

South West District Palliative Care recently donated part of its Grief Publication Collection to the Teulon branch of the South Interlake Regional Library, as well as \$500 for administrative costs associated with the technical cataloguing and processing required, adding to the growing collection of all SIRL branches.

With a large and diverse collection of books, the SWDPC board decided that the best way to have them available for public use in the areas it serves (providing support for end-oflife care for clients and families in the municipalities and surrounding communities of Rockwood, Rosser, Woodlands and Armstrong) was to continue its community partnership and add

to the collection of the SIRL branches, whose patrons are also from these areas. The Stonewall branch had received a donation of Grief & Bereavement books in the past from SWDPC and the decision was made to add more to the Teulon Branch as well. In total, there are now over 100 of these books that can be borrowed through all of the SIRL branches, including the Bookmobile. These grief book subjects for all ages and relationships include topics such as trauma recovery, facing illness, emotional healing, end-of-life care, memorial planning, overcoming loss and so much more.

Headingley RCMP respond to out-of-control house party

Headingley RCMP received multiple reports of an out-of-control house party in the RM of Rosser on Feb. 24 at approximately 11:30 p.m.

One of the reports stated that shots were fired and people were injured at the residence. Officers attended immediately. The house was known to officers as an online marketplace vacation home rental.

When officers arrived on scene, it was chaotic. Many people were fleeing the property, both on foot and in vehicles. When they entered the premises, officers observed a large number of youth inside and empty liquor containers were strewn everywhere. Immediately, officers were approached by a female youth stating that her friend was in need of emergency medical assistance. Officers cleared all three floors of the home while other officers were able to clear the roadway to allow EMS access to the property.

Officers outside the residence located further injured individuals and brought them inside for treatment. A male and a female were transported to hospital with serious injuries. It was discovered that another male was already at the hospital receiving treatment for injuries sustained at the

party. It did not appear that anyone had been shot despite initial reports coming into police. No firearms were located.

Initial investigation has determined that the party was announced on Snapchat and that many people at the party were unknown to each other. The residence has received thousands of dollars in damage. The party-goers were mainly youth, and drugs and alcohol were present at the scene.

"This is the second large youth party announced via social media that RCMP have seen in the last few months, and the trend is getting concerning," said Staff Sgt. Jason

Vrooman, area commander for Stonewall and Headingley RCMP. "Young people are getting seriously injured. The danger these types of events pose is no laughing matter. The level of violence escalated quickly. My advice to those seeing these invitations is stay as far away as you can and advise police immediately."

Manitoba government reduces charitable raffle licence fees

The Manitoba government is introducing regulatory changes to the Licensing and Appeals Regulation that will allow the Liquor, Gaming and Cannabis Authority of Manitoba (LGCA) to restructure its licence fee model for charitable raffles, Justice Minister Kelvin Goertzen announced Thursday.

"Manitobans are the most charitable people in all of Canada," said Goertzen. "Lowering raffle fees will ensure that more of Manitobans generosity will go to the charities and causes they are choosing to support."

Under the new model, the fee for major raffles — with anticipated gross revenues over \$10,000 — will be reduced to one per cent from 1.5 per cent of the actual gross revenue, calculated and due after the event. The change represents a 33 per cent fee reduction for raffle licensees, noted Goertzen.

"We're so grateful for community

champions who choose to use raffles to help raise funds for sick and injured children," says Stefano Grande, president and CEO, Children's Hospital Foundation of Manitoba. "We welcome the news of a reduction in raffle licence fees because it will help fundraisers be even more successful in supporting families in hospital."

Charitable raffles with anticipated gross revenues between \$2,000 and \$10,000 will pay a nominal licence fee, while charitable raffles with anticipated gross revenues under \$2,000 — which typically operate for recreational purposes rather than fundraising — will continue to be eligible for a free licence.

"It is important for public agencies like the LGCA to continually review our fee structures to ensure they are appropriate and not an impediment for our regulated industries. This amendment is a positive step in supporting Manitoba charities and their hard work in our communities," said Kristianne Dechant, executive director and CEO, LGCA.

The minister noted regulatory changes related to charitable raffle fees were introduced alongside Manitoba government measures to modernize liquor service in the province.





Volunteers needed to launch CIB group in Warren

Manitoba Health advises the six-digit family registration number used on health cards will be changing to include one letter and five numbers going forward.

The purple Manitoba Health card entitles people to health benefits and

Previously, the family number

would be six numbers (e.g. 123456) but now one letter will be included (e.g. A12345). There will be no changes to nine-digit individual numbers. Using a mix of numbers and letters for new family registration numbers will ensure enough options are available for Manitoba's growing population.

Manitoba Health has advised healthcare providers and other sites where health cards are required so necessary system adjustments can be made.

In recent months, Manitoba Health has also worked to reduce processing times for people who need new or replacement health cards. The backlog created by the pandemic is now eliminated and most new application requests are handled within a fourweek window.

COVID continues to hospitalize Manitobans

COVID continues to land Manitobans in hospital and in the intensive care unit, according to the provincial government's respiratory surveillance report for Feb. 19-25 (reporting Week 8).

There were 65 new hospitalizations for COVID, with 11 people requiring intervention in the intensive care unit, according to differences in severe outcomes between weeks 7 and 8. There were 44 new hospitalizations with two ICU admissions reported the previous week.

Four people died from COVID in Week 8, the same number of deaths reported the week before.

Manitoba's COVID death toll was 2,460 as of Feb. 18, according to the federal government's COVID webpage, and Canada's death toll now stands at 51,249.

There were 124 new COVID infections detected in Manitoba by PCR testing, an increase of 30 new infections over the 94 reported the week before.

Provincial data are an undercount of the true number of infections as the government restricts PCR testing and rapid antigen tests aren't tracked. The provincial government no longer provides in its surveillance reports the names of personal care homes and hospitals with COVID outbreaks.

Wastewater surveillance data for Winnipeg and Brandon up to Feb. 21 show the virus at a sustained level of activity.

There was one new case of influenza A reported in Week 8 and zero cases of influenza B, according to differenc-

es in total cases from week to week. There were nine hospitalizations for influenza and two deaths reported in Week 8.

There were 56 new respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) cases reported in Week 8, down five cases from the 61 reported the previous week. Ôther health news:

The Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority declared on March 1 a COVID outbreak at the Rosewood Lodge Personal Care Home (Shura Lane unit) in Stonewall.

"Four residents have tested positive and we are awaiting test results for four residents," states a March 2 message to family from clinical team manager Margarete Moulden. "Outbreak protocols are now in place on Shura Lane and general visitation has been restricted on this unit. Designated family caregivers are still attending residents in Shura Lane to provide care while wearing appropriate personal protective equipment."

The care home was in a "good position" regarding staff and equipment heading into the weekend.

"And our staff are committed to adhering to the protocols that help to prevent the spread of illness among our residents," said Moulden.

The IERHA declared on March 2 a gastrointestinal outbreak at East Gate Lodge Personal Care Home in Beausejour.

- There were over 4.8 million new COVID infections and more than 39,000 new deaths worldwide reported between Jan. 30 and Feb. 26, according to the World Health Organization's epidemiological update published March 1.

Total confirmed COVID cases globally have now reached 758 million with over 6.8 million people having died from the virus. Reported infections are underestimates because of testing delays and reductions in testing.

The WHO says recombinant strains of COVID appear to be on an upwards trajectory. Recombinants occur when multiple COVID variants infect a person and interact with each other, mixing their genetic material to form a new hybrid.

"There has been an increasing trend in the proportions of recombinant lineages. In epidemiological week 6 (6 to 12 February 2023), pooled recombinant variant sequences accounted for 41.5% (7748 sequences) of sequences, which has increased from 18.7% (8919 sequences) in week 2 (9 to 15 January 2023)," state the update. "The majority of these recombinant variants in week 6 were XBB.1.5 (32.6% of all sequences)."

The WHO is currently monitoring seven omicron subvariants: BF.7 (BA.5 + R346T mutation in spike), BQ.1 (including BQ.1.1, with BA.5 + R346T, K444T, N460K mutations in spike), BA.2.75, CH.1.1 (BA.2.75 + L452R, F486S); XBB, XBB.1.5 (BA.2.10.1 and BA.2.75 recombinant) and XBF (BA.5.2.3 and BA.2.75.3 recombinant).

"These variants are being monitored due to their observed transmission advantage relative to other circulating variants and additional amino acid changes that are known or suspected to confer fitness advantage," states the update.

Hearing aid grant program created for seniors with hearing loss

The Manitoba government is creating a new \$12.6-million grant program that will assist eligible older Manitobans experiencing hearing loss to cover the expense of testing, fitting and purchasing new hearing aids, Seniors and Long-term Care Minister Scott Johnston announced Thursday.

"Our government recognizes hearing loss as priority concern for seniors and with this grant more Manitoba seniors who require hearing aids will have the financial means to access them regardless of income level," said Johnston. "Hearing aids provide valuable benefits to improve quality of life in a number of important ways such as fully participating with family, friends and co-workers, while also avoiding the isolation that can be associated with hearing loss."

According to Department of Health statistics, nearly 4,000 seniors over the age of 65 reported hearing loss during a physician visit in 2021 and roughly 25 per cent of seniors have hearing loss at a level that would benefit from hearing aid use.

The hearing aid grant of up to \$2,000 is available to all Manitobans who meet the following eligibility criteria: - age 65 or over;

- family income below \$80,000 in the previous year;

- have documented hearing loss; and - have been prescribed hearing aids

by an audiologist or otolaryngologist. "For those who are hearing impaired something as simple as a hearing aid can make all the difference in quality of life," said Susan Sader, executive director, Good Neighbours Active Living Centre. "The Manitoba government is to be commended for listening to Manitobans who struggle with hearing loss and for providing a program that will help many stay active and engaged in the community."

Untreated hearing loss is linked with decreased word recognition, difficulty communicating, increased risk of falls, social isolation, cognitive decline and dementia.

"We have received many heartbreaking emails and phone calls from seniors or their caregivers asking for help because they need hearing aids but could not afford them," said Joanne Jones, president, Canadian Hard of Hearing Association Manitoba Chapter. "This new grant is a great step in ensuring many more Manitoba seniors will have the hearing aids they need and better healthier lifestyles as a result."

The Manitoba government will begin accepting applications later this spring.

The new program aligns with strategic priorities including financial security and safe, inclusive and accessible communities, which are highlighted in Manitoba, A Great Place to Age: Provincial Seniors Strategy.

This hymn speaks of the overarching care of God. It's a great Lenten hymn as we begin our journey to the Cross with Jesus. It's a song for all ages, not just children. Who doesn't want to know that God is travelling with them?

at Stony Mountain-Lilyfield Pastoral Charge Manitoba government sets stage for \$10-a-day child care, prioritizing new spaces, training early learning and child-care professionals, and ensuring access across the

province

As part of the Manitoba government's ongoing efforts to be a national leader in affordable and accessible child care, Premier Heather Stefanson and Education and Early Childhood Learning Minister Wayne Ewasko announced Manitoba has reached a historic milestone in which Manitoba families will pay a maximum of \$10 a day for children 12 years and under for regular hours of care, beginning April 2.

"Our government recognizes that access to affordable and high-quality child care is essential for Manitobans to participate in the workforce, support their families and play an active role in the growth of their communities and the economy," said Stefanson. "Today, I am proud to share that with the significant initiatives our government has implemented over the past few years to lower parent fees and build capacity in the childcare system, we have gone above and beyond our commitment by reducing all parent fees to \$10 a day for children 12 and under attending licensed, funded early learning and child-care centres and homes. Our government recognizes many Manitoba families are struggling to make ends meet and this partnership and our significant investments will save Manitoba families thousands of dollars a year in child-care fees."

Under the Canada-Manitoba Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care Agreement, the Manitoba government committed to decreasing parent fees and reaching an average of \$10 per day by 2026. Today, the Manitoba government announced it has surpassed its commitment and has done so three years ahead of schedule, the premier noted.

"Over the past several years, our government has been working diligently to strengthen and grow the early learning and child-care system to be able to effectively implement this significant fee reduction," said Ewasko. "We have been working collaboratively with the child-care sector, municipalities, Indigenous communities, and the business community to create thousands of new spaces throughout our province. Additionally, we are supporting initiatives to build a strong workforce so Manitoba families can be confident their children are receiving the best care to support their needs."

As part of efforts to strengthen the workforce, the Manitoba government also announced today an expression of interest to expand post-secondary training options for early learning and child-care professionals, the minister noted.

"Our government continues making investments to attract, train, and retain child-care professionals," said Ewasko. "The expression of interest will support training expansion, as well as the development of additional on-site child-care spaces and expansion of existing facilities to create new learning labs and development sites that will allow students to put their in-class learning into practice."

The expression of interest invites post-secondary institutions to apply for funding to develop new programming to train child-care professionals and will help ensure there are an additional 1,000 child-care assistants and 2,000 early childhood educators by 2026, the minister said, adding that post-secondary institutions are also invited to submit proposals for the expansion of child-care services on campus to support students, employees and communities.

"Early childhood educators are the essential foundation of high-quality child-care services. Investing in the early learning and child-care workforce, both now, and planning for the future, is fundamental to successful system building for children, families and all," said Jodie Kehl, executive director, Manitoba Child Care Association Inc.

The expression of interest for training expansion closes today, while the expression of interest for child-care expansion and learning lab development closes March 31. The Manitoba government will proceed with the selection process and the development of training programming in the coming weeks, Ewasko said, adding that funding for expanded training options will be provided through the Canada-Manitoba Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care Agreement.

Over the past two years, the Manitoba government has implemented a number of initiatives to support a high-quality, accessible, inclusive early learning child-care system in the province, Stefanson said, particularly in the following areas: spaces, workforce and affordability.

For quality child care to benefit Manitobans, spaces are needed in every community across the province and to achieve this the Manitoba government has:

- provided new, ongoing operating grants to support the creation of over 3,100 affordable child-care spaces;

- partnered with rural municipalities and First Nations communities to build 23 new child-care centres, creating an additional 1,670 spaces; and

- worked with community-based organizations, existing child-care providers, school divisions and other partners to advance the Manitoba government's overall commitment for 23,000 new child-care spaces by 2026.

The Manitoba government is committed to creating a qualified, motivated workforce of early childhood educators and child-care assistants by improving recruitment, retention and remuneration, and to support this goal has:

- allocated nearly \$37 million to implement a wage grid to support wage equity for the early childhood workforce, by providing a 12 per cent increase to revenue per space added to the operating grants;

- implemented the Early Childhood

Educators Tuition Reimbursement, providing up to \$5,000 per student per academic year, which has already supported 380 students; and

- provided \$60 million in quality enhancement grants to child-care facilities to support infrastructure improvements, curriculum development and workforce retention.

Affordable child care provides choices for individuals and families. A provincewide early learning and child-care plan means ensuring all families have access to quality, professional and affordable child care in their community and to meet this need the Manitoba government has:

- provided a further \$1 million to almost \$140 million in annual provincial funding to support affordable child care for families, with the additional funding ensuring the \$10-a-day child care covers a regular day of care for school-aged children;

- expanded net household income thresholds for the Child Care Subsidy Program by 45 per cent in 2022, allowing more families to have child-care fees reduced; and

- provided a \$72-million parent fee advance to reduce parent fees through child-care centres.

"Our government is working diligently to ensure every Manitoba child and family can access high-quality, affordable, inclusive early learning and child care across the province. We look forward to continuing our work to establish Manitoba's child-care system as one of the most affordable in the country," said Stefanson.

Nominations now open for Canada Volunteer Awards

Do you know a volunteer, business, social enterprise or not-for-profit that is making a difference in your community?

If so, perhaps you'll consider submitting a nomination for a Canada Volunteer Award.

The Canada Volunteer Awards celebrate Canadians who make a difference, explained Brenda Martinussen, a representative for the Prairies on the National Advisory Board.

"They recognize the outstanding contributions of volunteers, businesses and innovative not-for-profit organizations in improving the well-being of people and communities," she said.

"Volunteers support services and organizations who have a direct impact on the lives of Canadians across a wide range of fields — education, arts and culture, sports, health care, the environment, animal care — the list goes on. They dedicate their time, energy and resources to make a difference, to have a positive impact and to address social challenges.'

Martinussen draws attention to a 2018 Statistics Canada's general social survey on giving, volunteering and participating. According to the survey, 79 per cent of Canadians aged 15 and older reported volunteering in 2018, and they dedicated about 5 billion hours to their volunteer activities.

"Many not-for-profits would be unable to function or do all the work they do without volunteers. So many community initiatives are rooted in the work of volunteers. If we stop to think of all the things that would not be done without volunteers, we start to see the impact of their efforts," she said.

"Volunteers do not volunteer for recognition. However, I think that whenever possible, it is important to recognize and show appreciation for individuals who are taking time out of their lives to help improve the life of someone else. Volunteers make our communities better places. Even the smallest tasks can make a big difference in the lives of others."

When you nominate someone, it's a way to thank them for their involvement in the community, she added.

"Rural Manitoba has some incredible communities with incredible volunteers supporting them," she said.

"As a Prairie representative, I love seeing volunteers from rural areas nominated. Just because we are from small communities does not mean our work does not have a great impact."

Martinussen challenges all Express readers to think of someone in their community who could be nominated.



Maybe there is someone who is known as the go-to person to get things done in their area. Maybe this is more formally through their support of a seniors' organization, a hall board, 4-H, a community club or their local library. Or maybe it is informally — they are always there to help in a emergency to start a food or clothing drive for a family in need, they lead sandbagging when a flood is threatening, or they deliver groceries to their elderly neighbours on a regular basis," she said.

"Often, you find people who do both. Our volunteers are worthy of being recognized. Nominating someone shows them that their efforts and time are appreciated and that the value in the work they are doing is noted."

Similarly, nominating a business or organization can provide a much-appreciated boost.

"At a local level, being nominated can help raise the profile of a not-forprofit, social enterprise or business. Aside from this increased visibility, award recipients will be asked to identify a not-for-profit organization in Canada to receive a grant of \$5,000 for the regional awards and \$10,000 for the national award," Martinussen said.

"Individuals and organizations will be recognized at a national ceremony. They receive a certificate signed by the prime minster as well as a label pin. They also take part in a session for sharing best practices in volunteering."

For Martinussen, she knows firsthand the importance of volunteering, which is why she's happy to serve as a Prairie representative for the National Advisory Board.

"I was raised to appreciate the value of giving back to others. I personally

try to volunteer in a role that is meaningful to me at each a local, provincial and national level. After my other provincial and national volunteer commitments came to an end, I was looking for another way to make an impact. When this opportunity came up, it seemed like a great fit," she said.

"I have always been a firm believer in volunteering and supporting one's community, and I also believe in recognizing and appreciating the work of others. 
Emerging Leader - recognizes volunteers between the ages of 18 and 30 who have demonstrated leadership and helped to build stronger communities.

Do you have your documents in order?

It's better to prepare important documents in advance — such as healthcare directives and power of attorney — rather than on the spot in stressful situations.

Jennifer Dann, a hospital-based social worker in Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority, explained the significance of taking these steps.

"A health-care directive is a document that provides direction to your health-care team about your healthcare wishes in the event you are not able to express them yourself," she said.

"It is strongly recommended you speak to your doctor before filling out your directive. On this document, you can inform doctors, nurses and your medical team about what kinds of treatments you may or may not want."

At the same time, the health-care directive allows you to designate one or two loved ones to act as your medical decision-makers, or health-care proxies, if you're no longer able to make decisions for yourself.

"It's important to speak openly about your health-care wishes to your loved ones. The people you choose should understand your medical conditions and your health-care goals," Dann said.

"They should also be agreeable to act on your behalf in the event it is required. However, it should be noted that a health-care proxy cannot consent on your behalf for medical assistance in dying (MAiD)."

The health-care directive form is free

and can be printed from the provincial government website. Alternatively, you can ask any health-care provider to print a copy.

"The directive can be changed at any time. You simply need to destroy the old one and complete a new one, making sure it is signed and dated. You may also write your medical treatment wishes and designate medical proxies on any piece of paper, as long as it is signed and dated," Dann said.

"Once you have completed the document, share the information with your family and your doctor so they know your health-care wishes and keep the document in a safe place. Many people keep that document on their refrigerator so that paramedics or their families or friends can find it in an emergency."

In addition, a key consideration is power of attorney, which is a legal document that gives another person the legal authority to act on your behalf and manage some or all of your financial affairs.

"As it relates to financial matters, a lawyer is required to complete the document. There are many different types of power of attorney documents. A lawyer will help you determine which type best suits your needs. It is a relatively inexpensive means to ensure that your financial needs are met if you are no longer able to manage them on your own," Dann said.

"If folks are assessed as no longer able to make decisions on their own, and if they do not have a power of attorney document, the province has a process in place that allows for families or loved ones to hire a lawyer and present to court to seek private commiteeship. This process is often expensive and may take several months. If families are not in a financial position to seek court-appointed private committeeship, the Office of the Public Guardian and Trustee will be assigned."

When it comes to health-care settings, including personal care homes, it's worth taking the time to ensure you have a power of attorney document in place.

"Often people come to personal care homes because they are no longer able to live independently and require additional supports. This may be as a result of increased physical health needs or someone may no longer be mentally competent and require a more supportive environment to ensure their personal safety. Folks that are assessed as lacking mental capacity require assistance managing their personal finances," Dann explained.

"Having a power of attorney document allows for your designate to act on your behalf, arrange for alternate housing (such as a personal care home) and ensure your financial needs are met. Some personal care homes require a power of attorney document prior to admission to their facility."

At the same time, don't forget to file your tax returns each year. If you file your income taxes annually, you might be able to access benefits and refunds that could enhance your financial situation.

"If you require a more supportive environment, it is important to know that personal care home rates are set

by Manitoba Health and are calculated based off of your Canada Revenue Agency notice of assessment. You will be required to submit your notice of assessment to the personal care home on an annual basis and your rates will be recalculated," Dann said.

"Many communities provide free income tax clinics for seniors. Contact your local services to seniors office to find a free tax clinic in your area."

All are welcome to learn about filing a tax return through two free upcoming presentations. A community online presentation is set for Thursday, March 9 from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. via Microsoft Teams. Then on Monday, March 13 from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m., a 55-plus presentation will take place at Gimli New Horizons. This session will also be available online via

Low to moderate risk of flooding this spring: province

After a year of drought followed by a year of flooding, dare we hope 2023 will be the year local waterways give us a break?

According to the province's spring flood outlook, we just might be that lucky, depending, of course, on what Mother Nature has in store for us in the weeks ahead.

In its February flood outlook released last week, Manitoba Infrastructure and Transportation's Hydrologic Forecast Centre reported low to moderate risk of flooding in most Manitoba basins.

The centre is predicting a moderate risk of flooding along the Red and Assiniboine rivers and in the Interlake region along the Fisher and Icelandic rivers, and a low risk of flooding along rivers such as the Souris, Roseau, Rat and Pembina.

Water levels are expected to remain below community flood protection levels, the province says.

There is also a low risk of flooding for most other Manitoba basins including the Saskatchewan River, Whiteshell lakes area and northern Manitoba. With the exceptions of Dauphin Lake and Lake St. Martin, most Manitoba lakes, including Lake Winnipeg and Lake Manitoba, are projected to remain within operating ranges after the spring run-off, the release said.

The report notes that soil moisture conditions at freeze-up play a major roll in the likelihood of flooding come spring.

"Due to normal to below normal summer and fall precipitation, the soil moisture at freeze-up is normal to below normal for most Manitoba basins," it says. "Some localized areas in central Manitoba and in the Interlake region have above normal soil moisture.

"The soil moisture is normal to below normal for the Red and Souris River basins (including the U.S. portions of the basin), the Assiniboine River, Qu'Appelle River, Saskatchewan River, Winnipeg River and northern Manitoba basins."

Winter precipitation has also been generally below normal in much of central and southern Manitoba, save for southeastern Manitoba which saw near-normal levels. The northern part of the province saw normal to above normal levels, as did the U.S. portions of the Red River and Souris River ba-

Dann suggests making the effort to any eliminate barriers that could stand in the way of accessing supports when you need them. If you don't file your taxes, you might also miss out on tax breaks, income supplements or government subsidies.

"Since personal care home rates are calculated by your income, admission to a personal care home could be delayed until the most recent annual income tax is filed and your notice of assessment received. You will be required to submit your annual notice of assessment to the financial office of your chosen personal care home," she said.

"If you are experiencing housing instability, many housing organizations and supports require current financial information prior to them considering your application."

In her role as a hospital-based social worker, Dann has seen firsthand impacts of not completing these tasks. "When it comes to health care, I don't think folks realize that there are service accessibility barriers when your financial and legal arrangements are not in place," she said.

"Not having these affairs in order can also result in emotional and financial challenges for the patient's loved ones, if there is a need for them to intervene or support after a medical event or change."

The ripple effect can extend outwards beyond the individuals to create systemic impacts as well.

"Unfortunately, not having the right legal documents in place has resulted in lengthy hospital admissions, which places additional pressures on an already strained healthcare system. Additionally, I have witnessed people experiencing barriers accessing long-term care or other housing arrangements as a result of not having fulfilled their financial obligations," Dann said.

"We can all work together to ease the strain on our health-care system by ensuring that there are no financial or legal barriers that may complicate or delay a discharge from hospital."

Local ranch owner named Novice Cutting Co-Champion

Cutting? No, not with a knife. It's a sport with horses!

"It's a different sport...a lot of people don't even know what cutting is or understand how you get points," says Brenda McQueen, owner of Rocking Q Ranch in Stonewall.

If you've never heard of cutting, here's how McQueen describes the sport: "In a cutting competition, you have two and a half minutes to show the judge how good you and your horse are at cutting cattle."

According to Wikipedia's page about cutting, during the allotted time, the horse and rider must cut at least two cows from the herd, and one must be a deep cut, meaning the cow must come from deep inside the herd instead of from the edges.

Each contestant has four helpers: two are designated as turnback riders, who help to keep cattle from running off to the back of the arena, and the other two are designated as herd holders to keep the cattle bunched together and prevent potential strays from escaping into the work area.

The hardest part according to Mc-Queen? "When you're riding a cutting horse you can never even lift up your hands off the horse. If you lift them, you get docked points right away. You're controlling them with your legs."

At the beginning of the competition season, McQueen's cutting horse, Time In Montana, came up sore because of a front tendon problem in his front leg. To compete, you need to use a horse that's been trained to

cut, and McQueen retired her last cutting horse RJ after a great career and a championship win in 2018.

When it comes to winning, Mc-Queen says you have to get points throughout the season to work up to it. With her horse on the mend, she sat on the sidelines until she turned to her partner, Garry Gerbrandt, and said, "let me just get on Amando and see if he'll cut for me."

Amando Smoothie was a cutting horse but became a turnback horse after a streak of quitting out of nowhere on his riders.

"Luckily, he never quit on me and we kept going," she says. "That was actually at the Morris Stampede that I tried him out. So thank goodness, he came up for me and got me some points there."

Despite not showing in as many classes as she would've liked, Mc-Queen was able to make a comeback.

"The last class of the year, that's what helped me win the finals."

The Manitoba Cutting Horse Association had its 59th annual awards banquet to celebrate the winners of the 2022 season on Feb. 11, 2023. Despite splitting her season between two horses, McQueen was named co-champion alongside Tanya Harms Watkins — and her horse Popcorn in the \$5,000 Novice rider class.

"Tanya and I have been competing against each other for a few years now. She is a great rider and has a great horse, so competition is tough," says McQueen. "I am very fortunate to have amazing horses and to be a part of a great club."

Selkirk RCMP investigating use of counterfeit currency

Argyle Museum plans to share Balmoral history

Argyle's community museum plans to branch out to also highlight Balmoral's history.

Settlers, Rails and Trails launched as a private museum in 1991 in Brant-Argyle School. Since then, the museum attained charitable status and acquired 12 acres of land in 2019 to create a permanent home.

Since 2014, the museum has created 15 exhibitions, as well as one theatrical production that travelled around the Interlake as a play and was recorded on DVD. In addition, the museum has published four history books, and two of its directors received the 2022 Queen Elizabeth II platinum jubilee medal.

On Feb. 22, president and executive director Shayne Campbell shared some museum highlights with Rockwood council.

He noted that the museum uses technology, hands-on and interactive exhibits to share information.

"We also created off-site presentations, like the seven flag exhibitions we created at the Manitoba legislative buildings," he said.

"In addition to local history schools, churches, businesses, families, veterans — we have diversified to create a Manitoba Brick & Block Collection and the famous Canadian Flag Collection, which puts us on the national stage."

The museum's 12-acre park site is currently under development, featuring a one-acre prairie grass planting area, three heritage buildings in the final stage of renovations, and 10 royal trees planted for Queen Elizabeth II's platinum jubilee.

"As half of Argyle's population lives in the municipality, as is located our 12-acre park, we appreciate the ongoing support from Rockwood," Camp-





bell told council.

"The museum is also looking to include residents from Balmoral to share in our local history, stories, artifacts and programming."

Campbell also expressed gratitude for the RM of Rockwood's contributions, which include railway ballast rock, letters of support for grants and financial support to the museum's major projects.

"The museum wanted to make a meaningful thank-you to the RM online, on our village sign, signage at the exhibition centre and on our 2022 annual report," Campbell said. The museum is currently located in the lower level of Argyle Community Centre on Highway 322. It's open on the first Saturday of each month from 1 to 4 p.m. with free admission. Stonewall council news in brief

The Town of Stonewall is being recognized for its beautification efforts.

The town won a Manitoba Good Roads award in the urban beautification competition in the 2,001 to 7,500 population category.

"That's another feather in the town's cap," said Mayor Sandra Smith.

"I think part of that result is from the work that our Communities in Bloom committee does, so kudos to them and to our staff as well."

An awards banquet is set for April 3 in Winnipeg.

In other council news:

• At the March 1 meeting, council passed second and third readings of a bylaw to govern the Town of Stonewall and its committees.

• Council appointed Deputy Mayor Peter Bullivant and four citizen representatives (Glenn Leskiw, David Cassidy, David Kalnuk and Lockie McLean) to the 2024 Board of Revision.

Each member will receive remuneration according to the indemnity bylaw. Bullivant will be the presiding officer, and the assistant CAO will be the secretary for the Board of Revision.

• Council adopted an inclement weather policy to govern the operation of the town's facilities in case of severe weather.

• Council learned about opportunities for naloxone training.

• CAO Wally Melnyk will execute a service agreement with the Commissionaires to provide bylaw enforcement from April 2023 to March 2024. The Commissionaires' bylaw enforcement staff will be designated as officers for the town.

• The CAO will sign a snow removal agreement between the town and the provincial government, which includes a three per cent rate increase for 2022-23.

• The CAO will execute an electric service agreement for the relocation and alteration of a Manitoba Hydro post on 3rd Avenue South to accommodate the new daycare entrance.

• Deputy Mayor Peter Bullivant acknowledged the impressive achievements of the Stonewall Blues U11 A Team Scrivens in the Chevrolet Good Deeds Cup. At press time, the final results were still being tallied.

Stonewall Art Group features local artists: Cindy Trachsel

When Cindy Trachsel retired from teaching in 2014, she finally got the opportunity to start the art career she had been waiting for.

In 2017, she joined the Stonewall Art Group.

Trachsel said she has always dabbled in art and enjoyed picking up the pencil and seeing where it took her, but life seemed to get in the way.

"I've always loved drawing. It's something I've always had a passion for. I like to see the animals and people come alive in my drawings. When you can capture a feeling or expression in a person or an animal, it's a really nice feeling," said Trachsel.

Now, being retired, Trachsel can focus on her art and experiment as much as she wants with whatever medium she chooses.

"I'd sketch a little when I had a free moment, but I never really worked at it until 2014," said Trachsel.

She started with pen and ink, then stippling, then transitioned to her now go-to medium, coloured pencils.

She mainly uses oil-based pencils, but there are also wax-based pencils and a mixture of the two. Although she has dabbled in all three, she always returns to the oil-based set.

Coloured pencils are her chosen medium, as she focuses on the little details in her creations. When mainly drawing people and animals, using this medium helps the details in the fur of animals, and people's hair or skin tones, pop off the page and indeed come to life.

The pieces she creates are usually a portraiture style of either subject.

"I create mostly because I love it. I love being able to start with a blank paper and being able to create an animal or a person, and they come alive on the paper, " she said.

sins.

"The magnitude of the spring runoff on Manitoba's rivers is still very dependent on weather conditions from now until the spring melt and during the spring melt period," the report stresses.

Too much precipitation, the frost depth at the time of runoff, and the timing and rate of spring thaw and peak flows in Manitoba, the United States, Saskatchewan and Ontario could all paint a very different picture over the next few weeks.

"A late thaw and spring rainstorms could result in a rapid snow melt that

increases overland flooding and flows on tributary streams and larger rivers," the report says.

The province is already taking flood mitigation steps, including conducting normal spring ice cutting and breaking work along the Red and Icelandic rivers over the next few weeks to reduce ice jam related flooding.

The Red River Floodway is expected to be activated this spring under unfavourable future weather conditions to reduce water levels within the city of Winnipeg. Some operation of the Portage Diversion is also anticipated to prevent ice jamming on the Assiniboine River.

Another flood outlook is expected later this month.



Depending on weather, training camp is scheduled to begin in April.



Washington Capitals sign Ryan Hofer to three-year, entry-level contract

The Washington Capitals continue to stay busy during deadline week, this time signing one of their own.

The Capitals announced Wednesday that they have signed Western Hockey League forward Ryan Hofer to a three-year, entry-level contract. According to our friends at Cap-Friendly, the contract carries a cap hit of \$851,000. He will be paid \$82,000 during his time in the AHL.

Hofer, 20, was drafted in the sixth round (181st overall) of the 2022 NHL Draft. The 6-foot-3, 181-pound centre plays a hard-nosed game. Last season, while with the Everett Silvertips, he registered 58 points (25 goals, 33 assists) and 84 penalty minutes in 67 games. This season, Hofer was part of a monstrous trade that saw him and Anaheim Ducks prospect Olen Zellweger go to the Kamloops Blazers in exchange for four roster players and 10 draft picks, it is considered to be

one of the biggest trades in major junior history. The Blazers host the 2023 Memorial Cup, part of the reason for them going "all in." He joined a team that has been led predominantly by Dallas Stars' top prospect Logan Stankoven who held a 35-game point streak this season. Hofer has tallied 22 points (13 goals, nine assists) and 30 penalty minutes in 17 games since joining the Blazers and playing on a line with New York Islanders prospect Davlan Kuefler.

Hofer is also the younger brother of St. Louis Blues goaltender Joel Hofer. In case his surname sounds familiar. The younger Hofer will have the chance to compete in the 2023 Memorial Cup before embarking on his NHL journey. Expect Hofer to begin his development with the Hershey Bears of the American Hockey League during the 2023-24 campaign.

"It's something I've always dreamed of playing, so, of course, I'm very excited at being in the Brier," said Kyle Doering.


"I would have liked to qualify the traditional way of winning an actual province for my first time, but we'll certainly take the Wild Card. I can't wait for the event to get going."




