Disabled actors shine in basketball comedy 'Champions'

The new comedy Champions stars Woody Harrelson and Kaitlin Olson, but the veteran actors have tough competition for the spotlight with some charismatic newcomers.

Harrelson plays a college basketball coach with a bad temper who's facing jail time or community service for some bad behaviour. To avoid punishment, he finds himself coaching a basketball team of young adults with intellectual disabilities, who help him rediscover the joy of the game.

Harrelson's agent and another producer wanted to remake the original film, called Campeones — Spain's biggest box-office hit in 2018 — and thought the actor and basketball lover would be a great fit. Harrelson loved the story and signed on as star and executive producer, and tapped his longtime friend Bobby Farrelly to di-

Casting was challenging as the producers wanted the athletes played by disabled actors, who also needed basketball skills. They auditioned hundreds of people before finding the 10 standout personalities who make up the Friends basketball team.

Harrelson says he wasn't sure what to expect on the first day of shooting. "Once I came in and met everybody and we started at it, I was like, 'Oh, this is going to be so much fun!' And it really was," Harrelson told the Associated Press. "They taught me that they can nail the lines, no problem. But also they just taught me, just the great fluidity of being who they are."

The 10 actors have different intellectual challenges but many found their comedy chops on screen.

"Everybody brought something so unique and different to it," Olson said. "And parts of their actual personalities shone through, which is probably why they ... got the role in the first place. There was a lot... of wonderful acting, but there's also a lot of wonderful just being themselves, and it gave us an opportunity to just play off of that."

The film was a chance for Harrelson to collaborate again with Farrelly after making the bowling comedy Kingpin in 1996. The director said he thinks audiences are more open to disabled actors on screen and seeing their stories. He recalled making the 2005 movie The Ringer with his brother, Pete Farrelly, where Johnny Knoxville infiltrated the Special Olympics. Farrelly said they cast nondisabled actors in disabled roles back then.

"We would never do that nowadays so the world has changed in that regard," Farrelly said. "We played that a lot broader. It was... much more of a kind of a goofy comedy. This one here, it's set in reality. These are all very real people. Before, we didn't think anything of it. It was just what people were doing. Dustin Hoffman played Rain Man, you know? But nowadays I think we've come to realize that disabled actors have a hard time getting roles ... so the parts that that they do have in the Hollywood world, it should go to them."

Some of the actors playing the Friends team members attended the film's New York premiere last week and for many it was their first time on a red carpet. James Day Keith, a

Teulon XC Ski Club members celebrate 40 years

On Saturday, March 11, Teulon Cross Country (XC) Ski Club members gathered to celebrate the club's 40th anniversary.

In 1983, club founder John Blackwood recognized a need for self-propelled, outdoor winter recreation opportunities and started a learn-toski program at Teulon Elementary School. This sparked the imagination of community members, and the club quickly expanded to the forest surrounding Ross Creek south of Teulon.

"The early years were exciting and a ton of work for a small group of volunteers," said Blackwood. "We created a trail system from scratch along the creek on both sides of Highway 7, meaning we skied through the giant culvert under the road."

Keeping that pinch point skiable proved too labour-intensive, so the club only maintained trails on the west side. Current trails are groomed for both classic and skate skiing and offer terrain for all levels of skiers. There are flats and small man-made hills for beginners and technical creek valley slopes and turns for experts. First-time visitors to the trails often

comment pleasantly about the quality of the trail system and grooming and that they didn't realize there were such lovely hills in this part of the In-

"Early on we adopted the philosophy that providing an opportunity for people to ski was important to both individual and community health," said Blackwood. "That's why we incorporated Jackrabbits, a national youth ski program, into club offerings from the get-go to help get kids hooked."

These efforts allowed the club to grow over 40 years, and while the Jackrabbits program was put on hold during the pandemic lockdown years, the club is as vibrant as ever. Current membership exceeds 130 people, and the club estimates an additional 300plus drop-in skiers visit the trails annually between school groups, other clubs, and individuals looking for a new skiing experience. Visitors come from across the Interlake, throughout Manitoba and as far as the Yukon. The club has also hosted many ski events, ranging from qualifiers for several Manitoba winter games to a Skiathlon. Meanwhile, club members have

represented the Interlake region in MB Races and other provincial or national level events such as the Canadian Birkebeiner and Canadian Ski Marathon. And two members even wore their Teulon XC toques while skiing internationally along the Russian border with Finland.

It was against

this historical backdrop that club members celebrated their major milestone. The event was multi-generational, with several founding members present, plus early Jackrabbit "kids" who are now parents skiing with their children. Banners waved in the wind while leading skiers away to a scavenger hunt, which had them searching for caches of tickets that they submitted at the chalet for a chance to win prizes ranging from toques and water bottles to gift cards for local businesses. And outside the chalet, a bonfire welcomed skiers to sit down, chat, and roast hotdogs and marshmallows for lunch. The day culminated in a cake-cutting ceremony honouring the efforts of members past and present and all the benefits derived from a lifestyle that includes

In wrap-up thoughts, Blackwood shared that "Skiing is a family activity and allows people to connect from across the country. We are lucky to have such a great club that brings us together."

Forty years as a club is only possible with tremendous community support. The Teulon XC Ski Club ex-

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Province approves dropping exam requirements for internationally educated doctors

The provincial government made changes to medical regulations that will speed up the process of hiring internationally educated doctors.

The government approved regulatory changes to the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Manitoba (CPSM) General Regulation in order to facilitate international doctors' entry into Manitoba's medical system.

The changes entail the removal of a requirement for internationally educated physicians to pass the Medical Council of Canada Qualifying Exam Part 1 (MCCQE1) before registering and practising in Manitoba. The MC-CQE1 assesses medical knowledge and clinical decision-making ability.

"We are leaving no stone unturned to strengthen our health system for Manitobans," said health minister Audrey Gordon in a March 10 news release. "We worked with the governing body of physicians in Manitoba to streamline the path, reduce barriers

and enable internationally trained physicians to provide care sooner in alignment with our government's \$200-million Health Human Resource Action Plan."

The province has an acute shortage of physicians and other health-care providers that has resulted in delays for patients in accessing care in certain health areas. According to Doctors Manitoba, which advocates for physicians, Manitoba has one of the biggest physician shortages in Canada and the shortage could become much worse if steps aren't taken to expand medical training, retain doctors in rural areas, reduce their administrative burdens and implement mental health supports to help with burnout, among other measures.

The MCCQE1 exam was "holding back" many qualified, internationally trained physicians from coming to Manitoba, said College of Physicians and Surgeons' registrar Dr. Anna Ziomek in the March 10 news release.

Ziomek said it was necessary to take steps to eliminate barriers to assessment "without compromising quality and patient safety."

A spokesperson for the department of health said the MCCQE1 is a national academic exam that tests medical knowledge and decision-making "at the end of medical school and is not practice based; therefore, there was a concern it was holding back some physicians because the exam tests knowledge that is unrelated to the physicians' area of specialty."

Alberta and New Brunswick have already removed requirements for the MCCQE1, said the spokesperson.

The dropping of the exam should not compromise safety, and medical candidates are required to have criminal record checks and abuse registry checks. There are also safeguards in place including practice-ready assessment and practice under supervision.

"Internationally educated physicians are required to have a practice-ready assessment and monitoring of their clinical knowledge and skills in practice over a 3-to-12-month period in practice," said the spokes-

According to the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Manitoba, the practice ready assessment and monitoring of clinical skill and knowledge is a "more appropriate requirement for assessment of required competencies," said the spokesperson. The CPSM decided that the requirement to pass the general academic exam "could be safely removed while still maintaining the integrity of the licensing requirements and ensuring physicians are qualified and competent to safely practice medicine."

The spokesperson said the college can answer the question of how much sooner internationally trained doctors can practise in Manitoba now that they don't have to take the MCCQE1



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COVID numbers hold steady in early March

COVID numbers remain steady in early March, according to the provincial government's respiratory surveillance report for the period March 5-11 (reporting Week 10).

There were 130 new infections detected by PCR testing, a decrease from the 150 new infections reported the previous week and the 124 reported the week before that.

COVID infection data in the surveillance reports are underestimates of the true number of infections because the government restricts access to PCR testing. Rapid antigen tests aren't tracked.

There were 59 new COVID hospitalizations, a decrease from the 75 new hospitalizations reported the previous week and the 65 reported the week before that. Of those 59 new hospitalizations, nine people required intervention in the intensive care unit. The numbers are derived from differences in total severe outcomes between the current and the previous week's report.

The government no longer lists in its surveillance reports the names of personal care homes and hospitals experiencing COVID outbreaks.

There were four deaths from COVID reported in Week 10. There were two deaths reported in Week 9.

Manitoba's COVID death toll was 2,466 as of March 4, according to the federal government's COVID webpage, and Canada's death toll now stands at 51,624.

The Week 10 surveillance report says wastewater data for Winnipeg and Brandon up to March 7 indicates sustained COVID activity.

There were eight new cases of influenza A and two new cases of influenza B reported in Week 10, along with zero hospitalizations and zero deaths. There were two influenza A cases and one influenza B case reported the previous week, as well as 20 new hospitalizations and one death.

There were 40 new respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) cases in the Week 10 report. The Week 9 report did not provide RSV numbers the day it was released. There were 56 new RSV cases reported in Week 8.

Other health news:

The Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority declared on March 13 a COVID outbreak at the Sunnywood Personal Care Home in Pine Falls. The COVID outbreak at Gimli hospital declared on March 10 and the COVID outbreak at the Rosewood PCH in Stonewall declared on March 1 continue, according to the IERHA's outbreak page (viewed March 18).

- The World Health Organization's epidemiological update published March 16 shows there were almost 1.4 million new cases of COVID reported worldwide between the period Feb. 13 and March 12, as well as 28,000 new deaths. Deaths recorded since the start of the pandemic now stand at 6.8 million.
- Doctors Manitoba, which advocates for physicians, welcomed the findings of a federal government standing committee investigating the health-care staffing crisis across the country. The committee's report offers recommendations to help address staffing shortages.

"While Manitoba has one of the biggest physician shortages in Cana-

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da, it is an issue in all provinces and so seeing national leading practices to address this critical issue is very valuable," said Doctors Manitoba president Dr. Candace Bradshaw in a March 15 news release. "The shortage of doctors, along with other health care workers, is having an impact on all aspects of patient care, from hospitals to community practices, from urban to rural and Northern communities. There is no path forward to improving health care without addressing these shortages."

Manitoba has a "record-high physician shortage," she said, and nearly half of the province's physicians are planning to retire, reduce clinical hours or leave Manitoba if nothing changes.

The recommendations in the federal report echo those Doctors Manitoba already provided to the Manitoba government. They include expanding medical training, increasing medical residency spaces for international graduates, reducing physician administrative burdens and providing mental health supports to healthcare

What needs to be addressed as well in Manitoba is recruitment and retention in rural and northern parts of the province, says Doctors Manitoba. The province's health and human resources plan was announced last November with some actions to support physician recruitment and retention, but the initiatives "offering the most immediate relief and support to retaining physicians remain in limbo."



Reminder that ice is unpredictable and potentially unsafe

Lifesaving Society Manitoba, together with the Winnipeg Police Service and the Winnipeg Fire Paramedic Service, is recommending everyone stay off frozen bodies of water. Ice in Southern Manitoba is now unpredictable and potentially unsafe.

"If you do choose to go on the ice, then you need to plan ahead and be prepared to go through the ice and into cold water," says Lifesaving Society executive director Stacey

The Forks has closed the Nestaweya River Trail for the

"We're seeing more open water across the city and more people near our waterways in Winnipeg," says river patrol officer Ray Duma of the Winnipeg Police Service. "All rivers, streams, retention ponds and ditches should be avoided. Conditions can change quickly due to weather, especially when it is warm or after a snowfall. As always, we ask the community to be water smart and stay safe."

The Winnipeg Fire Paramedic Service responds to approximately 150 water and ice rescue calls annually, said fire-paramedic Chief Christian Schmidt.

"By venturing onto the ice, you are not only putting yourself at risk, but also the first responders who are called out to perform high-risk rescues," Schmidt said.

The Winnipeg Fire Paramedic Service would like to re-

mind you:

- Conditions can change rapid-
- Thin ice conditions are present on all waterways, including drainage ditches, culverts, streams, creeks, retention ponds and rivers. In addition, all skating ponds and outdoor rinks should be closed for the season.
- We encourage parents and teachers to speak to children and students about the dangers of waterways, thin ice and the need to stay away from the banks of any waterways.
- If you spot someone on the ice or in the water, you should call 911 and have a detailed description of where you are and what you see. Do not enter the water. Stay on scene to direct first responders.
- Dog owners should keep their pets leashed while close to waterways so they cannot chase waterfowl or other animals onto the ice.

Lifesaving Society Manitoba's Drowning Reports show drowning can occur at any time of the year. In fact, one third of all drownings in Manitoba occur during the colder months between October and April. Many of these drownings occur on ice and involve recreational snowmobiling.

Teulon school traffic concerns discussed at council

At the March 14 meeting, Teulon council directed chief administrative officer Andrew Glassco to contact the Interlake School Division to discuss traffic and parking concerns at Teulon schools and to come up with potential solutions. A story covering the issue will be published on March 29.

Council approved the closure of the back lane from 1st Avenue S.E., north to the library, on Friday, June 2 from 2 to 10 p.m. for the Night Market. The town will provide barricades and four picnic tables at no cost to the organizers. The organizers must ensure that such barricades remain in place for the complete duration of the event.

The town council has recognized the need for a personal care home in the region. They have been working with other regional partners since 2017 to develop a new regional personal care home in Stonewall. Support from the provincial government is vital to this project. Council will write a letter of intent to the minister of Seniors and Long-term Care, indicating the town's ongoing commitment to the

project. This motion was defeated. In other council news:

- Accounts payable cheques from cheque #23833 to #23916 in the amount of \$214,804.92. Staff payroll dated March 3 in the amount of \$13,103.75, was approved as paid. Staff payroll dated March 17 in the amount of \$11, 807.84 to be approved for payment.
- Council approved council indemnities dated March 10 in the amount of \$2,090.72.
- Fire department payroll dated March 15 in the amount of \$4,675.70, approve for payment.
- Council will provide a letter of support to Green Acres Art Centre (GAAC) to aide in their application for the Red River Mutual Grant for park improvements. The council has directed the administration to prepare the letter of support and that the CAO sign it.
- A request for the council to waive the facility rental for the Teulon-Rockwood Čentennial Hall was defeated.

Officers arrived at the scene and approached the vehicle. The three occupants initially refused to exit the vehicle; however, after a short time they did exit the vehicle and were arrested.

All three adults were taken to hospital with minor injuries.

A search of the vehicle resulted in the seizure of approximately 100 grams of methamphetamine, a loaded firearm with the serial number filed off, brass knuckles, a knife and bear spray.

Two adults were released with no charges.

The driver of the vehicle, Eric Moar, 28, from the RM of Rockwood has been charged with:

- Flight from Police
- Dangerous Operation of a Motor Vehicle Causing Bodily Harm x2
- Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking
- Weapons Possession Contrary to Order x3
- Possession of a Firearm when knowing Possession is Unauthorized
- Possession of Weapon for a Dangerous Purpose
- Unsafe Storage of Firearms
- Carrying a Concealed Weapon He was remanded into custody.

Stonewall RCMP continue to investigate.



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Stonewall council news in brief

Stonewall council is mulling over a request regarding a conditionally approved subdivision that seeks more than 40 variances to site width and area.

Global Homes Ltd. is seeking council's approval to vary the minimum site width and site area for 30 proposed single-family residential lots.

Company owner Bernhard Goertzen and consultant John Wintrup spoke to council about the subdivision that would extend 8th and 9th Avenue South, featuring 48-foot-wide lots.

"I think this is going to be a development that will attract a lot of families and people," Wintrup said.

Several members of the public voiced concerns during a public hearing on March 15. These concerns included the possibility that smaller lots might detract from Stonewall's small-town feel and that large houses might dwarf the size of the lots. Other concerns focused on issues related to property value and environmental impacts.

Council conditionally approved the proposed subdivision on Aug. 17, 2022, followed by conditional approval from the SIPD board on Aug. 29.

South Interlake Planning District noted that it's a high number of vari-

ances for a single project. However, SIPD had no significant concerns with the variance application.

"Council's conditional approval of this subdivision suggests that the Town of Stonewall is accepting of reduced residential lot sizes, at least in certain areas of Stonewall, to accommodate a wider variety of housing needs," states SIPD's report to council.


"If this is the case, the SIPD recommends that the Town of Stonewall council consider updating their zoning bylaw to enable smaller-sized lots ... which would eliminate the need for numerous variances on similar projects in the future."

The topic will come back to council at the April 5 meeting.

In other council news:

- Council gave first reading to a special services levy bylaw to establish a rate for waste and recyclable curbside collection, removal and disposal services on all residential and institutional properties within town limits for 2023 and 2024. A public hearing is scheduled for March 29 at 6 p.m. at town hall. More information is available on the Town of Stonewall website at www.stonewall.ca.

tions for tree removal and tree planting on private and public spaces within town limits.

- Council adopted the zero-tolerance abuse and molestation policy.
- Council adopted a municipal tendering and procurement policy to

establish guidelines for goods and services and for construction projects undertaken by the municipality. The policy also includes guidelines for the sale of municipal capital assets.

Woodlands council approves spring road weight restrictions

At the March 14 meeting, Woodlands council imposed a 65 per cent spring weight restriction to protect streets from excessive damage during spring thaw conditions.

These restrictions are put in place every year during this time until the end of May and align with the dates brought into effect by Manitoba Infrastructure. The restrictions will affect the weight vehicles carry when travelling through the following roads: Local Urban District of Warren, with the exception of Hanlan Street, Mac-Donald Avenue, William Avenue, Coolidge Drive, Railway Avenue and Ed Peltz Drive, and the Village of Woodlands, with the exception of Main Street. The restriction is in accordance with Section 90 of the Highwav Traffic Act.

A variance application submitted by Matthew Stanley was received to alter the side-yard setback on the southern property line from 10 feet to six feet. Nicole Turner and Stanley own the land at 5 Manness Dr. in Warren. The property to be varied is zoned "RG" Residential General in the RM of Woodlands' Zoning By-law 2648/14, which requires a minimum side-yard setback of 10 feet for a dwelling unit. The municipality held a public hearing on March 14 to receive representations from Stanley or any other person. The council of the RM of Woodlands approved the variation, subject to the following conditions:

- 1. This approval shall expire unless acted upon within 12 months, as per section 101(1) of the Planning Act.
- 2. The building must be a minimum of 10′ from all other buildings, including those on neighbouring properties.
- 3. Once construction has been completed, a building location certificate will be required to show it complies with variance approval.

In other council news:

- The council of the RM of Woodlands has established a temporary committee to discuss the Woodlands Pedestrian Network. The following have been appointed to the committee: Lorna Broadfoot as chair, Bryan Myskiw, Reeve Douglas Oliver and community members. The RM has also established a committee for the Warren Pedestrian Network. The members are as follows: Reeve Douglas Oliver as chair, Carl Fleury, LUD members and community members.
- Council accepted the quote for grader blades from DionCo Sales and Service Ltd. in the amount of \$29,698.94, including taxes.
- The committee of the whole meeting on April 4, 2023, will be cancelled as it conflicts with the AMM conference.
- The RM of Woodlands council adopted POL-002 REV-E a revised dust control policy for the upcoming

season.

- Council sets an annual rate and application deadline for the dust control program. For 2023, the council has set the rate at \$330 plus applicable taxes for a 16-foot by 300-foot area. The deadline for applications is May 19, 2023. In addition, council has accepted the quote from Fort Distributors at 0.38/litre plus applicable taxes.
- Council has established a temporary committee to prepare for the request for proposals for columbarium bases. The committee members are Carl Fleury as chair and Reeve Douglas Oliver.
- The RM of Woodlands council has approved a rental agreement for the Warren multi-purpose building. The rental rate is \$100 per day with a \$50 cleaning fee. Renters must complete the "application for rental of municipal multi-purpose building" form to use the space. The Warren Lions group is exempt from the rental fee.







Woodlands council approves Warren subdivision

Selkirk Community Planning fully approved a six-lot subdivision for Warren and awarded the certificate of approval on Tuesday, March 14.

Before receiving full approval, a development agreement was signed with the RM of Woodlands on March 7 for conditional approval before moving to the final stage.

The subdivision is an extension of the Poplarwood Drive lots and begins at the north end of Poplarwood Drive and east of Hanlan Street in Warren.

Darren Minaker's Silver Bridge Land Development company bought the lots from Cliff Riddell, who sold them for the Warren subdivision.

The lots are all 75 feet wide by 200 feet deep and will be fully serviced.

Five lots are available now for single-family home construction, while the sixth lot, will be available possibly in the near future, depending on direction from council.

Council has some concerns about drainage at the north end of Warren. Due to these concerns, they have decided to restrict building on the sixth lot in that development for the time being in case it needs to be used for water retention down the road.

"In the future, the intent is that the drainage issues in that area will be corrected or will be improved so that at some point, that will become a buildable lot," said CAO Kaitlyn Grif-

The council still needs a timeline to start work on improving the drainage system in Warren.

"Being that it's a new council, we kind of have to start looking at the drainage for that area from the ground up again. It will be quite an issue," said Griffith.

If the RM of Woodlands decides in the spring that the sixth lot needs to be used for water retention, it will be excavated to the ditch depth to hold water from the surrounding area.

"As Warren is on very flat land, water movement in Warren has always been an issue. So it is a priority for

the council to look into that and to see what they can do about correcting the drainage issues in that area so that they don't put the rest of Warren at risk of flooding. As to what that corrective action will be, it is hard to say at this point," said Griffith.

Griffith said the council plans to research the issue and investigate the right course of action to rectify the problem. But, at this time, there is no specific timeline as to when Minaker's company could use the sixth lot for construction purposes.

Presales of the lots are being accepted now. House construction may begin as early as May 1, 2023.

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CentrePort Canada Rail Park receives \$18 million in federal funds

CentrePort is on the right track to improve the nation's supply chain by bolstering connectivity through its rail park.

On Wednesday, March 15, federal Transport Minister Omar Alghabra visited 4Tracks Ltd. in Rosser to announce an investment of up to \$18 million towards building the 665-acre rail park at CentrePort through the National Trade Corridors Fund.

CentrePort Canada Rail Park is currently in development by Canadian company Focus Equities Inc., which will cover the remainder of the \$36-million portion of costs that qualified for funding.

The project aims to improve the movement of goods between different modes of transportation, including rail, truck and air.

"I know there's been a lot of people working on this vision for years. To-day marks a significant milestone in this vision and in this development. This location is a critical hub in a strong supply chain, and that's something Canadian exporters rely on," Alghabra said.

"Of course, we know that the lingering effects of the pandemic, climate impacts and global events have affected that supply chain, which is why our government is working hard to strengthen it. We know that a strong supply chain contributes to grow an economy that works for all Canadians while making life more affordable for its citizens."

The federal funds will go towards a second mainline switch, a lift station, several kilometres of additional track, and connections to access roads under Phase 1 of the three-phase development.

"Not only will this project create well-paying jobs in the region, it will make it easier to move goods between the different modes of transportation; for, instance from rail to truck or from air to rail," Alghabra said.

"The technical term for this is improved intermodal connectivity, but it's really about making a supply chain more fluid, more adaptable and more easily able to get goods from Point A to Point B."

The benefits will extend beyond the local community to bring positive impacts across the country.

"This project has potential to bring significant economic benefits to Manitoba and even greater benefits to the country's supply chain. The project will also reduce emissions, and by cutting down on the number of trips by truck, it will help address congestion on interprovincial highways and at the U.S. border. That's a win-win-

win," he said.

"The quality of our transportation infrastructure and the efficiency of our trade corridors are crucial to Canada's economic success. By increasing the capacity of what is already a major transportation gateway close to rail lines, close to the airport and major roads, we are supporting the flow of goods across the country, creating good jobs for middle-class Canadians and making life more affordable for all Canadians."

The vision is for CentrePort Canada Rail Park to become a nexus where air, rail and roads intersect, he added.

"I think the economic opportunities are significant," Alghabra said. "This is only Phase 1 of a broad vision."

Rosser Reeve Ken Mulligan reflected on the importance of the announcement to the local municipality.

"The Government of Canada announcement shows us the commitment from all levels of government to the CentrePort Canada Rail Park. To me, this highlights the magnitude of a rail park by Focus Equities — not only for Rosser but for the region, the province and on supply chains across the country," Mulligan said.

"I still have people commenting to me and wondering if the 665 acres of land the Province of Manitoba has held for years in Rosser will ever actually be a rail park. This announcement is another key step in the construction of Phase 1. The rail park is real, and we look forward to working with Focus on Phase 1 and on future phases."

A development of this magnitude will provide employment opportunities for Rosser residents, as well as for all regional communities, he added.

"Local businesses and our local quarry operation should also be able to see economic benefits from both the construction of the rail park and the operations that will come to the rail park," Mulligan said.

"And, of course, Rosser as a whole will benefit from the taxation revenue, which comes from this level of development. We have to remind ourselves, in 2006 Rosser's total assessment was \$230 million. With the growth in CentrePort being the main driver, Rosser's total assessment has already reached \$1.2 billion — and the rail park is just getting started."


At the same time, Mulligan highlighted the collaborative approach to the project.

"Rosser has been working very well with Focus Equities on this initiative. I am excited by the early dialogue that Focus has approached us on regarding how they see themselves playing a role in supporting our community,"

he said.

"I have no doubt Focus Equities will have a great impact on our community as a whole."

Kevin Lamoureux, member of Parliament for Winnipeg North, also stressed the importance of the initiative.

"I think the consensus, no matter what level of government you're from, is that CentrePort is such an important part of Manitoba's future," he said.

Terry Duguid, member of Parliament for Winnipeg South, said he's excited to see these important upgrades coming to CentrePort Canada Rail Park.

"This new infrastructure will be a major boost to the operations here at CentrePort," he said.

"Not only will this funding help to

sustain CentrePort as one of North America's largest and most important inland ports for decades to come, it will be a major economic boost to our province, bringing plenty of high-quality jobs and increased tax revenue."

CentrePort has major partners from various industrial sectors, including Boeing, MacDon, Paterson Global Foods, Bison Transport and more, he added.

"Thank you to our elected officials from Rosser and other communities,"

WCI launches Burpees for Barbells fundraiser

Students in a new fitness-focused course are embarking on a challenge that raises money for more equip-

Warren Collegiate Institute introduced a brand new exercise science class this year, led by teacher Amber Oughton.

"We have 16 kiddos in the class, who work out with me in the gym three times a week and are in class the other two days. During class, students learn things like how to fuel their bodies with nutrient-dense foods, what supplements are safe to use, as well as biometrics and intro kinesiology topics," she said.

"Our goal during workouts is to increase strength, endurance, agility and overall fitness. We are hoping to increase the variety of dumbbells we have available. We don't have enough for everyone this year and often have to share sets. We are hoping to also add barbell options for many of the exercises in the future."

In an effort to increase the equipment available to students, Oughton came up with a creative fundraising idea called "Burpees for Barbells."

"For every dollar we raise, a student will complete a burpee. So if we raise \$1,000, we will evenly distribute the

burpees amongst our class — myself included," she said.

"As an extra fun incentive to get other students to donate, we are including a nomination part of our fundraising form. If you want to see a specific student complete all of the burpees for the amount you donate, you can check their name off. Some students may have a lot more burpees to complete than others."

For those who aren't familiar with burpees, Oughton offers an explana-

"A chest-to-floor burpee to a specific type of burpee done in Crossfit-style workouts," she said.

"You start by standing, then reach your hands to the floor, jump back, lower your full body to the floor. Then you lift your body back off the floor, jump your feet back in towards your hands, stand up and jump with your arms above your head."

Overall, the fundraising goal is \$5,000, but Oughton acknowledges it might take a few years to reach this amount.

"I thought of the fundraiser after seeing such high interest in the class but not enough equipment to support all those who wanted to take the course. We had to cap the course numbers because of limited equipment available

to use," she said.

'We really need the community's help for this. Our long-term goal is to raise \$5,000, although we realize this may take a few years. This will buy us the dumb-bells, barbells and rubber plates that we need."

Stonewall's Fines leads **Niverville into MJHL playoffs**

Stonewall's Chris Fines has led the MJHL expansion Niverville Nighthawks to the playoffs in the club's inaugural season.

The 20-year-old 6'3" Fines was born in Winnipeg but grew up playing in Stonewall. He started hockey at the early age of five and was a player until he decided to make the full-time switch to goalie at 12 years old.

It turned out to be a good decision as Fines became a fixture in goal for the Interlake Lightning's AAA program, playing for their U15, U17 and U18 teams.

Fines progressed to playing Junior A hockey, where he spent the past two seasons in the MJHL with the Portage Terriers.

Last offseason, he was dealt to the Niverville Nighthawks to become the team's starting goaltender in their inaugural season. In this 2022-23 campaign, Fines holds a record of 14-17-0 with 3.48 goals against average and a .898 save percentage.

"The Town of Niverville and the entire Nighthawks' organization has been so welcoming to myself and all of my teammates," said Fines. "This has been an incredibly fun season, and I don't want it to end."

"Fines has been unbelievable for us this season," added Niverville Nighthawks head coach Kelvin Cech. "He's been our guy and the backbone of this team, and we're so thrilled to have him back there stopping pucks for us."

The Nighthawks clinched a playoff spot last Thursday after defeating the league-leading Portage Terriers 3-2 in a shootout.

"I feel confident in my game right now," said Fines. "Especially if the guys play as they did in front of me against Portage. We have the mentality right now that we can beat anyone."

The MJHL playoffs begin this week, and the Nighthawks will take on the Portage Terriers in the quarterfinals. The best-of-seven series begins on March 24 with Game 1 in Portage, with the teams meeting up again the following night back in Niverville for Game 2.

"Everyone is very excited to head into the playoffs," said Fines. "It is my first time and many of ours. We feel we can do some damage if we bring the same energy we brought tonight. And I can't wait to see the crowd that the Town of Niverville produces all playoffs long."

Team Einarson bounces back with a last-end steal to win at world women's

Gimli's Kerri Einarson is representing Team Canada at the 2023 World Women's Curling Championship this week in Sandviken, Sweden, and as of Monday night, her team was sitting in sole possession of second place with a 4-1 record.

The four-time Scotties champ Einarson and her rink of Val Sweeting, Shannon Birchard and Briane Harris, are making their third appearance at the Women's World Championships. They have yet to win the Worlds, as the best they have done previously at their two appearances was a bronze medal in 2022.

"Our number one goal is to bring gold back to Canada," said Kerri Einarson. "We have some unfinished business to take care of."

Einarson had won their fourth consecutive Scotties Tournament of Hearts with a 9-5 victory over long-time provincial rival Jennifer Jones in the championship final on Feb. 26 in Kamloops, B.C.

That win earned Einarson the honour of once again representing Canada on the world stage.

The format for this year's World Championship features a full thirteen-team round robin. The top six teams will then qualify for the playoff round and play down to a gold medal and bronze medal game.

Einarson's top competition at the World Championship will be Sweden's Anna Hasselborg, Switzerland's Silvana Tirinzoni and Japan's Satsuki Fujisawa.

Other entrants at the World Championships are Denmark's Madeleine Dupont, Germany's Daniela Jentsch, Italy's Stefania Constantini, New Zealand's Jessica Smith, Norway's Kristin Skaslien, Scotland's Rebecca Mor-

rison, South Korea's Ha Seung-Youn, Turkey's Dilsat Yildiz and the United States' Tabitha Peterson.

The action started on March 18 with the finals taking place on March 26.

All Canada's Team Kerri Einarson could do twice on Sunday was watch its opponents throw the decisive last shot of the game.

While it resulted in a loss earlier in the day, Canada rebounded with a win during the evening draw at the 2023 LGT World Women's Curling Championship, presented by New Holland, in Sandviken, Sweden, at Goeransson Arena.

Tied 6-6 and without hammer, skip Einarson, vice-skip Val Sweeting, second Shannon Birchard and lead Briane Harris made a perfect tap back to count one and left the two Canadian rocks lined up nicely to make for a difficult double takeout. Norway's Team Marianne Roervik missed and Canada stole three to win the game.

Canada, backed by alternate Krysten Karwacki, coach Reid Carruthers and national coach Renée Sonnenberg, were in a similar situation earlier in the day against the United States, but the Americans made the shot for the win.

"Ideally, we want to be throwing that last one and have control, but both games today were super tight. Sometimes they're going to make it and sometimes they're not. All we can do is force them into the toughest shot possible and that's what happened today," said Sweeting. "The competition is so tight out there that a little half shot here and there can make a big difference."

Sweeting said the game against Norway was much more on-brand for the Canadians. Canada took advantage of some Norwegian misses and grew

its lead to 5-2, including a steal of one in the fourth end.

Norway chipped away at Canada's margin and took a 6-5 lead after eight ends of play. Canada had an opportunity to score as many as three in the ninth but was forced to a single. That left Team Einarson in a position of once again needing to steal away a victory.

"I thought we got off to a better start and had a good handle on the ice. We just coughed up a couple of steals, but that's going to happen because they were tough shots. Overall, it was a better game and Kerri made a pistol on the last one to line it up like that. We never gave up and we kept plugging away. Lots of games are going back and forth out there and you never know what will happen in the end," Sweeting said.

After a pair of exciting games on Sunday, Canada got back to basics with a win against Italy on Monday morning.

Team Einarson bested Italy's Team Stefania Constantini 7-2 at Goeransson Arena.

Later that night, the Gimli team improved to 4-1 following a 9-8 win against Scotland's Team Rebecca Morrison (1-4) at Goeransson Arena.


