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Work continues on new Arrowquip building

The Woodlands-based facility is expected to be up and running in November

Laine Wilson, recreation director for the Teulon-Rockwood Recreation Commission, spoke with council at the Aug. 10 meeting about the recently completed Recreation Master Plan.

The councils from Stonewall, Teulon and Rockwood were involved in the development of the plan, which was prepared by HTFC Planning and Design.

The study recommended developing a north hub and a south hub for recreation as well as an overall body to operate those two hubs.

A steering committee continues to

meet with representation from the remains tabled. three councils and from the provincial government to try to determine the next steps.

In other council news:

The RM of Rockwood will sign the Gulay Street drainage contract with Blackstone Contracting for an estimated amount of \$78,285 plus tax. Meanwhile, council defeated a motion to sign the 2016 drainage work contract with Maple Leaf Construction for an estimated amount of \$988,744.

Quarry operators will put up signs at their entrance to discourage the use of engine retarder brakes. As well, council appointed Doug Carter as the citizen representative for the Rockwood Quarry District Planning Advisory Committee. As citizen representative, Carter will serve for a minimum one-year term.

Council granted a variation to Charles and Marjorie Amy to vary the residual property on a conditionally approved subdivision to 73 acres down from 80 acres and have the property comply with zoning requirements.

Council granted conditional use and a variation to Lana and Steve Hintz to build a garage and shop for their satellite installation business, TMC Satellite, at their property in Argyle.

The Freeman family spoke with council about a proposed subdivision in Grosse Isle. The matter came before council previously and was tabled. After some discussion, the item

Council approved the proposed Oughton subdivision subject to conditions.

Daniel Grenkow of Grenkow Grains Inc. applied for a licence to construct water control works on property owned by Magellan Industries. Council approved the application.

Council authorized the cancellation of 2016 property taxes totaling \$1,202.96 on properties registered to The Nature Conservancy of Canada. Coun. Mark Hidlebaugh opposed.

Council authorized that the sewer and water account for 152 School Rd. be cancelled in the amount of \$34.70 plus tax.

Council defeated motions to ask Manitoba Hydro to install LED street lights at Road 76 North and Road 8E, at Pike's Peak toboggan hill, at the west side of King Edward Street and Gillies Place, and at the south end of Maple Drive. The cost to install each street light would vary, as would the annual operating costs.

The RM will pay for the installation of a floodlight for the soccer parking area at an estimated cost of \$3,800 plus another \$600 for trenching.

The RM will donate two loads of gravel to the Age Friendly Committee for its outdoor equipment.

The William Kurelek Tribute Committee applied to the Highway Traffic Board to place a monument at the intersection of highways 7 and 67. Council approved the placement of

the monument, as long as the committee gets the applicable permit from the South Interlake Planning District. Council declared September 2016 as Muscular Dystrophy Awareness Month.

Council approved a liquor permit application for the Teulon Rodeo to operate an outdoor Barley Garden from noon to 8 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 27 and Sunday, Aug. 28 within a designated area west of the rodeo grounds as well as for a dance in the hockey arena on Saturday, Aug. 26 from 8 p.m. to 1 a.m. Council also approved the use of the RM's water truck for the weekend, if needed, to water down the track for the chuckwagon and chariot races.

Council gave first reading to a bylaw to set a reduced speed zone near Stony Mountain School.

Council granted conditional use agreements to David and Erika Schell. They also approved a conditional use agreement for Kevin Michael Hradowy to conduct vehicle safeties, automobile repairs and sales on his property. The RM will enter into a performance agreement with John Tollenaar of Longawaited Acres Ltd. for the placement of a mobile home on his property.

The RM will enter into an agreement with Artistic Landscaping for the caretaking of the Balmoral Waste Transfer Station for a term from June 1 to Dec. 31, 2016, at a cost of \$17,500 plus GST.

At the July 27 meeting, council asked CAO Chris Luellman about the viability of having a TIPPS program for residents to pay their tax bills in monthly or biweekly installments.

Warren Memorial Hall undergoes renovations

The Warren Memorial Hall is undergoing renovations the hall's caretaker Marlo Carlson said are necessary.

"The hall is rented out pretty much every weekend for birthdays, anniversaries and small weddings," said Carlson."We need to keep it up."

The hall's stairs were crumbling, and vehicles driving by during winter damaged the wheelchair ramp.

After the renovations, there will be a new set of stairs and wheelchair ramp. The ramp will be at the front of the building rather than the side to reduce damage from vehicles. There will also be an overhang, which will protect people from rain while waiting outside.

There have been some updates inside, including changing the once multi-coloured walls to white.

The hall went from having no weddings to two or three per year. Carlson said she thinks this is because of the updates inside and perhaps because people want smaller weddings. The hall's capacity is 230 people.

The 2016 financial plan was amended to include a \$25,000 transfer to the general operating fund from the recreation reserve towards 2016 recreation and culture grants.

- Rosser council provided recreation and culture grants to Meadows Community Club (\$530), Central Community Club in Rosser (\$1,980), Grosse Isle Community Club (\$1,465), Marquette Curling Club (\$50), Church of St. Michaels (\$45), trustees of Lilyfield Church (\$35) and trustees of Rosser Grosse Isle Church (\$55). Council also approved a grant of \$2,085 to the Vintage Locomotive Society.

- On behalf of the Rosser Fire Department, the RM of Rosser entered into an agreement with Emergency Services Marketing Corp. for its emergency responder reply system. As well, Rosser fire chief Mike Palmer attended the meeting to discuss an information request from the Partnership of the Manitoba Capital Region.

- Reid & Associates Chartered Professional Accountants Inc. are appointed auditor for the RM of Rosser for 2016.

- Council authorized CAO Bev Wells to provide Canada Post with civic addressing by range and section along with maps for specified areas.


- For all employees of the RM of Rosser, council adopted policies for company health and safety, harassment prevention and violence prevention.

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Interlake-Eastern RHA physician shortages leads to ER closures

Scheduled ER closures to begin Sept. 6

The majority of emergency rooms in hospitals across the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority will experience scheduled closures starting Sept. 6.

Until more doctors can be recruited, about eight of the region's 10 hospitals will experience ongoing, temporary ER closures.

"The only one for sure that we know ... won't be affected to any degree is the Selkirk General Hospital because that's where we have true emergency docs with 24-hour coverage," said Interlake-Eastern RHA CEO Ron Van Denakker during a conference call with media last Thursday. "It really depends on the availability of the doctors."

For the past few years, nurses have been staffing ERs in the absence of physicians, but that system will be replaced with scheduled closures.

In addition to Selkirk, Van Denakker said Pine Falls, which is fully staffed with five doctors, will unlikely see service disruptions.

"The east side of the lake is quite a bit more stable right now," said the CEO.

But hospitals along Highway 6 — Eriksdale and Ashern — will continue to suffer from physician shortages.

"I have a lot of compassion ... and empathy for the people on Highway 6," said Van Denakker, "and we are working really hard to try to deal with that."

Scheduled closures are expected to bring stability and predictability to ER service.

Physicians have agreed to provide the health authority with advanced notice — either one, two or three months—indicating what days they'll be available to staff ERs.

" 'I'm available on Thursday this week,' and it's already Tuesday. Or, 'I really can't make next Tuesday' --that's just not good enough," said Van Denakker."...our local health involvement groups ... they absolutely clobbered me on the fact that there was no predictability."

Physicians' ER schedules will be provided to the public through a toll-free number and posted on the Interlake-Eastern RHA's website.

Nurse-managed care of ERs came under fire this spring when a group of doctors in Selkirk spearheaded a petition to have it abolished.

"At the end of the day, what happened was the doctors did take a bit of a position on things and said that the

status quo was no longer sustainable from their perspective," said Van Denakker."And effectively the May long weekend, they wanted us to move towards removal of nurse-managed care."

The health authority negotiated with doctors to provide ER service over the summer months when the region's population doubles and asked them to support nurse-managed care until it could find an alternative.

The "Band-Aid" measure, as Van Denakker calls the scheduled closures, doesn't sit well with some RHA staff.

A paramedic in the RM Rockwood took to Facebook after learning of the scheduled closures from MGEU, the union representing paramedics and other health professionals who may go on strike.

"We have a region who is willing to close our hospitals and let EMS ... professionals go on strike rather than negotiate," wrote the paramedic. "I'm not usually one to be political but this is just downright offensive as a Canadian citizen that our health care in this region has been allowed to get to this."

It's unclear whether a possible strike by ambulance attendants could complicate the scheduled ER closure system.

"Both parties in this negotiation have agreed to get back to the negotiation table," said an Interlake-Eastern RHA spokesperson contacted after the conference call. "If they were to strike, essential service agreements are in place."

According to Van Denakker, nurses themselves raised concerns about scheduled closures.

They were "adamant" that they be permitted to assess patients who overlook or are unaware of a scheduled closure and show up at an ER, he said.

"There will be a sign that says something to the effect, 'No doctor. ... we're not accepting patients here; however, please do come in and speak with the staff,' " said Van Denakker.

Gov't reflects on Pallister's first 100 days in office

Manitoba's government says it's setting the course for an ambitious plan that will make the province the most improved in Canada, Premier Brian Pallister said last week.

"Just 100 days ago, our government was sworn into office and began the challenging work of fulfilling our vision for a better Manitoba," Pallister said. "We have started work to find savings, increase accountability and transparency, and create new possibilities for a brighter future for all Manitobans. The accomplishments we have made since coming into office just a few months ago reflect the important first steps of the careful approach we will pursue over the coming years."

Pallister noted progress made to date on identified priorities include:

• launching the Open Government Initiative including the release of ministerial mandate letters, Crown services framework letters, ministerial transition documents and introducing legislation setting out fixed dates for the beginning of the writ in a general election and a six-month time limit to call byelections;

• introducing a single-window application intake for cost-shared infrastructure funding;

• initiating a value-for-money review of government projects to be completed by KPMG and identifying savings for Budget 2017;

• reducing the size of government cabinet by one-third;

• incorporating an initial reduction of ambulance fees in Budget 2016 and committing to further reductions being made in future budgets; • creating the foundation for a relationship based on trust with indigenous leaders, which will lead to an engagement strategy implementing government's duty to consult;

• conducting regular meetings with municipalities and industry stakeholders to develop mutually beneficial plans for strategic infrastructure investment;

• having productive dialogue with premiers from across Canada on trade opportunities including significant progress on joining the New West Partnership with Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia and the agreement in principle on a new Canada Free Trade Agreement;

• initiating consultation with tourism industry representatives to develop the framework for a 96/4 tourism strategy;

• introducing the proposed protecting children (information sharing) act, which would allow information to be shared about children in need of supportive services; and

• abolishing the "vote tax" subsidy for political parties and committing to a path forward that will restore Manitobans' right to vote on major tax increases.

"Coming into government, we knew that we were inheriting a significant fiscal challenge that would require a new focus and a commitment to getting Manitoba back on track. We have made good progress so far in building the base for a better Manitoba and identifying the targets that we must meet in order to achieve success, but much work lies ahead," said Pallister.

"As we move forward, we will look to the north for untapped opportu-

nities and strategic investments, we will build upon our relationships and partnerships both within Manitoba and outside our borders, we will continue to reduce red tape and waste, and we will consult with Manitobans on their priorities as we move toward Budget 2017."

Pallister added the frameworks for a Health Care Sustainability and Innovation Review, Red Tape Reduction Task Force and Premier's Enterprise Team have been completed and work is underway to identify innovative Manitobans to serve on each panel.

"Now 100 days into our mandate, we have established targets and started the work necessary to achieve better results for Manitoba," Pallister said.

"We are proud of our success to date

and are inspired by the opportunity to collaborate with Manitobans to improve services and build a stronger foundation for our economy."

Opposition leader Flor Marcelino said in his first 100 days, Pallister failed Manitoba families and put the brakes on job creation.

"In opposition, Pallister made sweeping promises about making Manitoba the 'most improved province in Canada' but he seems determined to do the opposite now that he's in power," Marcelino said in a release last week. "On his watch the unemployment rate has climbed, investments in infrastructure have stalled, families who need child care are being ignored, the North is being snubbed and the environment is suffering."

Province seeks public's input on recycling programs

The province wants to hear what you think about new five-year plans for various industry-led programs that handle the collection, recycling and disposal of designated materials.

"I encourage Manitobans, program partners, not-for-profit organizations

and other stakeholders to comment on the new plans," Sustainable Development Minister Cathy Cox said in a release."This is an excellent opportunity for all Manitobans to have input into how we shape stewardship programs in Manitoba over the next five years." Producer responsibility organizations (PROs) have submitted program plans for products such as paper and packaging, paint, fluorescent lights, electronics, batteries, unused medications, mercury-containing thermostats, tires and more. Currently, the province has 12 industry-led steward-

ship programs that divert approximately 120,000 tonnes of designated materials from landfills and generate about \$42 million in revenue annually, Cox said.

The stewardship plans are available for review on the Green Manitoba website greenmanitoba.ca/new-stewardship-plans/. Printed copies of the plans are available by calling 204-945-0578 or 1-866-460-3118 (toll-free). The deadline for comment on the plans is Oct. 4. their removal yet making no provision themselves to fill the breach.

The Interlake-Eastern RHA needs, at a minimum, 20 to 25 doctors in order to maintain ERs 24-7, said the CEO.

The College of Physicians & Surgeons of Manitoba, which oversees standards of medical practice, indicated that it's up to the health authority to address physician shortages.

"The College would not comment on this issue. It is a Regional Health Authority issue," said a spokesperson by email.

The Interlake-Eastern RHA is funded by the provincial government.

Van Denakker said the Interlake-Eastern RHA (formerly two separate health regions until 2012) is underfunded in comparison to other RHAs. The provincial average is about \$6,000 per head, but the Interlake-Eastern RHA is "somewhere around \$2,000 per head."

"The former North Eastman health

and the former Interlake health region were very, very low-funded regions, and they were combined," he said, "so it's basically combining — I hate to say the term the poor sisters but, quite frankly, that was the case."

A government spokesperson sent the *Tribune* information about the global funding model used to allocate resources to RHAs but did not say whether the Interlake-Eastern RHA will receive additional funding to help attract and retain doctors in order to avert future service crises.

An email statement from Minister of Health Kelvin Goertzen said "reliable access to front-line services for all Manitobans" is a priority and the government will continue to work with the Interlake-Eastern RHA.

"The health region has assured government that a plan is in place to provide safe, accessible care to people throughout the area and to make emergency department care more predictable," said Goertzen.

For his part, Van Denakker said he is

working with the province to address physician shortages, which includes recruiting international medical graduates. But for long-term stability, he said the region needs homegrown doctors who would be more likely to stay.

"We are the only region in this entire province that does not have a residency teaching program, which means it makes it very difficult to retain students," he said.

Van Denakker said he had met with municipal leaders in the region to advise them of the upcoming closures and to seek their assistance in communicating with residents.

Based on what Van Denakker told Arborg and Bifrost-Riverton councillors on Aug. 10, Arborg Mayor Randy Sigurdson said emergency room services will likely improve in the near future.

"As soon as we get some more doctors — and there's going to be some more coming into the region next year — ... we'll have emergency rooms open all over the place," said Sigurdson. "We're in short supply right now and they're just trying to ... streamline it. They're not shutting down any emergency rooms as such."

A number of hospitals will see new physicians on board shortly.

Beausejour will get two and Pinawa is scheduled to get one from the U.K.

Arborg, Eriksdale and Gimli will be getting one each. The Amenity healthcare group in Gimli may have another doctor willing to take ER shifts.

The Interlake-Eastern RHA is in talks with the government to get access to a graduate from the Northern Rural Health program for Ashern.

Teulon and Stonewall were not discussed during the conference call.

"I want to be very clear ... that there's absolutely no intention to close hospitals," said Van Denakker.

"There's no intention to close beds. And there's absolutely no intention to close emergency rooms."

Treasury Board is the financial oversight committee of the executive council of the government of Manitoba. It consists of the minister of finance and other government ministers.

Treasury Board members now include:

• Finance Minister Cameron Friesen as chair;

• Agriculture Minister Ralph Eichler as vice-chair;

• Growth, Enterprise and Trade Minister Cliff Cullen;

• Families Minister Scott Fielding;

• Infrastructure Minister Blaine Ped-

ersen; and • Justice Minister Heather Stefan-

son.

"As deputy premier and minister of


justice and attorney general for Manitoba, Heather Stefanson has navigated many of the most complicated files facing our government in our first 100 days," said the premier.

"Having successfully finalized discussions with the federal government and Air Canada to protect and strengthen our province's diverse aerospace sector and leading the continuing consultations with Indigenous leadership and the federal government on the National Inquiry for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls, Heather will bring a wealth of knowledge and experience to the Treasury Board process."

The premier also announced plans for the appointment of Reg Helwer, MLA for Brandon West, and Colleen Mayer, MLA for St. Vital, as members of the province's Treasury Board to provide further scrutiny of government expenditures and operations.

On June 14, the government introduced Bill 6, the financial administration amendment act, which would permit the appointment of members of the Legislative Assembly other than ministers to be appointed to Treasury Board. The proposed bill, currently at first reading, would require the chair, vice-chair and a majority of the members of Treasury Board to be ministers. "An experienced businessman and entrepreneur, Reg Helwer serves as vice-chair of the Public Accounts Committee in his role as MLA while Colleen Mayer brings extensive board experience and dealings with business owners," said Pallister.

"The addition of these two MLAs to Treasury Board would enhance the ability of government's legislative branch to ensure value for money and the responsible management of Manitobans' tax dollars."

Interlake RHA heading back to bargaining table

In an effort to avoid a march to the picket line, local health-care and EMS workers are heading back to the bargaining table next week.

The Manitoba Government and General Employees' Union (MGEU) locals 411 and 418 are expected to begin negotiations with the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority (IERHA) next week regarding their collective bargaining agreement.

"MGEU has confirmed in a letter to Provincial Health Labour Relations Services dated Aug. 5 their request to return to the bargaining table," IERHA said in a statement released last week. "Both parties have agreed to return to the table to discuss non-monetary issues to attempt to achieve a resolution."

MGEU Local 411 is a team of health-care professionals, which includes home care case and resource co-ordinators, palliative care co-ordinators, mental health workers, dietitians, pharmacists, occupational therapists and physiotherapists, while MGEU 418 is

made up of EMS workers.

The union rejected a final offer from their employer in March due to"ongoing concerns over recruitment and retention and excessive workloads," MGEU president Michelle Gawronsky said.

In early August, Local 411 and 418 members voted "yes" on a strike vote, bringing them closer to the possibility of a strike.

The union said if they did not get back to the bargaining table with IERHA soon, a strike would likely be the next step.

Gawronsky said getting the IER-HA to agree to return to the bargaining table is a good first step towards avoiding a strike.

"We're ecstatic," Gawronsky said. "We've been asking since the day the members said no to the collective agreement back in March to get back to the table.

"This is not about money, this is about fatigue issues for our EMS workers and retention issues for our case workers, but they kept telling us they didn't have a mandate to go back to the table, so we're ecstatic 'cause were going

back to the table after months of requests."

MGEU members held information pickets in a number of areas in the Interlake including Selkirk between July 18 and 20.


Gawronsky was asked if those information pickets, and the "yes" strike vote in August may have combined to force the IERHA back to the table.

"I think that's the gist of it," she said. "I think the strike vote definitely let them know where we were at.

"It was a very sound message from the membership that they are not happy with things."

IERHA said in a statement released last week that if a strike were to happen, they are prepared to continue offering health-care services to Manitobans.

"We have essential services agreements in place and will provide essential services to Manitobans in our region in the event of job action. Of necessity, service levels will be required to be adjusted as a result," IERHA said in a statement released last Monday.





More growers crop up at community veggie garden

The Stonewall Community Vegetable Garden is proving to be fertile ground for cultivating a healthy interest in growing your own fresh fare.

South Interlake Garden Club president Tanya Daher said involvement in the community garden has grown exponentially this year. Currently, 14 plots are in use, up from five in 2014 and six in 2015.

The growth stems mainly from word of mouth about the community garden, which is located behind the cemetery in Stonewall's industrial area. The Town of Stonewall owns the land, which is pegged for future cemetery expansion, and the South Interlake Garden Club operates the community garden initiative with help from the town when needed.

"Someone heard about it and then they spread the news to their friends," Daher said."It was just word of mouth. It was all sold before we would even think about advertising." For a season, it costs \$30 for a 15-by-30 plot or \$15 for a half-plot. For next season, organizers can make room for even more growers if interest continues to bloom.

"We can still include more," Daher said, "but we have to work through some kinks because when you get more room, then you have more space that you have to till."

Currently a little bit of everything is sprouting up at the garden, although perennials are not allowed.

"You can't do perennials because there's no guarantee that you'll get the plot again next year. You have the first dibs at the same plot that you had last year, but there's no guarantee," Daher said."All in all, things are going very well. It's very clean and cute in there. I'm very impressed."

The current gardeners are mainly green thumbs who don't have an ideal yard for growing.

"It's people who have either moved to Lions or people who had too much

shade or too many trees in their backyard," Daher said.

Garden club member Tania Laurie is one of those growers with a shady yard, so she reaps the rewards of her plot at the garden.



"There are also a couple of people that are sharing a garden,"Laurie said. "Other people might want to have extra tomatoes or other things."

For the past few years, Laurie has compiled a list of people who are interested in renting a plot for the next growing season. As the season approaches, she begins to phone people in the order that they contacted her to determine who is still interested.

It's never too early to add your name to the list, so interested gardeners can contact Laurie at 204-467-5996. For those who already have a plot at the community garden, she would like to know when they are leaving for holidays so she can tend their garden in while they're away.

Stress a Legitimate Reason for Leaving Work



Due to cutbacks in many sectors of the economy, fewer workers are often expected to do more work with diminished resources. What this means is increased stress and pressure in the workplace. There is the strain of the increased workload, as well as the complaints that accompany the consequences of cutbacks. People become annoyed when they are on hold longer, must wait longer for services such as lab tests (witness the lineups in our local labs), or simply are not getting the same standard of service they are used to.

Frustration is often vented at the front line employees, who are already stressed enough just trying to keep up. After receiving the brunt of complaints about things over which they have no control, and which bug them just as much, they become less patient with those whom they serve.

They may begin the day with good intentions and a positive attitude, but being human, they can only take so much. Soon the stress takes its toll, and may produce symptoms such as headaches, ulcers, anxiety or depression. It becomes harder to do the job, and then more difficult to get out of bed in the morning. Realizing that absence from work will put more strain on colleagues, or create financial strain, the worker forces him or herself to keep going.

Ultimately work performance suffers and/or health is compromised to the point that time off work is the only option. The individual, who once took pride in his or her work, even had positive performance evaluations, feels like a failure. Embarrassed and ashamed, the employee retreats and hides out at home.

It is awkward to be on sick leave when you do not have a visible,



physical illness. Well meaning relatives suggest that they pull themselves together, get back to work, and stop taking things so seriously. Naturally they then feel that they are being judged for their inability to cope. Before, they were stressed about work, now they are stressed about being off work. Sometimes this results in a worsening of their condition. The time off which was supposed to allow for healing, becomes a stressor itself. How can we break this cycle?

We must first acknowledge that stressful work situations are not healthy, and that employees are human beings who should be viewed as more than cogs in the system that can be replaced when they wear (burn) out. Next, we must recognize stress leave as a legitimate reason to be off work. When an organization has increasing numbers of employees on stress leave, it is time to look at all aspects of the work environment. And finally, it is important to realize that a person can look perfectly healthy and strong, yet be crumbling inside. What they need is lots of rest, minimal demands, and a long enough recovery period that they can forget about work for awhile. With rest, and renewal, they will be ready to start back to work. But it is only with some new coping strategies, and different ways of viewing things, that they can avoid falling into the stress trap all over again.

Wirgau agreed it was a tough challenge competing against the older players.

"We didn't do too (well in the win) department," admitted Wirgau, a 5-foot-8, 180-pound power forward. "But the majority of the games we played, (the other team) was older than us by one or two years.

"It was a good experience playing against them, though, because some of them had played together for eight years, so they really got to bond."

In comparison, the Cowboys had just 10 practices together in Alberta before the tournament. The Canadian team was made up of players scattered across western Canada.


Wirgau admitted it was difficult getting used to being on the ice during the summer months.

"I wasn't on the ice for a month before that," he said. "At the beginning, we were all really out of shape because no one had really been on the ice. But after a while, we started to get the feel back for it."


