preliminary options to help guide the cemetery's future growth while respecting also history and changing burial trends.

The first option reinforces the historic layout of the Stonewall cemetery. Special features would include a gathering plaza, a contemplative public space with additional columbariums, a community garden, and a storage and maintenance yard. In addition, an Indigenous memorial grove would allow for ceremonies and sacred fires near an area with unmarked graves.



The second option would simplify vehicle movement throughout the cemetery while maximizing the number of burial plots by combining public gathering spaces into a centralized area.

This design also features a gathering plaza, a contemplative columbaria area, an Indigenous memorial grove, and a storage and maintenance yard. In ad-

dition, this option includes a parking lot that would accommodate 18 vehicles, plus a grand entrance off Patterson Drive.

ISD to present 2023-24 budget virtually

The Interlake School Division is hosting an online public meeting on Wednesday, March 8 to share the 2023-24 draft budget. The proposed budget was presented balanced with projected expenditures and revenue being \$41,705,000 at the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees on Feb. 27.

Student enrolment currently sits at 3,002 students and there is a projected 2,923 student enrolment for the 2023-24 school year. For 2022-23 the pupil-teacher ratio, which is the number of students divided by the number of classroom teachers in each building, is 18.85 for K-Grade 8 and 18.62 for Grade 9 to 12. The projected ratio for 2023-2024 is 19.09 for K-Grade 8 and 19.04 for Grade 9 to 12.

In 2022-23, Interlake School Division had 228.6 professional staff members (which includes teachers, administrators, program support and clinicians) and it is estimated there will be 223 in 2023-24. Highlights of the balanced draft budget include maintaining an average classroom pupil-teacher ratio below 20; retaining current clinical services, including addictions counselling services and access to an off-campus high school (TIP); maintaining current child/ youth support worker and educational assistant supports; purchasing two new school buses; and partially restoring funds for capital maintenance projects.

The Interlake School Division operates 13 public schools, eight colony schools and two divisional buildings.

Questions and feedback on the 2023-24 draft budget are welcome and encouraged during the virtual public meeting.

Judges Anthony O'Neill and Martin Quinn travelled to Stonewall last summer for the competition, which focuses on categories of tidiness, environmental action, heritage conservation, urban forestry, landscape and floral displays. The two judges remain available as consultants.

In 2022, volunteers completed projects in Memory Garden, Centennial Park and Memorial Park. The organization also welcomed six new committee members and completed a plant inventory for the three main gardens.

Looking ahead to this summer, work will continue in Stonewall's three main gardens, with several other projects in the works.

"We will be working on some of the recommendations from the judges this year. We are entering in as a non-evaluated community with CIB National," Johannesson told the *Tribune*.

"We are also always looking for new volunteers and will be having our first meeting in April, with the date still to be decided."

Every year the Communities in Bloom Committee chooses a colour scheme for the town and encourages residents and businesses to plant flowers that include these colours. For 2023, the colour is purple.

Stonewall Heritage Committee

On behalf of the Stonewall Heritage Committee, Allan Webb and Cheryl Willis discussed their 2023 plans with council.

Willis spoke about an ongoing project to gather historical information about local businesses from newspapers. Initially, the project focused on Main Street merchants, but many businesses moved locations or operated in other parts of town. In 2023, she plans to continue writing the histories of local businesses, as well as their families, successors and more.

She has also been using old newspapers to update the birth, marriage and death database.

Committee member Allison Mankewich continues to lead an oral history project.

In 2022, they interviewed four residents and former residents. They stopped the interviews in May when the volunteer videographer became busy with work commitments.

As well, they applied for and receive a \$2,762.50 heritage grant that will help cover the costs of incurred by the videographer. However, more funds are needed to complete the project.

The videographer continues to work on the completed interviews and will resume filming new interviews in 2023. The plan is to complete eight more interviews this year to meet the requirements of the heritage grant.

Catherine Precourt has been working on the Stonewall Remembers project.

Last year's exhibit told the stories of 102 local men who lost their lives during the First World War. More than 90 local students participated in the program, which included a visit to the Stonewall cemetery on Nov. 10.

The Book of Remembrance is updated as information becomes available. Since Precourt will retire this year, the committee will determine the best way to move forward.

The committee also continues to focus on community engagement. Efforts include attending community events, operating a booth at Quarry Days, implementing workshops for the 55 Plus Centre, liaising with local schools, answering questions from the public, and posting updates to the group's Facebook page.

In 2022, the committee completed a long-standing project by installing a bench with a plaque at the Stonewall cemetery. They also continue to work

on the database of cemetery plots.

Looking ahead, they hope to work with the town to install row markers and a map at the cemetery.

Another initiative is the heritage tree program, which will provide trees to commemorate structures, people or events that are important to Stonewall's heritage. In 2023, they hope to develop the program's criteria, promote it to the public and distribute two or three trees.

In addition, the Stonewall Heritage Committee will continue to support the Save the Kilns initiative.

Stonewall Youth Drop-in

Chris Harwood, senior ministry director for Youth for Christ Winnipeg, spoke to council about the Stonewall Youth Drop-In.

In 2022, the drop-in welcomed dozens of youth each week. In the summer, they offered three day camps that provided fun and affordable programming for more than 30 youth.

"We taught skills like baking and fishing, connected these young people with caring adults, and have continued mentoring relationships in many cases," Harwood said.

In 2023, the organization plans to continue offering programs for young people in Stonewall and Rockwood. Programs will include after-school drop-in (ages 10 to 13), evening drop-in (ages 12 to 17), summer drop-in (ages 10 to 15) and other special events.

"Our intention is to also expand the number and kinds of day camps we offer in the summer," Harwood said.

"We will also continue to engage the community with opportunities for learning and training. This fall, we hosted a suicide awareness seminar called safeTALK to help equip the community to become 'suicide safer.' The program is world-renowned, effective and provided by YFC at our cost. Discussions are already taking place regarding community groups who would most benefit from another offering of this course."

In addition, Harwood said they'll continue to provide opportunities for community members and other groups to use their space.

As part of their 2023 financial plan, they hope to engage donors as partners while also increasing the team of volunteers and staff members.

"The funds we have applied for will be allocated first to meet our program expenses, prioritizing summer programs," Harwood told council.

"Any remaining funds will be allocated to operating expenses and to giving the drop-in facilities some upgrades. These funds will help ensure that our drop-in and its offerings are always financially accessible to young people."

Interlake Community Foundation

Board chair Bob Beck from Interlake Community Foundation highlighted for council what the organization brings to Stonewall and beyond.

"Our granting in 2021 was over \$397,000. This included \$60,000 that we flowed through in donations under the fund for gender equality, which is a big amount that we can bring into our communities," Beck told the *Tribune*.

"In 2022, our granting was over \$367,000."

The Town of Stonewall has its own fund within the foundation, and the grants from that specific fund totalled more than \$5,000 last year, he added.

"The money stays there and just keeps growing, and

"There are a lot of projects that we've helped out with in our communities."

The organization's awards night is coming up on May 15, and all are welcome to attend.

"That's always a fun night because all the groups get to talk about what they're doing," Beck said.

"It's a great way for people to find out what's going on in our communities and all the projects that are there."

In addition, the annual Ralph Eichler charity golf tournament, in support of the Interlake Community Foundation and Southwest District Palliative Care, is scheduled for Friday, June 9 in Teulon.

"This is definitely a big thing for the children and families in our community. Obviously it's great for our businesses, but my heart lies with our children in our communities."





Manitoba early learning and childcare providers will be able to make targeted investments in infrastructure, diversity and inclusion, and in workforce recruitment and retention strategies to better position facilities for the future, federal Minister of Northern Affairs Dan Vandal, minister responsible for the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency and the Prairies Economic Development Agency of Canada, on behalf of federal Minister of Families, Children and Social Development Karina Gould, and Manitoba Education and Early Childhood Learning Minister Wayne Ewasko announced last Thursday.

"Today's funding announcement means increased support to Manitoba's early learning and child-care providers, children and families," said Vandal. "Our government will continue to make progress with partners toward a better, more inclusive and affordable early learning and childcare system for families in Manitoba and across Canada."

The governments of Canada and

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Manitoba are providing \$45.9 million in one-time funding under the Canada-Manitoba Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child-Care Agreement to support the implementation of quality enhancement grants to fund programming for children under the age of seven. The Manitoba government is contributing an additional \$14 million to ensure equitable support is available for school-aged programming within the sector that serves children ages seven to 12.

"Our government is committed to making quality child-care more accessible for Manitoba families," said Ewasko. "These grants will help early learning and child-care providers make immediate investments into facilities and staff to support high-quality learning for children across the province and a stronger, more responsive early learning and child-care system for Manitoba families."

There are three streams of grant funding:

Quality Early Learning and Environments Grant: \$33.8 million to help improve aging infrastructure, equipment and materials;

Enhancing Diversity and Inclusion Grant: \$18.7 million to ensure children of all backgrounds and abilities feel a sense of belonging and have the ability to participate in programming through enriched curricula, space adaptations and staff-development opportunities; and

Innovative Recruitment and Retention Grant: \$7.4 million to implement creative and innovative strategies to recruit, retain and support a high-quality workforce and meet the demands of a rapidly growing sector. This includes a Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) top-up of \$500 per child-care space to provide recognition for the dedication of homebased providers to the child-care sector.

Funding is available to all licensed non-profit child-care centres (including infant, pre-school, nursery, and school-aged programs) and homebased providers, that must opt-in to the grant program before March 13. Quality enhancement grants support the principles of quality, inclusive and accessible child care and fund eligible expenses from April 1, 2022, to March 31, 2024.

With the exception of the Retirement Enhancement and Retention Benefit, eligible facilities will be required to accept or decline each funding stream through their weekly reporting update in Manitoba Child Care Search between Feb. 27 and March 13. The RRSP contribution is topped up automatically for any provider that contributes to RRSPs.

Bell snipes 50th SJHL goal this season

It was a night of many milestones for the Battlefords North Stars last Friday, on their way to officially clinching first place overall in the league standings with a 9-2 win over Melville, in North Battleford.



Stony Mountain's Megan VanHeyst has begun making a name for herself in the triathlon world over the past few years. This summer, she will represent Canada at the World Triathlon Championships in Hamburg, Germany.

VanHeyst has been participating in triathlon since she was very young. She spent most of her youth competing with the Manitoba Triathlon Centre, racing in elite youth, Junior and U23 races all over Canada and the United States.

"I was a part of the Stonewall Collegiate track program for my first three years of high school but unfortunately did not get to compete in my Grade 12 year due to the pandemic," said VanHeyst. "I always had lots of fun with the team, and it definitely helped my running. I trained for the long-distance races, mainly 3000m, 1500m and sometimes the 800m. As a team, we were very lucky to have our own outdoor track as well as a small weight room in our gym, and we enjoyed bringing home a few banners."

Despite being only in her third year of university, VanHeyst has already had lots of exciting experiences in her triathlon career so far.

When she was 15, VanHeyst was an alternate for the 2017 Canada Games, and after a big crash during the first race that put a few racers out of the relays, she was called in to race for team Newfoundland in the mixed relay. She had previously medalled in the Manitoba Games at a younger age, but this was her first introduction to large-scale competitive racing.

VanHeyst also qualified for the 2019 Western Canada Games, where she won the silver medal in the mixed relay and a bronze in the female relay.

After graduating from Stonewall Collegiate, Van-Heyst chose to head to the University of Manitoba and became a member of the Bisons sporting pro-



gram.

"The University of Manitoba was always my first choice, as was being a Bison. I love access to the pool, the track, the weight room and the friends I have made. I have a long drive to class from home, so having everything I need in one place makes the drive worth it."

Although this is her third year at the University of Manitoba, because of the pandemic, it's been her first in-person year and her first full year of proper racing with the Bison Track and Field team.

During the fall and winter months, VanHeyst trains with the Bisons Track and Field team, and in the summer, when her triathlon schedule is busy, she focuses more on that.

"This year, I competed in the Roy Griak Invitational in Minneapolis, and the Chris McCubbins Provincial Championships cross-country races as well as the George Tanner Memorial Classic and the Athletics Manitoba Last Chance track meets."

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

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
