A season in honey farming at Honeybee Meadows

With local honey available almost everywhere in the Interlake, it is easy to wonder how the apiarists around us began honey farming and how this season might be treating them. For Gilles Lantagne, it was a calling.

Upon his military transfer to Winnipeg, Lantagne first discovered the joy of keeping bees and harvesting honey. When he arrived, he decided to visit his father-in-law, a beekeeper, in Fraserwood.

After witnessing the process, he decided that beekeeping life was meant for him. At first, he started small; neighbours and friends wanted honey, so he increased the number of hives he operated to keep up with demand. He started the business in the early 1990s, and decided to name it Honeybee Meadows when he first wanted to hold a table at a Gimli farmer's market.

"I started small, with word of mouth from friends and family. Then I joined the farmer's market and found more customers in people coming from the U.S., Europe, and across Canada," said Lantagne.

Farming bees is hard work; they

tend to swarm if they are not kept busy. Lantagne checks the hives regularly to make sure they are meeting their requirements. The hives must have a good Queen that can produce a large number of bees, usually between 80,000 and 85,000 bees, by the beginning of July to bring a good production season and harvest.

Every year, the flow of honey usually begins when the dandelions come and ends sometime in August, at least for farming in the Fraserwood area. From August to September, Lantagne gets to work extracting honey.

During extraction, the bees are left in the hive, and different methods are used, such as sweeping the bees off the frame with a soft brush and then taking the boxes to the honey house.

Of course, there are specific rules and things to check before extraction. For example, the honey must have 18 percent or less moisture to extract, or it will be at risk of fermentation. Once in the honey house, the honeycombs must be uncapped using a hot knife and then extracted using a machine. Before entering containers, the honey is screened using a fine mesh stainless steel screen or a cheesecloth.

Though he works mainly by himself, his wife helps a lot with harvesting and packaging.

As the weather improves, he hopes the bees will be able to collect nectar more efficiently. "It has been a hard year due to the weather," shared Lantagne. The bees wanted to swarm more than usual."

Of course, pairing the bees with areas that benefit them is essential; according to the Manitoba Canola Growers and the Knowledge and Re-

search Transfer Program for Apiculture, "canola farmers and bee farmers make a dynamic team." The bright yellow flowers are both easy to see and land on and provide essential nutrients to the bees. The pollinators also benefit the canola, and their presence can lead to higher yields and improved seed ripening.

Each growing season differs for both canola and bee farmers due to several variables. Communication between farmers and beekeepers is crucial in this partnership to keep the bees as safe as possible, especially when it comes to insecticides to protect the canola from harmful pests.

"Canola is a good source of nectar for the bees as it crystallizes quickly, and as long it has not been sprayed with chemicals, it is not good for the bees to winterize on it," shared Lantagne.

During the summer, Lantagne attends farmer's markets once a week and also does farm-gate sales. He will be attending Teulon's weekly farmer's market for the remainder of the summer every Friday from 3-7 p.m. in the lot directly south of the Co-op gas station on Hwy. 7. Anyone wanting a taste of the final product after the honey-making process should be sure to catch him.

SOUTH INTERLAKE PLANNING

Planning to Build a Deck this Summer?

Keep the South Interlake Planning District (SIPD) in mind if you are planning to build a deck this summer. A Development and Building Permit is required for a deck that:

- Is two feet or higher from the ground; or
- Is attached to a building; or
- Has walls or a roof; or
- Is intended to support a structure such as a hot tub or pergola.



You do NOT need a permit for an unenclosed or detached deck less than two feet in height, or for landings of 50 ft² or less in floor area. However, please note that zoning setbacks shall be satisfied whether a permit is required or not.

Permits help ensure that buildings and structures meet the *Manitoba Building Code*, which makes things safer for everyone!

Protect your property

A few small steps could help protect your property and vehicles from potential theft.

On Tuesday, July 30, Stonewall RCMP received multiple reports of stolen vehicles in the RM of Woodlands.

According to reports, the stolen vehicles were left unlocked — and all of them had their keys still inside.

“I can’t stress enough the importance of locking your vehicle and removing any valuables from it,” said Cpl. Mike Garton of Stonewall RCMP.

“Thieves will always look for the easiest target.”

To avoid being an easy target of car theft, the RCMP recommends that

owners lock their vehicle’s doors and roll up the windows. If possible, it’s best to park the vehicle in a garage and keep it locked.

The RCMP also urges everyone to park in well-lit areas and to take their keys, garage door openers and any valuables out of the vehicle when they leave it. In addition, they suggest checking on the vehicle regularly, even if it’s not being used.

“You need to remain vigilant when it comes to securing your home and your vehicles,” Garton said.

“Theft of vehicles continues to be a concern in the Interlake, and we want to remind everyone to lock their vehicles at all times when not in use.”

The temperature reached 28 degrees C. on Aug. 2. In Manitoba, as in other provinces, Environment and Climate Change Canada work with their federal counterparts to track forecasts and be alert for weather exceeding the extreme heat threshold. Extreme heat warnings are issued in southern Manitoba when forecasts predict two days with daytime highs above 32 C and nighttime lows above 16 C, or a humidex over 38 C, Canada’s measure of how hot a day will feel when humidity is taken into account. Green Tea Berry Banana Smoothies

Recipe courtesy of the American Heart Association

- Servings: 4 (1 1/2 cups per serving)
- 3 cups water
- 8 single-serving green tea bags
- 16 ounces frozen mixed berries (about 3 cups)
- 2 medium bananas, peeled, cut in half and frozen
- 1 cup fat-free plain Greek yogurt

- 2 teaspoons fresh-grated peeled gingerroot (optional)
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract (optional)
- 2 teaspoons chia or flax seeds (optional)

In small saucepan over high heat, bring water to boil. Remove pan from heat. Submerge tea bags. Steep 4 minutes. Discard tea bags. Let tea mixture cool 30 minutes. Pour into pitcher. Refrigerate 2 hours, or until chilled.

In food processor or blender, process tea, berries, bananas and yogurt until smooth. Add gingerroot and vanilla, if desired, and process until smooth. Pour into four glasses. Sprinkle with chia seeds, if desired.

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Health Canada issues recall of vitamins and minerals

Health Canada issued a number of alerts and recalls (on July 26 and July 29) for a variety of multivitamins and supplements that were distributed across Canada.

The products are being recalled because they may contain metal fibres.

The multivitamins and supplements have the following brand names: Kirkland Signature, Life, Option+, Webber Naturals, Wellness by London Drugs, Equate, Wellquest, Vegi-Day, and Natural Factors.

B vitamins, some including vitamin C, a combination of women's vitamins and minerals, a combination of prenatal vitamins and minerals, men's vitamins and minerals, and vegan organic are among the recalled products.

"Factors Group of Nutritional Companies Inc. is recalling various multivitamins and supplements sold under a variety of brand names due to the potential presence of metal fibres," states the alert. "The affected products may contain metal fibres which, if ingested, may cause injury to the digestive system. The risk of harm due to the presence of iron is higher in individuals with a peptic ulcer, regional enteritis, ulcerative colitis, iron allergy, or for those taking high doses of iron supplements, levodopa, and/or levothyroxine."

Health Canada said it's monitoring the company's recall and implementation of preventative and corrective

actions.

Canadians are advised to stop using the products.

"Stop using the recalled products. Consult a health care professional if you have used any of these products and have health concerns," states the alert. "If you have purchased an affected product, return it to your local pharmacy for proper disposal."

Visit Health Canada's Recalls and Safety Alerts website for a full list of the recalled items and their details. Lot numbers and expiry dates are listed on bottles of vitamins and minerals and they can be checked against the affected items shown on Health Canada's website.

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Woodlands council approves Park150 proposal

In honour of the RM of Woodlands' 150th anniversary, the RM will develop a new public park in the community. A few months ago, a council subcommittee comprised of some councillors and community members was formed to plan the project.

The Council accepted the proposal from Scatcliff + Miller + Murray Consulting for the design of Park150, which will cost \$49,010 and be completed by 2026. Park150 will officially open on the municipality's 150th anniversary of incorporation in 2030. A groundbreaking event is planned for Oct. 4, 2024, with public engagement sessions next year to ensure residents can weigh in.

The Park150 Committee intends to raise the funds through fundraising, sponsorships, and grants. Council has committed \$2,000 for start-up costs.

Proposals from the community for recreation programming funding officially closed on July 31. There was \$41,285 available to be awarded, and Council awarded \$9,700 to the following:

- West Interlake Trading Company, \$8,000 for their Summer Day Camp
- Woodlands Recreation Club, \$500 for a bouncy castle and face painting at their Summer Bash
- Woodlands Museum, \$1,200 for their four-day Summer Camp

IN OTHER COUNCIL NEWS:

- Two public works staff were authorized to attend the 2024 Mid-Canada Snow Conference Sept. 18 to 19 in Winnipeg.
- Council awarded Prairie Roots Co-op the 2024-2025 fuel supply contract. Council is unaware of

the cost, as it is based on fuel rates that can change daily and fuel consumption also varies, but approved a rough estimate budget of \$205,000.

The RM accepted Maxim's quote for \$74,900 for a 2018 International LT625 daycab, provided all engine software updates have been completed. Additionally, the Council approved the lease of a Western Star semi from Mike Crockatt for \$225 per day while they wait for the new semi to arrive.

- Council had an open discussion on prioritizing additional gravel requests with the remaining budget. Requests from operators, Council, and the public were compiled and reviewed. Council authorized public works to prioritize them and to continue gravelling as time and funds permit. They will continue to work within the approved 2024 budget of \$300,000 for limestone approved this spring. Council also discussed a new gravel supplier, Lakeside Aggregates. CAO Kaitlyn Griffith says the gravel is less expensive, but the hauling distance is greater. The RM will try the new supplier and see whether it's worthwhile in terms of time and cost. This supplier is not currently under contract, so the RM can and will still buy gravel from other suppliers.

- Council passed the second and third reading of a bylaw governing public cemeteries.

- Council openly discussed Twin Lakes Beach Road concerning the Manitoba environment update. CAO Griffith said this has been an ongoing and complicated discussion for many years. A portion of Twin Lakes Beach Road falls outside the designated road allowance and is on several private properties. Council

has decided to move the road back within the road allowance, which requires an environmental license from the province. Currently, Council is running into some trouble getting the license due to the wetland impact. At the July 23 council meeting, Reeve Douglas Oliver advised Council that he attended the Twin Lakes Beach Association AGM on July 21 to present this update on the project (meaning the troubles with the environmental licensing, which will delay the project), but none of the impacted residents attended the AGM. Following this meeting, the RM will ask for assistance from KGS engineering in engaging with the province to discuss further the issues with environmental licensing and whether they can be overcome. At this stage in the conversation, the costs are unknown.

The council defeated the resolution to accept the \$2,500 quote from KGS Group for a review and recommendation on materials to be used in a transfer station retaining wall. The Council felt that the cost of obtaining this recommendation was too high and will instead pursue research in-house.

- Council approved the \$600 table purchase at the Interlake Community Foundation Inc. 30th Anniversary Gala Celebration on Friday, Sept. 20.

- Council requested that Manitoba Transportation and Infrastructure turn over ownership of Manness Drive in Warren to the municipality. The municipality maintains Manness Drive even though it's located within the PTH 6 right of way, legally under the jurisdiction of Manitoba Transportation and Infrastructure. Council's request is to formalize this ownership.

RM of Armstrong byelection results

The RM of Armstrong held a byelection July 31 to replace all the councillors and reeve who were elected in 2022.

There were 15 candidates running for seat on council, two of whom were acclaimed.

The resignation of four councillors – Pat Stein, Ted Sumka, Paul Humeny and Brent Dziadek – on April 9 resulted in a loss of quorum for remaining councillor Allen Pfrimmer and reeve Kate Basford, and the subsequent appointment of an administrator by the provincial government to oversee the RM's day-to-day business affairs.

Stein and Humeny decided to run again in the byelection.

Running for reeve were Kate Basford, Pat Stein and Garry Wasylowski, who previously served as reeve. Wasylowski received 451 votes com-

pared to 165 for Stein and 58 for Basford.

Paul Humeny was elected in Ward 2, receiving 38 votes. Charles Whittier (19 votes), Drenna Campbell (1 vote) and Amanda Ermel (12 votes) also ran for Ward 2.

Glenn Barkman was elected in Ward 3 with 92 votes. Greg Dwornick (47 votes), Greg Fontaine (12 votes) and Danny Gudbjartson (38 votes) also ran for Ward 3.

Allen Evanchyshin, who previously served on council, was elected in Ward 5 with 72 votes. Luke Hendrickson received 69 votes.

Ward 1 candidate Guy (Sonny) Rohne was elected by acclamation (he had no other candidate running against him), and Ward 4 candidate David Tyndale was also elected by acclamation.

Twenty-seven ballots were "de-

Mental health charity focuses on youth

A Canadian mental health charity aims to give young people the knowledge, skills and resources they need to understand mental health and seek support.

This organization, called Jack.org, focus on youth aged 13 to 24, the period where most mental health illnesses and challenges tend to emerge. This is a vital time for young people to establish a thorough understanding of mental health, available supports and self-care practices to support long-term health.

Brenda Martinussen of Balmoral serves on the organization's board of directors — and she encourages others to consider getting involved.

"With a background in clinical psychology, mental health is very important to me. I have seen young people struggle and believe more needs to be done to support them, especially in rural and remote areas," she said.

"When I learned of the call for the board of directors, I researched Jack.org and was surprised I had not heard of it given the incredible work they do. I see this organization as filling

a critical gap in our national mental health landscape and wanted not only to be a part of the organization but also to assist in bringing their resources to light across the country and in underserved areas."

Martinussen outlined some of the concerns that Jack.org endeavours to address.

"Suicide remains a leading cause of death for young people, and mental illness affects an estimated 1.2 million young people, but most young people lack the knowledge to recognize mental health struggle and seek support that could save or improve their life. Jack.org works to change that through early educational intervention and building networks of support between young people," she said.

"Young people are often in the best position to recognize struggle in one another — and they are most receptive to messages that come from a peer — so Jack.org's work is focused on enabling young people to support one another and hear from one another about lived-experience with mental health struggle."

Young people are our future, and mental health is the greatest health challenge they are facing, she added.

"Mental health challenges among youth have been on the rise for over a decade," Martinussen said, "and it is only by taking action that we will begin to turn the tide in favour of better outcomes for youth."

Jack.org offers three award-winning programs to community members, she added.

"The Be There Certificate is an online learning resource that trains people to have difficult mental health conversations and show support to someone who's going through a mental health struggle. It takes only two hours to complete and is free for all. You never know when someone you care about will need your support. Be There helps prepare us for what may come," she said.

"Community members can also book a Jack Talk, a mental health pre-

sentation delivered by young people to young people. Youth speakers use the power of their personal mental health stories to teach mental health essentials and normalize difficult conversations."

In addition, young people can create a Jack Chapter, a youth-led community group that leads mental health awareness initiatives and provides the community with resources to support mental health. Chapters work closely with Jack.org staff to design initiatives that address challenges the community is facing.

"While Jack.org's programs are designed to support youth, everyone is welcome to get involved. We offer resources for educators at jack.org/edhub, and our Be There training is as relevant for adults as it is for young people. All of us have a stake in protecting young people's mental health,



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Ashern Pioneer Museum holding annual thresherman's reunion Aug. 11

The Ashern Pioneer Museum is gearing up for its annual threshermen's reunion on Sunday, Aug. 11.

The annual two-day event happened every weekend before Labour Day when it started 34 years ago. Still, with the rodeo happening around the same time, it became too much for organizers and attendees. So, the reunion went to a one-day event on the same weekend as the local rodeo. After a few years of doing it like that, the Ashern Pioneer Museum decided to branch out again and hold the threshermen's reunion the weekend before the rodeo. So now, every second weekend in August, the mini thresherman's reunion brings people from all corners of Manitoba to Ashern.

At the Ashern Pioneer Museum's mini threshermen's reunion, people can take in threshing and binding on

the same day. Threshing is loosening the edible part of grain from the rest of the plant. Threshing is typically done by rubbing, stripping, or beating the plant, which a combine does nowadays during harvest. Binding cuts the grain and binds it into bundles. The binder, invented in 1872, improved upon the reaper, and the original machine used wire to tie the bundles.

For the reunion, the museum board has sheaths from the previous years' harvest to run through the thrasher, and they've tilled up a field at the museum where they grow grain to bind during the reunion.

"People like to reminisce," said Rick Ebbers, chairman of the museum board. "It's a thing of the past. It's the years that started and made this town, so it's a lot of hard work they put in, and it's just great to see people who come out and appreciate it."

The reunion will start with a church service in the Anglican Church on the museum site, followed by a barbecue lunch lasting all day. There will be popcorn, a bouncy castle, a dog show, chainsaw carving, and live entertainment by local artists. Entry is \$5 a person and free for children 12 and under.

The Ashern Pioneer Museum has seven buildings on-site, including the original CNR station, St. Michael's Anglican Church, the Hoffman log house, the former post office, the former municipality office, the Darwin

school, and a storage building for machinery. The museum is open from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday, each week throughout the summer, and phone calls with special appointments are often accommodated.

The museum has artifacts from different times in Ashern's history. Ebbers encourages everyone who hasn't been there yet to see what the museum has to offer. Each of the seven buildings will be open for people to tour during the reunion on Aug. 11.

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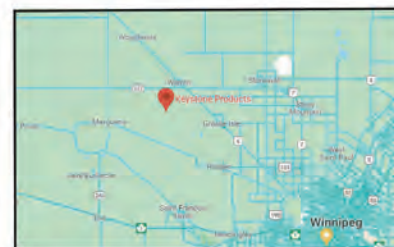
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Carnival Day fun at Goodwin Lodge

Veggie Stir Fry with Prune Teriyaki Sauce

Cook time: 15 minutes
Servings: 4

- 1 tablespoon toasted sesame oil
 - 1/2 large onion, diced
 - salt, to taste, divided
 - 3 cloves garlic, minced
 - 1 tablespoon minced ginger
 - 2 cups shredded carrots
 - 1 red bell pepper, sliced
 - 1 medium zucchini, diced
 - 8 ounces sugar snap peas
 - pepper, to taste, divided
 - 1/2 cup roasted salted cashews, plus additional for serving, divided
 - 1 cup edamame
 - 2-3 cups cooked jasmine rice, for serving
 - 1/3 cup sliced green onions, for serving
 - California grown prunes from Sunsweet, for serving
 - Prune Teriyaki Sauce:
 - 1 cup canned pineapple, plus 1/4 cup pineapple juice
 - 1/4 cup California grown prunes from Sunsweet (about 6 prunes)
 - 6 tablespoons reduced-sodium soy sauce
 - 1 tablespoon pure maple syrup
 - 1 tablespoon rice vinegar
 - 1 garlic clove
 - 1 teaspoon sriracha
- In large skillet over medium heat, warm sesame oil. Once hot, add onion

and pinch of salt; saute 5 minutes. Add garlic and ginger; cook 30 seconds, or until fragrant. Add carrots, bell pepper, zucchini, snap peas and pinch of salt and pepper. Saute 10 minutes, stirring often, until veggies are crisp tender.

To make teriyaki sauce: In blender, blend pineapple, pineapple juice, prunes, soy sauce, maple syrup, rice vinegar, garlic and sriracha until smooth.

Remove veggies from heat and stir in 1/2 cup cashews, edamame and teriya-

ki sauce to coat. Season with salt and pepper, to taste, and serve on bed of rice garnished with green onions, prunes and additional cashews.

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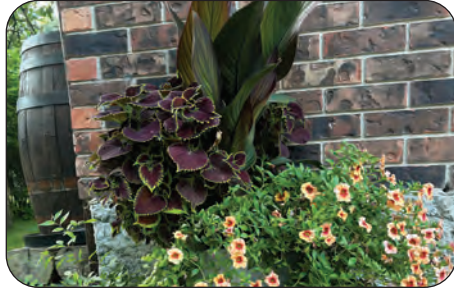

The U13 Interlake Phillies didn't have to travel far for last weekend's 2024 Western Canadian Softball Championships.

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Former Stonewall mayor accomplishes rare feat in karate

Clive Hinds has spent a lifetime paying back the sport that has made him rich in well-being.

For the last four decades, the 74-year-old has stood by an oath he made to himself to teach others about respect and self-development through budo, the philosophical discipline of karate.

Hinds stood among some of the rarest athletes in the martial art for 11 years as he held the seventh dan — or seventh-degree black belt — ranking. Recently, he joined an ultra-exclusive group when he completed his eighth dan in Guyana.

Practically speaking, the eighth dan is the highest achievement someone can reach in karate. With this notch in his belt, Hinds can test more people, including up to sixth-degree black belts, and has furthered his qualification as an instructor, examiner and tournament director.

However, perhaps the most important thing that Hinds demonstrated was that he was still willing to improve himself, despite being a master of a martial art.

“Here we are today and I just keep pushing just to get my students on board. I have some students that have been with me 30 years... and if I don’t live by the example, I can’t speak it,” Hinds said.

“So, I continue to train. I continue to move forward and give them that ability to see that I teach by example.”

Hinds spent 12 days in Guyana, where he only intended to judge a world tournament. At the event, he was asked about increasing his ranking, however. Hinds obliged almost immediately.

He was put through several situations that required him to defend himself while demonstrating exceptional composure. The testing was rigorous, he said, but completely worth it in the end.

“It was a bit taxing at my age because you had to demonstrate that you can make self-defence, as well as control motions and everything,” Hinds said. “It’s not about sparring anymore, but mostly for self-defence, you have to be able to make and show self-defence — that you can get out of many different aspects of someone grabbing you from behind, someone holding you down, punching, kicking whatever.

“It’s mostly (about) how you have handled yourself because now you’re a top leader in the organization and you have to demonstrate as such. You have to show manners, and respect and be able to

portray that in your regular lifestyle, as well.”

Hinds emigrated to Winnipeg from his hometown Kingston, Jamaica in 1963 after his father was asked to relocate to Canada for business.

Hinds first landed in East Kildonan, then settled in Transcona. Upon graduating to high school, he was subjected to racism, being one of the few black students in the school.

By the time he was 15, Hinds’ father enrolled him in Kung Fu so he could learn how to defend himself, but that didn’t stick very long.

“I went through that phase a little bit and realized that the Japanese martial arts was really what I was looking for — something that was longevity, and where I could train without the showing off and without the bragging and all that,” Hinds said.

“I was very active in sports when I was very young,” he said. “I was pretty fast. But I was also very sickly — I was an asthmatic. Still am. So, when it comes to a sports day... I would win the race and die after because I couldn’t breathe.”

Then came karate, which was less taxing on his lung condition and provided Hinds with the physical and mental tools to defend himself regardless of the situation. Hinds could choose between three styles of karate — Budo, traditional, which emphasizes defending oneself, and sports karate, which is about attacking in competition — but chose Budo due to its emphasis on self-improvement.

Forty-three years later, Hinds is among the most accomplished, and his wife, Deborah, is right there with him as a sixth-degree black belt.

“It has done wonders for me not only health-wise... but most of all, in business, it has given me that inner strength, inner vision, to relax, to approach things in a totally different matter,” Hinds said.

“That you can control your emotions, whether you’re in business — and I have been extremely successful in the business — whether it’s running the membership, or being on council or running a business for myself, my wife.”

After receiving his third dan, Clive opened Winnipeg Budokai in 1996, his own dojo in the Manitoba capital, which is now home to many black belts who help others begin their path to self-improvement. Later, after moving to Stonewall, Hinds and his wife opened Stonewall Karate, which Deborah now successfully operates.

“Karate is not just about kicking and punching, it is also development,” Hinds said. “That’s what most of my students — all the years that I’ve been teaching — that’s what I teach them is manners and respect, and be humble and never brag and show off and want to take your karate on to the street and demonstrate it on people.”

Hinds, who served as Stonewall’s mayor from 2018-2020, will continue his role as the chief instructor for the International Karate Daigaku of Manitoba, which oversees four different clubs across the province. There’s no telling what’s next for him, but he knows there is still plenty to give back.

“The idea of karate — most people believe it’s the goal to fight and kick. It is part of karate... but the most important part of it is manners and respect. So all students, you’ll find even the school teachers tell us that those that were they were having troubles in school, that come and join karate, changed their way of behaviour,” he said.

“It’s a huge part of what we do, try to develop and make society a better place to live.”

heads too low after a losing streak," said Olnick. "It's important to get back in the win column."

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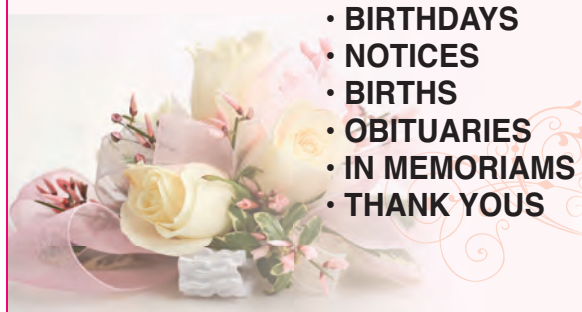

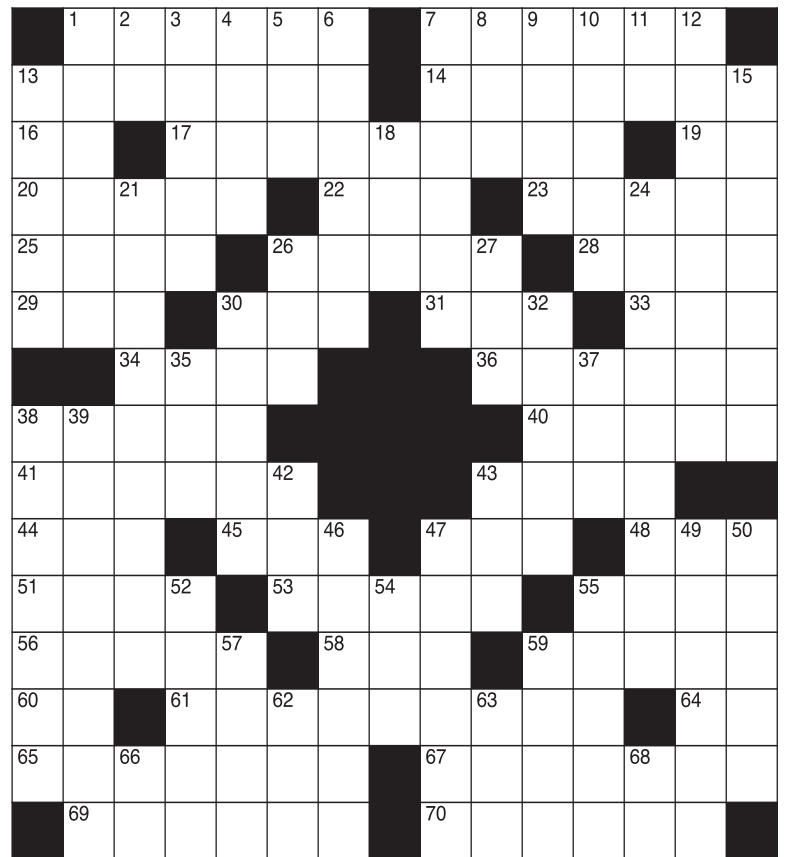
