SAMS will receive \$150,000 grant

Local communities are driving towards a greener future, with help from a provincial government grant to reduce carbon emissions.

The provincial government is providing \$1.5 million in grants through its Conservation and Climate Fund, which supports projects of non-profits, education institutes, municipalities and northern communities that protect the environment and boost a green economy.

Locally, Stonewall and Area Mo-

bility Services (SAMS) will receive \$150,000 towards electrifying its fleet and infrastructure.

SAMS provides door-to-door transportation to seniors and residents with mobility concerns. The service is available to anyone who uses a wheelchair or mobility aid, lives with a cognitive disability, or has a visual, physical or hearing impairment to the extent that they can't operate a vehicle.

At a July 28 announcement at Stonewall Quarry Park, Mayor Sandra Smith said the funding will allow the mobility service to move away from carbon-based buses to electric vehicles, which will save money while reducing the environmental footprint. "The Stonewall and Area Mobility Service, otherwise known as SAMS, serves not only Stonewall but also the RMs of Woodlands, Rosser and Rockwood. This service has been available since the 1980s when it was first run by the RHA (regional health authority), and it has now evolved to a service that is run by four municipalities," she said.

"Many of our residents and organizations rely on this service for things such as medical appointments, employment and social outings. In order to have good service, you need to have a reliable fleet — and when it came time to look at upgrading, the conversation to switch to electric vehicles started."

This project is a true collaboration of four municipalities, which all share a common goal of reducing their environmental footprint, Smith added.

"As we move towards the purchase of electric vehicles, the funding received from the Manitoba government will assist with the installation of charging stations throughout our region. This will ensure reliability and reduce anxiety about 'running out of gas,'" she said.

of transportation for SAMS — and, thanks to the Manitoba government, we will be able to reduce our operating expenses and reduce emissions, which means we are doing our part for the environment while enhancing the financial viability of our operation."

The transition to electric vehicles is not easy for organizations with limited resources like SAMS, she noted, so the funding is a win for the communities, the province and the environment.

Lorna Broadfoot, SAMS board chair and Woodlands deputy reeve, echoed Smith's sentiments.

"Although our board and councils are forward-thinking and supportive," she said, "thanks must also go to SAMS coordinator Dave Underwood and staff who worked towards making this grant a reality."

In another Interlake investments, the City of Selkirk will receive a \$65,500 grant to support energy-efficient furnace upgrades at its transit authority building. In addition, the Lake Winnipeg Foundation will receive \$50,000 to launch a three-year Lake Winnipeg phosphorus data set.

A Rockwood resident hopes to drive forward with a business to sell and store vehicles at a property east of Stony Mountain.

Rockwood council hosted a public hearing on July 12 about the proposed business. Earlier this year, South Interlake Planning District (SIPD) received information about an unauthorized automotive business operating on the property, so they launched an investigation.

SIPD staff found evidence of an unauthorized vehicle sales business in operation. They advised the landowners of the land-use contravention and told them to stop immediately. During a follow-up inspection, SIPD staff found that their concerns had been addressed and the site had been cleaned up.

The landowners are now seeking conditional use approval to operate a car brokerage at the property on Road 73N. The business would mainly focus on the sale, storage and occasional movement of vehicles. The cars and small trucks would be sold after being safetied at the applicant's business, NP Auto Sales & Trucks Ltd. in Winnipeg.

Proposed hours of operation would be 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. daily. They anticipate selling about five or fewer vehicles per month, and the applicant believes there won't be negative impacts on the environment.

The South Interlake Planning District had no significant concerns with the business proposal. Council received one letter of opposition citing traffic issues among other concerns.

Council conditionally approved the request. Conditions include the applicants being limited to selling a maximum of six vehicles on the property at any time. These vehicles must be stored within a designated vehicle storage area that measures approximately 70 by 120 feet and is entirely screened from public view.

In other council news:

• Council authorized the public works department to upgrade the Stony Mountain shop's phone system for an estimated \$6,300 plus tax.

• Council defeated a resolution to install a stop sign for northbound and southbound traffic at the intersection of roads 79N and 2E.

• Council authorized one team to participate in the 4th annual RCMP community golf tournament, which will be hosted by Stonewall-Teulon-Headingley RCMP at Teulon Golf







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Manitoba government invests in crime gun lab to combat firearms violence

The Manitoba government is taking decisive action to address the ongoing threat of firearm-related violence in the province by investing \$5.2 million in a state-of-the-art Crime Gun Lab supporting firearm-related criminal investigations throughout Manitoba, Justice Minister Kelvin Goertzen announced last week.

"By establishing our own Crime Gun Lab, Manitoba will strengthen our existing capabilities to target, investigate and prosecute criminal activities involving gangs, guns and organized crime," said Goertzen.

"The lab will support professional, robust and dedicated investigations into firearms trafficking in Manitoba and enable the comprehensive analysis and archiving of all crime guns within the province, enhance intelligence co-ordination on illegal firearm trafficking, increase the number of firearms investigations and prosecutions, and ultimately reduce the use of illegal firearms and gun violence in the province."

Firearm-related violence continues to pose a significant threat to public safety in Manitoba, with offenders often being associated with gangs and illicit drug operations, leading to a frequent occurrence of violence and loss of life. By investing in crime gun analysis and suppression, which includes the establishment of the Crime Gun Lab, Manitoba aims to adopt a

co-ordinated and strategic approach to respond to firearm violence and mitigate associated risks.

Firearm tracing and ballistic imaging play integral roles in reducing crime gun violence, providing support to police investigations and prosecutions. However, the current process for firearms tracing and ballistic imaging varies among police agencies in Manitoba. While the Winnipeg Police Service has the most efficient process, ballistic leads can still take several days to process. Furthermore, it can take multiple months for the National Forensic Laboratory Service to conduct a forensic examination of ballistic evidence required for court purposes. The real-time co-ordination of firearm and violent crime investigations the Crime Gun Lab will provide to law enforcement will be critical for effective crime gun analysis and suppression, the minister said.

"The Winnipeg Police Service was one of the first police services in Canada to have the capability to directly input ballistic evidence into the Canadian Integrated Ballistics Identification Network. This was a significant step in the expansion of our investigative capabilities and we recognize the value that this can have for all Manitoba police agencies in addressing gun violence," said Insp. Elton Hall, officer in charge of the Organized

Crime Division, Winnipeg Police Service. "The expansion to a provincial firearms laboratory will deliver a full-service examination solution that will provide actionable forensic and investigative intelligence to law enforcement in a timely manner."

We need to continue to do everything we can to keep guns out of the hands of criminals and to ensure they are quickly held to account when they do make the decision to use a firearm to commit a crime," said Insp. Paul Peddle, officer in charge, Central Plains Area for the Manitoba RCMP. "The Crime Gun Lab is an important step forward and the RCMP in Manitoba, and all communities within its jurisdiction, will benefit greatly from this new critical resource.

The Crime Gun Lab will be established an initial investment of \$5.2 million and supported with an annual operating budget of \$3.1 million, the minister noted.

The investment in the Crime Gun Lab by the Department of Justice reflects the province's commitment to combating firearms violence headon, Goertzen said. By bolstering investigative intelligence, enhancing forensic capabilities and facilitating comprehensive firearms analysis, the lab will contribute significantly to reducing gun violence and creating a safer environment for all Manitobans, he added.

ject matters, the Whiteshell.

"One of my favourite things to do is to just carve my way around the shoreline, and when you do that, you can find these magical little clusters of flourishing little species, and they are brimming with life, and they are living without knowing all of the activity in the world. They are just existing peacefully. They quietly bob the water's edge and, after the rain, the colours just burst, and they just seem to be at their finest. That's what I tried to capture there, a joyous little moment I came upon," said Smoley.

The medium that Smoley chooses to work with will depend on the atmosphere she is trying to create. Sometimes she wants texture, and sometimes she wants the brilliance of ink and will work around it with acrylics.

Smoley would consider herself a mixed media artist as she will use inks and sometimes a couple of mediums on the same canvas. She has also used watercolours. A new adventure for Smoley is using oils and cold wax.

When Smoley picks up the brush to start her next piece, she dives into it headfirst without a specific plan.

"I am very intuitive. I really don't have a plan when I do a painting," said Smoley.

Her artwork leans towards natural settings and will zoom in on forests, lakes, areas and plants. However, the more she paints, the more abstract she is starting to become in her design, which can be seen in her painting shown at the art show "After the Rain." In the end, though, Smoley said she always adds nature in some way, even if it's discreet.

When she thinks back on it, she realizes that the tendency to create natural settings in her pieces may come from her background. Her mom was a gardener, and her grandparents had a farm, so growing up, she was always close to nature.

Smoley said she has always had an itch to create. Her family was very creative, and it was encouraged. Her mother and aunt painted, and her father built things.

"It was in the family. It was just part of our day to be creating and inventing," she said.

When Smoley had a family, it changed her creativity and, instead, she was getting creative with her kids, keeping them active, busy and focused instead of investing in her creative pursuits.

Smoley said there was a strong urge to get back into it when they got older and didn't need her anymore.

"It was just screaming at me," she

New childcare spaces coming to Stonewall and Rockwood

New childcare spaces will be opening soon in Headingley and coming to Interlake communities this fall.

The first of eight ready-to-move childcare centres will soon be operating in Headingley, and more are on their way soon. Bright Beginnings Educare will operate the Headingley childcare facility, which will have spaces for 20 infants and 54 preschool-aged children.

The federal and provincial governments are providing more than \$94 million for the two-phase project. Construction costs are fully funded under the Canada-Manitoba Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care Agreement in exchange for land, servicing and free rent space for the childcare operator.

The Headingley facility will be the first to open, followed by similar childcare facilities in Stonewall, East Selkirk, Whitemouth, Oak Bluff, Ile des Chênes, Rosenort and Portage la Prairie in the fall.

After that, Phase 2 of the project will bring facilities to the RMs of Rockwood, Hanover, Taché, Mac-Donald, Sifton, Ritchot, Argyle and Brokenhead, as well as the cities of Dauphin and Morden, the towns of Melita and Morris, plus Lake St. Martin First Nation and Norway House Cree Nation.

During a media event on July 21 at the new Headingley facility, Premier Heather Stefanson announced that the Town of Ste. Anne and the RM of Wallace-Woodworth will also receive new readyto-move childcare centres.

"When complete, both phases of this project will create 1,970 new childcare spaces in 25 rural and First Nation communities right across Manitoba," she said.

Winnipeg North MP Kevin Lamoureux said families in rural communities struggle to access early learning and childcare services, so the federal government is working with provincial, territorial and Indigenous partners to fund innovative solutions.

"We are creating a system that was never just about reducing childcare fees," he said. "It is in fact about growing the economy and so much more."

The goal of the project is to enable the development of childcare facilities in the areas with demonstrated childcare needs, he added.

In Stonewall, the new prefabricated hybrid building will be located at the Veterans Memorial Sports Complex grounds.

Mayor Sandra Smith outlined the benefits of the new addition to the town.

"As a bedroom community, the provision of daycare has a direct impact on our town's success and ability to grow. Insufficient daycare is a bottleneck in the economic activity of our community and, as such, Stonewall is delighted to have been included in the first round of the selection process by the Province of Manitoba to participate in the pilot project delivery method created by JQ Built," Smith said.

"As noted by Premier Heather Stefanson, this is a real game-changer, and I believe it is safe to say that this pilot project has been a real success given the number of communities that have signed on." In Rockwood, the 74-space childcare centre will be built in the second phase of the initiative.

Terry Fox Day recognizes iconic Canadian

While you're enjoying the long weekend that culminates with a civic holiday on Monday, why not take a moment to remember the Canadian icon it's named for?

In Manitoba, the Monday of the August long weekend is called Terry Fox Day in honour of the iconic Canadian who was born in Winnipeg on July 28, 1958.

When he was 18, Terry was diagnosed with osteogenic sarcoma just above the knee, which resulted in the amputation of his leg. After spending time in children's cancer wards, he was determined to end the suffering caused by cancer.

To raise money for cancer research, he embarked on a cross-Canada run that started at the Atlantic Ocean on April 12, 1980. After running 5,373 kilometres, Terry's cancer returned in his lungs on Sept. 1, 1980, and he had to stop midway through his Marathon of Hope.

However, before he died on June 28, 1981, Terry had already achieved his goal of raising the equivalent of \$1 from every Canadian towards cancer research.

That momentum has continued over the decades since the annual Terry Fox Run has raised more than \$850 million for the cause. This year's Stonewall Terry Fox Run is set for Sept. 17. Registration will be from noon to 1 p.m. at the Stonewall Quarry Park Heritage Arts Centre or participants can register online at www.terryfox.org. The run will start at 1 p.m., following a route through town.

Cathy Goresky, a member of the Stonewall Terry Fox committee, said the theme of this year's Terry Fox Run is "Dear Terry."

"Terry ran for us; now we run for him. People wrote to Terry during his Marathon of Hope, and every letter was kept by the Fox family," she said.

"This year, we can write back to Terry and tell him why he has inspired all of us. We have 'Dear Terry' postcards available at our merchandise tables for people to write to Terry. These will be collected and displayed on run day at our registration at the Heritage Arts Centre."

More than 70 people participated in last year's Terry Fox Run in Stonewall, raising \$13,000 in donations the third-highest fundraising total in Manitoba, following Winnipeg and Brandon.

The Stonewall event also raised \$1,380 in merchandise sales last year, which was the second highest in Manitoba and Saskatchewan following Moose Jaw.

Goresky hopes even more people will participate this year in the Stonewall Terry Fox Run.

"We don't have a fundraising goal but hope to spread Terry's message each year. We hope to have more people participate and raise more funds for cancer research," she said.

"The event is open to everyone to walk, bike, run or rollerblade event open. We have even had people participate being pushed in wheelchairs or with walkers. The route is though the streets of town, so it is paved all the way."

On Aug. 25, committee members will set up a booth at Westside Plaza near the post office to collect pledges and sell 2023 Terry Fox Run T-shirts.

"We also hope to set up in other locations prior to the run. Cancer survivors can register to join Terry's Team and receive free survivor T-shirts. We also have yard signs for anyone who would like to place one in their yards or along our run route."

For those who can't make it to the Aug. 25 booth, they can make arrangements to get yard signs, T-shirts and pledge sheets from any Stonewall Terry Fox committee member, including Pat Moldowan, Mary Beck, Holly McAuley, Lil Branscombe, Brenda Bawdon, Allison Murray, Jim Webster and Cathy Goresky.



T-shirts will also be available for purchase on run day. As well, they can be ordered through the Terry Fox Foundation website at www.terryfox. org. If participants register online for the Stonewall run and order shirts, then the local run will get credit for the purchase. Dri-Fit and long-sleeve shirts are also available for purchase online.

"The Stonewall community has been very supportive of the run. The Stonewall Kinsmen will be barbecuing hotdogs for us again this year. The Stonewall Scouts will be running our water table near Lions Manor," Goresky added.

"We are also awaiting confirmation from several other great volunteers."

A play to highlight the importance of mental health awareness

The Winnipeg Fringe Theatre Festival has been influential in bringing the spotlight onto Manitoba's art scene for decades, giving artists complete control over their productions and a safe, celebrated place to receive feedback for their work.

Attendees of the festival have easy access to entertainment in a variety of different live mediums, including comedy, music and theatre.

This year, brought to the stage through hard work, passion and friendship is *A* is for Anxiety Apples, a dramedy made up of a series of vignettes portraying lived experiences of mental illness. The play is written and directed by Kennedy Huckerby, who has collaborated with Elena

Modrzejewski, a long-time friend of the director, was introduced to the script in January and worked with Huckerby and her cast members to prepare the play. Last week, she experienced her debut performance at the Fringe Festival, thanks to her fellow creatives.

"We made the show what it is on account of our friendships," Modrzejewski said. "This show does a really good job of portraying mental health as it exists as a spectrum."

One of the most important things is the play's ability to raise awareness for mental health, something that Modrzejewski believes should be a more prevalent concern in the medical system.

Art like this makes it possible for people to see themselves on the stage and know they're not alone in their struggles, she said.

Modrzejewski grew up in Selkirk and took advantage of every arts program she could in high school. She was in band, acting and choir, all of which helped her realize the importance of community and having creative outlets in all stages of development.

"The artist and educator I'm able to be today was culti-





vated in my high school art programming," she said.

She now works teaching both dance and theatre, known as "Miss Elena," at Teulon's Green Acres Arts Centre as well as the Selkirk Dance Association. Through this, she hopes to give her students that important creative outlet, to strengthen the community and to promote mental wellness.

A is For Anxiety Apples was performed 10 times during Fringe. It received high praise from patrons, who called the show raw, authentic, humorous and thought-provoking.

"We were interested in putting this show on as a standalone, but we thought that we would have more community access as a part of the festival," said Modrzejewski. "Finally getting to share this with an audience is so much better than rehearsal."

The Manitoba government is making changes to the Agricultural Crown Lands (ACL) Leases and Permits Regulation to support improving forage productivity, growing the livestock industry and advancing sustainability after receiving public feedback, Agriculture Minister Derek Johnson announced Monday.

"The Agricultural Crown Lands Program is meant to strengthen the livestock industry, enhance productivity and encourage growth," said Johnson. "At the same time, the ACL Program needs to work for leaseholders and Indigenous Peoples who use these lands for traditional purposes and to exercise treaty rights. After a 45-day public comment period that included Indigenous communities and organizations, as well as stakeholders, we are revising the ACL Leases and Permits Regulation to improve the program for all who use it."

Agricultural Crown lands are parcels of land vested to Manitoba that the government leases to producers for agricultural use, including grazing, haying or annual cropping. Agricultural Crown lands are important public assets economically, environmentally and socially. Agriculturally, these Crown lands are essential to supporting and growing the livestock industry in Manitoba, and provide mitigation and adaptation to climate change, the minister noted.

Based on the public feedback, the revised ACL Leases and Permits Regulation will enable outgoing leaseholders to choose the value of improvements for compensation at either the value set out in the appraisal report or a lesser value they specify, the minister added.

throughout the province. These investments will:

- attract international talent, recruit workers, retain employees and bring back students from other jurisdictions after graduation;

- enhance the education system by developing career pathways for in-demand apprenticeship trades and early childhood educators starting in high school;

- expand markets for Manitoba goods and services, and strengthen the infrastructure to get those goods and services to market;

- incentivize employers to upskill their workforce and help certify internationally educated professionals in their profession;

- improve Manitoba's tax system to

make the personal income and business tax environment more competitive with neighbouring jurisdictions, and allow businesses and workers to keep more of their income;

- revitalize downtown Winnipeg through development and heritage preservation, and address homelessness through safe housing; and

- support the growth and vibrancy of Manitoba arts, culture, sport and tourism.

"Manitoba Transportation and Infrastructure's mission is to ensure safe, reliable and sustainable infrastructure for Manitobans," said Transportation and Infrastructure Minister Doyle Piwniuk. "Our government's vision and strategy is to build on our multimodal transportation hub and trade The Manitoba government began to modernize the ACL program in 2017 to increase access for Indigenous, young and new farmers. It was updated significantly in 2019 to enable leases to be allocated by auction and to set rates at market-based rents.

The current amendments to the ACL Leases and Permits Regulation include:

- reducing forage lease rents over the next several years to help producers recover from drought and flood conditions in recent seasons;

- extending lease terms to a maximum of 20 years from 15 years when producers invest in forage productivity improvements;

- enabling 15-year leaseholders to transfer the remaining years of their leases to an eligible third party;

- developing a process that could enable legacy leaseholders to trans-

gateways, to create opportunities toward a more prosperous future for all those residing in Manitoba."

Supporting the pillars of the Opportunities for Economic Growth Action Plan and investments to date is a commitment to maintaining Manitoba's prudent financial planning, strong governance and management, and fer their agricultural Crown lands to a third party by nominating the next leaseholder, if the agricultural Crown lands are not selected under Treaty Land Entitlement and do not impact Indigenous treaty rights;

- including non-profit Indigenous organizations to be eligible to hold forage leases, in addition to the bands that are already eligible; and

- formalizing the process for assessing land productivity used to determine rent to create an incentive to manage the land and invest in its productivity.

The amendments to the ACL Leases and Permits Regulation will come into force on Jan. 1, 2024.

Rosser council approved the purchase of four speed signs for Sturgeon Road.

Two of the signs will be placed for vehicles travelling northbound and the other two will be placed for vehicles travelling southbound after each mile intersection between the service road and the golf course.

As a result, traffic that turns north or south from the mile intersection will be aware of restricted speed limits for this portion of Sturgeon Road.

The speed limit on Sturgeon Road (Road 8E) between the north service road of Provincial Trunk Highway 101 and Road 70N is 70 kilometres per hour.

IN OTHER COUNCIL NEWS:

• The RM of Rosser has included a drainage study for the Sturgeon Creek/Grants Lake Watershed in its 2023 budget estimates. Council believes it's important to start this project to provide the basis for important drainage discussions. Strategic Systems Engineering Inc. will undertake the drainage study for an estimated \$50,000 plus tax. The CAO will provide a \$20,000 retainer to the company.

• Rosser council approved two sponsorship grants under its community support program. Manitoba Farm Women's Conference Sponsorship will receive \$700 and South West District Palliative Care will receive \$5,000.

• The RM of Rosser agreed to amend a cost-sharing agreement with

the provincial government for sewer infrastructure for CentrePort.

• The owners of Lawson's Sales would like to expand the business by adding an 18,000-square-foot showroom and office space to the existing building. Council directed administration to prepare an amendment to the existing development agreement for the project. Lawson Sales will be responsible for all legal costs associated with the amendments.

• Council approved first and second readings of a new bylaw to repeal a bylaw related to the Rosser-Woodlands Recreation Commission.

• Rosser council approved a proposal from Parkka Fundraising Solutions as the consultant to work on a capital fundraising campaign for the Stonewall personal care home project. The partner municipalities for the project are the RMs of Rosser, St. Laurent and Woodlands and the Town of Stonewall.

• CAO and council are authorized to attend the RCMP community golf tournament, which will be hosted by Stonewall-Teulon-Headingley RCMP in Teulon on Sept. 15 in support of local non-profit organizations. The RM of Rosser will also donate four \$50 gift cards to the cause.

• The RM of Rosser will donate \$200 through four \$50 gift cards to the ARM 23rd annual golf tournament on Aug. 3.

• Rosser council directed that Phase 2 construction work be tendered for a project to build a municipal storage building for the fire department and public works on Wheatfield Road in CentrePort. In February, the municipality entered into a contract with Bird Design-Build Construction for Phase 1 design and pre-construction work.

• Rosser's chief administrative officer will make a report to the senior election official about a registered municipal candidate who failed to submit an election finance statement by the May 26 deadline. All registered candidates for a municipal election are required to file an election finance statement with the CAO within 210

days of an election. The municipal general election took place on Oct. 26, 2022.

• Starting Sept. 1, there will be a 2.5 per cent utility rate increase for customers of CentrePort, as well as customers of the Grosse Isle and Rosser rural utility. This is due to the increase in the wholesale water rates to all member municipalities in the Cartier Regional Water Coop. Information is posted on the RM of Rosser website at www.rmofrosser.com.

"There's going to be a dunk tank for councillors and anyone else we can convince to get in there. For kids, there will be the burn trailer for education, face painting and games. We'll have some low-pressure nozzles that we'll let the kids spray and try to hit a target," Gillis said, adding that hotdogs and hamburgers will be available.

"It's also a chance to show off our revamped fire hall. We just put in a new 3,000-gallon rapid water fill station, and the new people here are really energetic and enthusiastic."

The event will feature live entertainment, including a toe-tapping performance by the L'il Bitty Steppers, a Métis dance group led by Brittany Ducharme and accompanied by musician Jason Appleyard on fiddle.

In addition, sibling duo Emma Futros and Donald Futros will provide a musical performance.

The event serves double duty as a potential recruitment tool for the fire department.

"Our biggest asset and our biggest resource is our human resource," Gillis said.

"We need to increase our complement so we're looking for local people who are available during the day. We're also looking for a couple of tanker drivers with a Class 3 with airbrake licence."

Whether you're from St. Laurent or out of town, all are welcome.

"We would love to see as many people as possible to come from our area," Gillis said.

"We have a lot of seasonal people and we'd love for them to come and see what the fire department does for them too. It should be a good time."

At the event, the fire department will also be taking donations towards the new fire truck.

"If you give a donation of \$20 or more, you can get a taxable receipt and also a bumper sticker that says you support the St. Laurent Fire Department. That was actually organized by reeve and council," Gillis said.

"It's a new council and a new day in St. Laurent. It's an invigorating feeling because council is supporting the fire department. It's just such a breath of fresh air."

St. Laurent Reeve Richard Chartrand said the entire council, as well as new CAO Billie Jean Oliver, actively works with the fire department to use ratepayers' tax dollars to the fullest.

"To date, our fire department has responded to 24 calls this year, including the response and assis-

tance to the Woodlands Fire Department for the fire at the dairy barn in the RM of Woodlands," Chartrand said.

"Council has just approved the purchase of a 2015 four-by-four one-ton truck. Once the vehicle is equipped with the necessary equipment, this will replace one of our trucks that are 40-plus years of age."

Looking ahead, the fire department might be hosting more exciting events and activities.

"The fire department also had an account for various fundraising events, along with the firefighters ball, that they could access for future fundraising events. This council has returned this account to the fire department members' association to utilize, which will provide needed funds for this open house," Chartrand said.

"There is now discussion to once again host a fire fighters ball by this fall. I personally send out an invitation to all to come out and participate at the open house."

"We did really good, every game I was amazed at how good we hit and our outfield was crazy (good)," said Chaske.

"It was really good, it was really fun," added Powroznik. "It was unexpected sharing (gold) but at least we went undefeated. It was a really cool experience."

Cover baking dish with aluminum foil sprayed with nonstick cooking spray to keep cheese from sticking.

Bake 20 minutes.

Remove foil and bake additional 5-10 minutes, or until Parmesan is melted and golden brown.

Cut sliders and serve immediately.

Brown Butter Chocolate Chip Cookies

In medium bowl, whisk flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Set aside. Once butter has solidified, remove from refrigerator. In bowl of electric stand mixer, using paddle attachment, beat butter and sugar at medium speed 2-3 minutes until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, and vanilla. Mix until combined. Scrape sides of bowl as needed. Reduce speed, add flour mixture and beat to combine. Add pecans and chocolate chips; mix at low speed until combined. Place dough in refrigerator and rest 30 minutes.

Preheat oven to 350 F and line baking sheets with parchment paper.

Using 2-ounce ice cream scoop, portion out dough on prepared baking sheets, spacing about 3 inches apart. Gently flatten dough balls using palm.

Bake 13-15 minutes, or until golden brown. Allow cookies to cool on baking sheets 10 minutes then transfer to wire rack. Serve warm.

In skillet, cook sausage links according to package directions. Set aside.

In medium bowl, whisk eggs, milk, almond extract and cinnamon.

Dip bread slice in egg mixture. Wrap bread slice around cooked sausage link, pressing seam to keep from unrolling. Repeat with remaining bread slices and sausage links.

In large skillet over medium-high heat, melt butter. Place roll-ups in skillet, seam-sides down, and cook until all sides are browned, approximately 10 minutes. Drizzle with syrup.
