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Teulon Council debates election campaign expenses

The newly elected Teulon municipal council continued its difficult beginning last Tuesday, as councillors hurled accusations at the mayor relating to incorrect and illegal campaign expenses.

Mayor Debbie Kozyra stood her ground, reading a letter she addressed to the Minister of Municipal Relations and the Association of Manitoba Municipalities (AMM).

"I am writing to you in regard to a very disconcerting situation that is happening to me regarding my filing of election (campaign) expenses ... and the extreme distress this has caused me," Kozyra read aloud.

"With Christmas, and (my role as) president of Rockwood Festival of the Arts, I totally forgot to submit my expenses by the Jan. 17, 2019, deadline," she said.

Coun. Barb Mankewich was quick to side with the mayor, saying it's a confusing process, and she too filed her campaign expenses incorrectly at first.

The Ministry of Municipal relations has not yet responded to the letter, according to the mayor and council, and the mayor has stated she will not make any further comments until the ministry has responded to her letter.

Timelines and The Municipal Act

During the election campaign, the would-be mayor filed her campaign expenses on Dec. 5, 2018 totalling \$1,582.70, which had to be filed by the May 2019 deadline.

CAO Doreen Steg requested the mayor re-file her election campaign expense statement due to the appearance that expenses and contributions may be incorrect, and Mayor Kozyra would need to re-file the campaign expense statements by Jan. 17, 2019.

- Southwest Teens at Risk requested funding 2019, as well as for a program called Managing Your Mood. At the March 12 meeting, Rosser council authorized a \$2,500 grant, plus \$3,150 for the Managing Your Mood program.
- The RM of Rosser accepted a proposal from Associated Engineering for \$5,000 plus tax for professional consulting services regarding a water and sewer rate study for the Centre-Port area.
- Council approved a resolu-

tion to transfer \$60,000 from the 2018 surplus to the office replacement reserve.

- Council is supporting the school board's position to protect a local voice in education. The reeve will send a letter to the Association of Manitoba Municipalities regarding the provincial review of K to 12 educa-
- Council hosted a public hearing regarding a conditional use application to allow for a single-family dwelling on a property on Road 9E. Council approved the application

- Cliff Lechow of Waste Connections Canada spoke to council about his request to remove a railway crossing on Prairie Green Road.
- Council wants to have an integrity commission for members to consult with individually regarding conflict of interest and other related matters. The RM of Rosser will retain the services of lawyer Sherri Walsh, a partner at the legal firm Hill Sokolski Walsh, to perform the role of an integrity commissioner.
- The CAO and legal counsel will prepare a letter about Bill 19, The Planning Amendment Act, and send it to the provincial government.
- The CAO will write a letter of support for Grosse Isle Heritage Site so that they can apply for the Coop Community Spaces Grant. The funds would be used towards a new project to build a kitchen, food storage, serving area and permanent bathrooms.
- The CAO will write a letter of support for the South Interlake Regional Library so that they can apply for several grants. The funds would be used towards a new Bookmobile that would service many communities.
- The RM of Rosser will hire Jim Findlay to provide lawn care for the municipal office yard from May 1 to Sept. 30 for \$50 per week.

Communities with a population of 10,000 or fewer people can enter the


contest, vying for the chance to host a free country music concert.

Rockwood council news in brief

Bill Matheson provided input on capital development levies from the other side of the Rockwood council table during at a meeting last week.

On March 13, the former councillor spoke as a delegation on the issue of capital development fees and offered a potential alternative to the current process.

"Capital development fees or levies are a one-time tax on new capital developments, such as a home, to offset or contribute to the additional costs of operating, repairing, expanding or replacing municipal infrastructure," he explained.

"Ît is a good way for individuals who are wanting to live and build new in the RM to make a contribution to the existing infrastructure."

However, he said that Section 143 of the Planning Act is flawed, since it indicates that the levy can only be enacted with the creation of a subdivision. In contrast, other communities across the country collect fees at the development stage or the building permit stage.

Matheson said about 10 homes each year are built in the RM without making a capital development levy contribution, which would equate to about \$100,000 in lost local revenue.

Currently, building permits cost about \$1,500 apiece. Matheson suggested increasing this amount to \$12,000 and \$15,500 apiece, depending on whether they're urban or rural. If capital development levies had already been paid on the property, then the owners would receive a rebate on the building permit for the same amount.

That way, the fee would have nothing to do with a subdivision.

"We need to treat our ratepayers fairly," Matheson said, encouraging councillors to discuss the matter with provincial politicians.

In other council news:

- Rockwood council appointed Dennis Peterson as the emergency coordinator for the Stonewall Rockwood Emergency Management Board.
- The RM of Rockwood spring road weight restrictions start on Wednesday, March 20 at 8 a.m. and will remain in effect until Friday, May 31 at 11:59 p.m. The end date is subject to change due to weather, and updates will be posted on the RM's website at www.rockwood.ca.
- Council hosted a public hearing regarding an application to vary the minimum site requirement of a property in the agricultural general zone to 66 acres from 80 acres for the proposed residual parcel that would result from a subdivision. The South Interlake Planning District had no concerns with the variance application and recommended approval.
- The RM of Rockwood is exploring the option of increasing the size of its building to incorporate its property to the north of the existing building. Going forward, council will discuss this idea.
- Council authorized the public works department to install stop signs and street name signs on all the eastwest streets in Gunton.
- Council awarded the gravel supply contract to Inland Aggregates Inc. for the south supplier and Armstrong Construction for the northern supplier.
- Council approved the installation of a culvert under Road 94N approximately 150 metres west of Highway 17 to act as an overflow pipe in high water situations. Sustainable Development requires that Manitoba Infrastructure sing off on the project because the Road 94N ditch flows directly into their ditch on Highway 17. The resolution also states that the installation of the new culvert won't impact the Manitoba Infrastructure drainage system.

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Keeping Manitobans safe by designating an additional \$2.3 million in funding to target drug-related criminal activity.

Fixing Manitoba's finances by reducing the summary deficit to \$360 million.

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Rural communities make up larger community

Sometimes living in smaller communities can translate to neglect from larger entities.

Take the City of Winnipeg, for instance. If the City of Winnipeg has a pressing issue, and needs aid or input from the Province of Manitoba, it's not long before the city has the province's ear.

But if the towns of Arborg, Stonewall or Gimli, just as examples, find themselves in similar situations, getting that ear might not be as easy.

The re-design and re-construction of provincial roads 415 and 416 is a great example. The roads were closed for nearly a decade.

At a glance, maybe those provincial roads seem like a low priority to a city dweller compared to other things.

But those roads represent a shorter commute — upwards of a 45-minute difference in commute - between the communities of Woodlands, Inwood, St. Laurent and Teulon.

It's not just about what could be classified as convenience, as they also represent access for emergency personnel.

Though it took a decade, it was the combined efforts of the involved communities that garnered the Province of Manitoba's attention.

A quick kudos should be given to the involved organizations and municipalities, as they're advocating for their communities.

Another example is in the works,

as on Tuesday at Teulon's municipal council meeting, the council spoke about the potential of having the East Interlake Conservation District lobby the city to change its method of sewage disposal.

The City of Winnipeg currently dumps sewage waste into the river system, which ends up affecting the cleanliness of the Red River in the Interlake area, according to Teulon council.

The East Interlake Conservation District (EICD) is an organization of neighbouring municipalities, towns and villages working together as a watershed community with the Province of Manitoba to promote the sustainable use and management of land

and water resources within the East Interlake region of Manitoba, according to its website.

Whether or not the EICD gets its point across, and whether or not the city changes its ways, both remain to

But the point is this: it's important not to forget the fact that rural Manitoba communities make up one larger community. It shouldn't be a city versus rural mentality, but it's critical to remember there is power in numbers.

The City of Winnipeg has those numbers but so, too, does the rural community as a whole. We don't have to look far for examples.

Band together, prioritize and have your voices heard.

Hi folks

I think it's fair to say there has been an explosion of ice fishing derbies in Manitoba in the last decade. During that time I've noticed each derby seems to have its own character based on the folks in the community who put it on. I must admit to having a soft spot in my heart for the Grand Marais derby as well as other small town derbies like it. Mel laughed when I asked her if she had a fishing story for us. She said the first time she went ice shack fishing with friends here on New Year's Eve years ago she no sooner got her baited hook below the ice and a fish struck. With only a little line out from her rod she hauled up hard and a pickerel came jumping out of the holes water, slipped her hook and without so much as a thank you took a nose dive disappearing into a neighboring ice hole!

Later, at the end of the derby Dean Stockman, from the area won first prize with a nice pickerel which he proudly held up for us. Thanks Dean and congratulations.

I was cruising up and down the ice of the Red River a couple of weeks ago on a hazy afternoon and saw a chap standing beside his SUV nursing two short rods with lines in ice holes. I pulled up to him and asked if he was having any luck."Not much," our new friend, with a pleasant face, short grey hair and full body that moved with ease responded."What's your name?" I asked getting out of old red. Fire Service members training program to help cope with work-related stress

The Office of the Fire Commissioner (OFC) will soon be offering a program called The Working Mind First Responders (TWMFR) in partnership with the Mental Health Commission of Canada (MHCC) and the Manitoba Association of Fire Chiefs (MAFC), to help members of the Manitoba Fire Service cope with the realities of work-related stress, Growth, Enterprise and Trade Minister Blaine Pedersen, minister responsible for the Office of the Fire Commissioner, announced last Thursday.

"Helping our first responders identify the stressors they may face, and making sure they have the coping mechanisms to deal with that stress, is critical," Pedersen said. "Emergency service personnel face trauma on a daily basis, and we want to ensure they have the skills to maintain resilience and keep coming back to do the important life-saving work they do."

Under an agreement with the MHCC to deliver the Train the Trainer program, a specialty instructor network will be developed to deliver the half-day training sessions to members of the Manitoba Fire Service. The specialty instructor network will work under the guidance and direction of the Manitoba Emergency Services College (MESC) as the training and education provider on behalf of the OFC.

This model has been highly success-

ful in delivering other important fire, rescue and emergency medical training in Manitoba and will ensure the TWMFR program is available to all departments across the province. The TWMFR course is designed to:

- improve short-term performance and long-term mental health outcomes.
- reduce barriers and encourage access to care,
- provide tools to manage and support employees experiencing a mental illness, and
- support supervisors in maintaining their own mental health.

"The mental well-being and resilience of our members has been identified as a priority by the Canadian

Association of Fire Chiefs," said Brad Yochim, fire chief of the Wallace and District Fire Department and president of MAFC.

"By making the TWMFR program available to all members of the Manitoba Fire Service, we will build on the strength of the existing Critical Incident Stress Management Network already in place to support our members. We look forward to working with the MESC on the development of this instructor network and the delivery of this training to our members."



How God changed everything. We talked about the gospel. About how Jesus died so we could have new life. God moved on this man's heart. He made a big decision.

I didn't plan this. My goal was to help a girl in trouble. God did so much more. He worked a miracle. Today we have a new brother in the Lord. A life transformed. Relationship restored. They left together. Holding hands. With Bibles. People on a path to healing. The anger was gone. Replaced with hope. Ephesians 3 says God does "exceedingly abundantly more than we can ask or imagine." I believe it.

Did God save a life in Winnipeg this week? I think so. Will God save a life in Stonewall? That depends. Are you willing to consider knowing Jesus or making Him known?

Municipal Act are in place for a reason, to create transparency, and those rules need to be followed regardless of how much was or was not spent.

"It's not about cost; it's about morals," Ledarney said to

"I believe in rules. ... If someone breaks the law, we don't not prosecute that person based on cost. This is worth pursuing.

"If there is an error, it is built into the law to re-file, and during the entire period before re-filing, an elected official can seek advice from the province or someone who has experience. But when you re-file, it should be correct. It was not correct, and it was late," he said.

Some of the mayor's supporters attended the meeting and became displeased, with one woman in attendance voicing her opinion quite audibly.

"This is so stupid," she said loudly, while shaking her head.

Teulon seeking legal advice

But it seems the Province of Manitoba's Ministry of Municipal Relations is re-iterating the legislation to the letter. In a February letter to the CAO, Municipal Servic-

es officer Wendy Wolfe alluded to what's coming.

"The council of a municipality, or any person, may apply to the Courts if they believe an offence has occurred. A council or person should consult their legal counsel before pursuing such an action," says Wolfe via email.

"Also, we would advise that section 93.16 (2) forfeiture of seat on council applies when a candidate does not file an election finance statement."

At its March 12 meeting, Teulon council voted in favour of seeking legal advice on the matter, with the vote coming in 3-2. Councillors Ledarney, Hutchinson and Girardin voted in favour of seeking legal counsel, while Mayor Kozyra and Coun. Mankewich voted against the

Though, Coun. Ledarney wouldn't go as far as to say the mayor acted maliciously or had conscious disregard for campaign election rules.

"I'll leave that up to a court, if it gets that far, to make that determination," says Ledarney. "I believe there is enough here that warrants obtaining a legal opinion."

Coun. Mankewich asked the cost of the municipality seeking a legal opinion be made public.


Stony Mountain skaters were a spectacle of colour







