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Progress continues for Teulon's Playstreet Childcare

Progress continues for a new Teulon-based childcare centre that aims to meet the needs of local families.

The idea for Playstreet Childcare Centre began when local entrepreneur and businessman Kirt Ansell saw first-hand the need for more spaces as his grandson Connor became old enough to require care.

At the same time, through his residential property business Ansell Managed Properties Inc., he saw the struggles of young families to find childcare in the community in order to keep working.

"For young parents who didn't have family to support the lack of childcare gap, they had two options: move out of the community to find childcare and thus employment elsewhere possibly or turn to social assistance to continue to be able to pay the rent when their maternity leaves runs out," he said. "So the need was very much recognized."

In the spring of 2021, Ansell Managed Properties acquired the assets of Whispering Pines Addiction Centre in Teulon, formerly the Teulon Residences. The property includes two residential buildings plus an additional centre with a gymnasium.

For the property company, it was a good fit. Ansell figured the building with the gym could be a great location for a childcare centre. At the same time, the company renovated a total of 18,000 square feet in the two residential buildings to create affordable housing for seniors.

In addition, Ansell decided to renovate a room in the residential building to provide a small childcare space for infants and toddlers.

"A licensed daycare centre of this size generally takes years to materialize, and a good part of that time is the fundraising of the necessary capital," Ansell said.

"As the building owner, generally a commercial tenant develops the space at their cost. However, there's a lot of physical things that have to be changed to a building to meet the daycare standards. I made the decision to renovate to suit the Playstreet organization at no cost to them. It just made sense to create the space so the daycare can simply worry about creating the policies and programming."

Recently, several community members jumped on board to help make Playstreet Childcare Centre a reality.

Rhonda Stasiuk stepped up to serve as board president, bringing nearly 25 years of experience in the childcare field. She is a co-director of the Stony Mountain Childcare Centre and has

her Early Childhood Educator (ECE) Level III certification.

In the role of secretary is Dorothy Farmer, who has worked in childcare and education for more than 20 years, starting in the daycare field followed by the local school system.

Serving as treasurer is Chelsey Connelly, who has an educational background in family social sciences and child and youth care. Connelly has also worked in the financial sector for the past six years. She knows from experience how difficult it can be to find childcare based on her efforts to find a spot for her daughter, who is now two and a half years old.

"Since I was four months pregnant, I had to log on to the online childcare wait list for our area several times, and if you lost track of the months since you registered last, you lost your spot completely," Connelly said.

"It feels good to know that we're creating more spaces than the community has waitlist for. This will definitely have a positive impact on young families."

Spaces will begin to open up soon for the new childcare centre, since the renovations are now complete for the infant and toddler room. This room will have a capacity for four infants and six toddlers aged two to three years old.

"We have passed all inspections, hired our starting staff and are currently engaged in contacting parents to fill these childcare spaces. Our infant and toddler room is now licensed with the province," Ansell said.

"This means that as soon as our newly hired early childhood educators receive their background checks back from the province, the Playstreet infant and toddler room will officially open. Our best estimate for that is mid-August."

In addition, Ansell Managed Properties is now in the process of renovating the building with the gym to provide additional childcare spaces.

"The licensed space will consist of two upstairs preschool rooms for children aged two to six years of age for a total potential capacity of 48 preschoolers. The school-age program will occupy the main floor gymnasium space, which will have a capacity for 45 school-age children," Ansell said.

"This meets and exceeds the current waitlist for the immediate community and surrounding area, so there's room to grow. Parents can be assured that once their child reaches two years of age, there will no longer be a waitlist for child-care in our community. Playstreet will have an eventual and total licence capacity for roughly 100 kids."

The best part about this building is the ample

space it offers, Ansell added.

"Imagine working in a room with 24 kids the entire day. I know it's done in normal practice, but I couldn't do it. In this case, we have space to spare, creating a rotating program cycling the kids through the building," he said.

"At full licensed capacity, which would definitely take some time to grow into, at times there's still likely to be groups as small as eight kids in quiet areas for part of the day to a potential 45 school-age going wild in the gym space for the first couple hours and the last couple hours of the day — good for the kids to burn off energy before and after school."

As well, Playstreet Childcare Centre has two large Orca

"Please join us for a tour of our modern equipment and technology," she said. "Come out and meet our experienced technicians."

For eligible applicants wanting to work in the region, Interlake-Eastern RHA will cover the training costs of the three-month combined practicum and online certification testing to become an MDR technician.

"MDR is important to us as technicians as we take pride in all of our work we do. Not only are we very diligent in all of our cleaning, inspection and sterilization processes, but we think of every patient as our own family member," Purse

"At the end of the day, it feels good to know we are such an integral part of the perioperative team and that our ser-

Rosser council news in brief

- At a special meeting on July 26, Rosser council approved a \$25,000 funding request from Rosser Central Community Club for the purchase and installation of a new flooring system. This contribution was not included in the 2022 budget and will be paid through the recreation reserve fund.
- Council approved applications for culverts on Bryan Bay, Goldenrod Drive, Punjab Drive and Aster Drive. The applicants must cover the costs of supplies and installation.
- Council approved an application for Meadow Lane Colony to remove topsoil with a condition that the applicant must maintain long-term weed control in the undeveloped area.
- The RM of Rosser will enter into a funding agreement with the Manitoba Water Services Board to prepare an engineering design study regarding wastewater servicing for the CentrePort utility on a 50/50 basis. The total cost of the study is estimated to be \$45,000.
- The RM of Rosser granted an extension to a developer to pay an invoice for the Durum Drive lift station upgrade.



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Broom-making business comes to Balmoral

A broom-making business is sweeping through the Interlake with handcrafted items inspired by the prairies.

Broomsquire Amina Haswell recently set up Prairie Breeze Arts Studio, her "li'l shop on the prairies," in the RM of Rockwood off Road 87.

The Rockwood resident realized the potential of her six-acre property to become a close-to-home hub to offer products and courses, so she went through the process of getting permission to proceed. The business also operates a small studio in Wolseley, where they make products, ship orders and offer pickup. She originally launched the business in April 2019 and since then has been sending her products across Canada and into the United States.

With a staggering selection, the bustling business makes more than 60 kinds of brooms in nearly 50 different

"The most common style we do is referred to as Appalachian-style brooms. They are brooms made of broom corn and the stems of the broom corn are binded to a broom handle," Haswell said.

"We also do shaker-style brooms, which is more simple and similar to the common broom you would buy but made by hand and much more durable. All our brooms are actually made by hand using only tension,

making them truly built to last. We also do some Japanese styles and some South American styles."

For Haswell, her interest in the art piqued when she bought her first handmade broom while on a business trip more than a dozen years ago.

"The world of handmade brooms was revealed. I became interested in both the form and function of brooms — it was so pretty yet I could clean my house with it — and I was sold,"

COVID refuses to take summer vacation

As Manitobans continue to enjoy summer events and beachside and backyard get-togethers, COVID-19 infections driven by the omicron subvariant BA.5 are on the upswing.

BA.5 is a fast-moving, highly transmissible mutant and a masterful escape artist, side-stepping the body's natural or vaccine-induced frontline immune defences. It can infect people more than once.

For the week of July 24-30, the province's respiratory surveillance report confirmed 257 new COVID infections, up by 15 cases over the 242 cases reported the previous week. Because the province restricts PCR testing, its data is an undercount. Rapid antigen test results aren't tracked.

There were also 53 new hospital admissions that included seven people needing treatment in the intensive care unit.

The previous week's report noted Manitoba's death toll had reached 2,061. This week's report shows six more Manitobans died from COVID for a total of 2,067 deaths.

The surveillance report also said there were three new COVID outbreaks in long-term care facilities, one

Coast brand CSA-approved play structures currently under assembly in the gym space, with access to the upper level of the play structure from the upstairs preschool rooms. Plans are in place for a large natural outdoor playground green space, with everything located about block away from local schools.

"We are also looking at the feasibility of a little bus for the back-and-forth for the school-age kids for the colder days," he said.

"It would be nice if the little faces will be warm for the short trip back

Manitoba's chief public health officer Brent Roussin said in mid-July that BA.5 was identified in half of the COVID infections and is anticipated to increase. Unlike some provinces, Manitoba is not launching a fourthdose vaccine campaign in the hope that there'll be a better vaccine rolled out sometime in the fall.

The Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority hired two internationally trained physicians — who also trained at the University of Manitoba — for Eriksdale and Arborg. Dr. Nardin Faragalla is a family physician working at the Eriksdale Wellness Clinic. She is accepting new patients. Dr. Reshad Nazim is working at the Arborg Primary Health Care Centre and he is accepting new patients.

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

ica and South America for work. I decided this was going to be the kind of business I would like to open. I then spent a decade learning about brooms, taking courses in the U.S. and looking at broom-making shops from around the world."

Now, as a broom-maker herself, Haswell still continues to work in her other professional capacity.

"While I'm passionate about brooms, I divide my time between brooms and my other chosen profession of workplace investigations and consulting," she said.

"The balance between these two very distinct professions keeps me grounded."

For her broom-making business, she employs a small team who help with production using time-tested traditional techniques.

"Our broom-making process has several key stages, but the critical

component is binding the broom corn to the handle or fashioning a handle out of the broom corn itself," Haswell said.

"It is a simple task that involves wetting the broom corn, binding it and then undertaking the drying, which is a bit of a process. This all happens over several days, so the process is lengthy but creates an optimal product."

These environmentally conscious household items are proving popular with customers from a range of demographics.

"Our clients are people who value quality products and are all ages, from kids who love our five children's broom options to folks who remember their grandmother or mother having a handmade broom," Haswell said.

"They share our values in being environmentally friendly and something sourced direct from nature. They appreciate the time and labour that go into making quality products that last decades."

Raising funds for Children's Wish recipients

32nd Annual Ride for Child's Wish returns on Aug. 27

After a two-year hiatus due to COVID-19, the Ride for Child's Wish fundraiser is back at the end of this month, ready to continue making wishes come true for kids by donating their funds to Make-A-Wish Foundation.

The well-known event will be hosting its 32nd annual Ride for a Child's Wish on Saturday, Aug. 27, starting at 11 a.m. at Silver and Gary Peltier's farm on Highway 6, located a mile and a half before the RM of Woodlands/Warren boundary.

"We want people to have fun and to donate money through pledges, the auction or having supper to help us raise money so the kids can get their wishes for whatever they want," said Silver

The fundraiser will feature a 10-mile horse trail ride behind the farm, a motorcycle ride, the Wish Auction, delicious food and much more — including kids' entertainment and a musical performance from the local band Lost in a Small Town during the barn dance starting at 9 p.m.

The Peltiers started the fundraiser

in 1988 when they had just moved to their farm.

Gary and his buddy got some horses and wanted to meet people, so they decided to do a small trail ride.

The first year we had 11 riders and 25 people and raised \$750, said Silver.

It's grown a lot since then. The numbers doubled for the first five, 10 years, she said.

Since then, they have continued to host the event on their property every year (besides the two years of the pandemic) and have raised a range of different amounts each year — raising well over a million dollars.

Out of all the organizations they could donate to, the couple has made a point to continue to give their donations from the fundraiser to the Children's Wish Foundation every year.

After their first year hosting the ride, the couple went to look around to see where they could donate the money. The Peltiers happened to go to a show where there was a homemade banner with children's signatures and handprints painted on it at a booth.

The Peltiers approached the man at the booth and told him that they were thinking of doing a ride to raise funds for a good cause, but they didn't know how much they would be able to raise.

"He said, 'If you give me a dime, it's a dime I didn't have yesterday,'" said Silver

Silver said all the other organizations they had visited wanted them to bring in a lot of money.

"We have healthy kids and I have three healthy grandchildren, but I've met a lot of kids that either have cancer or leukemia, and we just want them to be able to get a wish, whatever it is," said Silver.

The horse ride will start at 11 a.m., with riders leaving between 11 and 12 p.m. and arriving back between 3 and 4 p.m. Following the horse ride, there is a motorcycle ride through the Interlake that starts at the Warren Domo on Highway 6, going for approximately 250 kilometres.

There is currently construction on Highway 17 towards Inwood, so the exact trail is still in the process of being finalized and may be different from previous years.

Kids' entertainment starts at 3 p.m.

A barbecue-style supper with all the favourites — including barbecued chicken, baked potatoes and corn on the cob — will be served at 5 p.m., followed by the Wish Auction at 7 p.m. — with a horse included as one of the items to be won — and the dance at 9 p.m.

The fundraiser is a volunteer-led event organized by the Peltiers and their committee of volunteers.

"We could not do any of this without all the help," said Silver.

Anyone is welcome to attend the event to support the cause, whether you have a motorcycle or a horse or not.

If anybody wants to donate to the ride, they can text or email Silver and she will make arrangements for someone to meet them.

"It's how we make some money for the kids," said Silver.

Registration for the trail ride starts at 9 a.m. on Saturday, Aug. 27.

Electronics recycling drive coming to Stonewall

There's no time like the present to clean out your cupboards and desk drawers to give your outdated gadgets a chance at new life.

From Aug. 12 to 23, Jordan Dearsley is hosting an electronics recycling drive at the Stonewall library at 419 Main St.

Dearsley is aiming to win a scholarship through the Electronic Recycling Association, which is dedicated to reducing electronic waste by reusing and recycling unwanted equipment.

The non-profit organization is currently running a Canada-wide contest that gives students a chance to win a \$10,000 scholarship by collecting e-waste in local communities and marketing their events. The winner will be determined by the quantity and quality of equipment collected, as well as the exposure the event receives.

"This is my second year running the free electronics recycling drives. I did one in Selkirk last year in July, as well in West St. Paul and in the city. I always get a pretty good turnout. Everyone is always really glad for it because so many people have electronics piling up," said Dearsley, a recent high school graduate from West St. Paul.

"I had also planned to do one in Stonewall last June. I had everything all arranged with the library, and my posters and posts were all ready to go. But then we had another wave of COVID in June last year so we ended up cancelling it."

Now Stonewall residents have another chance to

drop off electronic items including laptops, tablets, smartphones, desktop computers, gaming devices, servers, switches, business routers, printers, fax machines and scientific equipment. Please note that TVs and household appliances aren't eligible for this program.

"The laptops are always something that I'm really excited to get because the Electronic Recycling Association has a program where they give refurbished laptops to charities that need them," Dearsley said.

"And they have a kids' poster contest where they can make posters about electronics recycling for a chance to win a refurbished laptop."

In the fall, Dearsley plans to study environmental engineering at the University of Northern B.C., so the scholarship would help cover some expenses.

"I've always been really passionate about the environment and I actually had a phone drive that was planned for after spring break 2020. I was supposed to be collecting old cell phones with a different organization but then, of course, we never returned to school so that went out the window," she said.

"When I saw this with the scholarship contest with the Electronic Recycling Association, I thought 'Here's my chance' so I started that up in 2021. There will be a box in the Stonewall library where people can just come in and drop off their electronics. That way, there's not a worry if you can't make it on a specific day because you can go during any of those times that it's open."

In addition to aiming for the scholarship, Dearsley is happy to support an environmental initiative that resonates with her.

"It's really important to recycle your electronics. It's one of our major things that we're sending to the landfill and it has a lot of environmental repercussions," she said.

"Specifically by recycling them, we're preventing a lot of new material from being created. It's something that's so simple but it makes a really big impact.'



Breathe in the outdoors in Whiteshell Provincial Park. This slice of the Canadian Shield is rich in sunsets, Indigenous roots, boreal forest and year-round adventure. This summer, hit the road and remember home is where the heart is.



to many amazing canoe routes, but one of the most popular runs through the picturesque **Caddy** Lake Tunnels in the southern end of the park. Caddy Lake connects to North Cross Lake and South Cross Lake through granite tunnels and offers both short and weekend paddling options. Canoe rentals are available at Caddy Lake Resort

Whiteshell Provincial Park is home

Relish the beauty of McGillivray Falls on this moderate hike, which provides rewarding views of McGillivray Lake. The falls themselves are located near the beginning of the trail and are best viewed in the

Next, welcome to West Hawk Lake, the not-so-sleepy summer town known for its amazing trails. deep lake (formed by a meteor!) and its high energy, lake-life vibes. Restaurants here serve up the classics. like burgers and ice cream, enjoyed in dining rooms or patios. Whether you set your home base at the campground or in one of the town's motels and resorts, there's plenty to keep you occupied at West Hawk Lake. Hunt Lake Trail, one of

Manitoba's most popular wilderness trails, launches off from West Hawk Lake— the average hiker needs at least five hours to complete this challenging trail. For an easier trek, take the **Dragon** Fire Trail that's located in the campground. This trail starts low

in the trees and continues to the top of the rock face, where you will be treated to sweeping views of the lake. West Hawk is also known for its

spectacular beaches and crystal clear water. There are several beaches to choose from, the main Crescent Beach (featuring a long stretch of sand and interpretive signs explaining the lake's meteor history) and Miller Beach, a smaller beach located in the campground that offers a bit more solitude.

For even more ways to get out into the water, West Hawk Marina rents out paddleboats. kayaks, standup paddleboards and canoes. The marina also provides lifejackets, which are absolutely essential for staying safe while on the water.





WHERE THE SPIRIT SITS

There are three entry points to Whiteshell Provincial Park

Highway 1 east to access the South Whiteshell and Provincial Trunk Highway 44 or Provincial Road 307 to access the North Whiteshell. Start off in the northern end of the park at **Nutimik Lake**, where a favourite trail is an easy and convenient 4.2-kilometre hike located right off the campground. Take a walk to the stunning Whiteshell River Suspension Bridge. The trail also leads to **Sturgeon Falls**, where large, lake-wide rapids await.

The **Bannock Point** Petroforms (known to the Anishinaabe as Manitouabee or where the spirit sits) is a sacred site with stones laid out on the bedrock in the shapes of snakes. turtles and a Thunderbird. The rock formations are believed to have been made centuries ago for teaching and healing ceremonies. Set up a tour with Whiteshell Indigenous Knowledge and Wisdom to get the most out of your visit to the site Discover more at travelmanitoba.com/ Indigenous-Experiences.

Pine Point Rapids is one of Manitoba's most popular hikes. with several routes to choose from depending on your desired level of difficulty. If you have kids in tow, take the easier trail that goes directly to the rapids. A second section offers a more challenging trek over rocky landscapes. Another favourite spot is **Rainbow Falls**, where swimmers often gather.

Next, take a short detour to the **Alfred Hole Goose Sanctuary** and Interpretive Centre. The sanctuary offers free admission and a visitor centre that shares the story of the sanctuary, explains the biology of Canadian geese and offers opportunities to view the birds up close, especially during the fall migration.

There are nine different lodge and resort options in the North Whiteshell, with many offering amenities on site such as restaurants and convenience stores. This is in addition to ten campgrounds in the north and central parts of the park, including everything from full service to walk-in sites.





BEACH DAYS, BIG SWINGS AND TAKING THE REINS

It's time for the next leg of the trip, which ventures into another popular summer town, Falcon Lake. Spend a day with your toes in the sand or walk the boardwalk. Stop into local shops for clothing, souvenirs and tasty treats. Grab a bite to eat at one of the restaurants, drive-ins and

Nearby, you can get one of the best views in the Whiteshell from the **Top of** the World hike. The fourkilometre trail brings you to the highest elevation in the area. The trailhead is accessible from the parking lot at **Falcon** Trails Resort In addition to the resort here, there are four other lodges and resorts in this part of the park. There are five campgrounds as well at Falcon, West Hawk and Caddy Lakes.

Another way to explore the area is on a horseback riding excursion with Falcon Beach

Ranch. This ranch offers beautiful accommodations and horseback rides ranging from pony rides to 40- to 60-minute trail rides, with options that include adding on a cookout or even doing an overnight ride and pitching a lakeside tent.

To finish off an adventurous road trip to the Whiteshell, head to Falcon Lake Golf Course for a challenging 18hole course, with forest-lined fairways. Or choose mini-golf. where your chances for a holein-one are a whole lot better.

"We live over an hour outside of Winnipeg and travelling back and forth to practices sometimes gets a bit much, so we spend a lot of time training at home working in our garage. My parents also commit a lot of their time travelling with us and bringing us to camps and competi-

tions throughout Canada."

Anaka and Beau recently competed at Nationals for the first time, and both won the gold medals at their respective events. Anaka won gold in the U17 women's freestyle (61kg) division at the 2022 Canadian Wrestling Championships in Alberta. And Beau won gold in the U15 men's freestyle (62 kg division).

Chartrand is super excited and proud to now be representing Manitoba at the Canada Games next week in Niagara, Ontario.

"My goals for the Canada Games are to go out there and try my best to bring home a gold medal. Being at the younger end of the age category, I will be competing against girls who will be up to four years older than me. I look forward to being able to challenge and test myself out against some of the top wrestlers in the country."

In addition to the Canada Games, Chartrand will be pushing herself over the next couple of years to see

Laxdal named Oshawa Generals' new head coach



Derek Laxdal was named the Oshawa Generals' 35th head coach in team history last week.

The Ontario Hockey League's Oshawa Generals announced last Thursday that Derek Laxdal has been named the team's 35th head coach in its his-

Laxdal, 56, formerly of Stonewall, joins the Generals after spending three seasons with the NHL's Dallas Stars as an assistant coach to Rick Bowness from 2020-22, joining mid-season in 2019-20.

Generals' general manager and vice-president Roger Hunt is thrilled to have Laxdal as the team's new head coach.

"With Derek's track record of winning in junior and his list of players he has coached at the pro level, this is a huge step forward in our quest to bringing another championship to Oshawa," Hunt said on the Ontario Hockey League's website.

Before joining the Stars, Laxdal spent six seasons with the AHL affiliate Texas Stars as the head coach from 2014-2020.

In 380 AHL games, he compiled an impressive 189-139-52 record including a run to the Calder Cup final in 2018, losing in seven games to the Toronto Marlies. His other professional coaching experiences include five years in the ECHL with the Idaho Steelheads. Finishing with a winning record in all five seasons, Laxdal took the Steelheads to two Kelly Cup Championship finals, winning in 2007 and losing the finals in 2010.

Paired with his championship in 2007, he was also awarded ECHL Coach of the Year.

Laxdal also spent four seasons with the Edmonton Oil Kings from 2010-2014. During his tenure with the Oil Kings, Laxdal coached his team to three consecutive WHL finals, losing the championship final in 2013 but winning the Ed Chynoweth Cup in 2012 and 2014. His 2014 run continued with a Memorial Cup championship victory, defeating the Guelph Storm in the championship final 6-3.

As a player, Laxdal spent time with the WHL's Portland Winterhawks, Brandon Wheat Kings and New Westminster Bruins. Drafted in the eighth round, 151st overall by the Toronto Maple Leafs in the 1984 NHL Entry Draft, he spent parts of four seasons with the Leafs before being traded to the New York Islanders in 1989. His professional career would continue with stops in the AHL, SM-Liga, ECHL and the BHL. Laxdal retired from his playing career following his 2001 season with the Odessa Jackalopes.




