Community grieves for well-respected physician

The Stonewall community shared heartfelt tributes, fresh flowers and fond memories of a doctor who made a difference in the lives of many.

Dr. Majid Zahiri died in the evening on Tuesday, Oct. 14 surrounded by people who cared for him, including Stonewall health-care staff who worked alongside him.

Zahiri received his medical training in Iran and graduated in 1995. After moving to Manitoba, he completed the medical licensure program for international medical graduates and launched his local career with family practice in The Pas. Over time, Zahiri relocated to the Interlake.

In 2016, he worked under Dr. Michele Matter's supervision in Selkirk's emergency department. Soon after, he agreed to help provide coverage in Arborg for family practice and in the emergency department to cover a two-week planned vacation leave.

Later that year, he began his practice at Stonewall and District Health Centre, where he served as a family physician and emergency care provider.

For Matter, she looks back fondly on the time she spent working with Zahiri

"I felt so sad when I heard of his passing. I remember him fondly, especially how excited he was at the birth of his son, which occurred in his early 40s. We had a lot of fun working together in the Selkirk ER where he was loved by staff and patients alike," she said.

"I found him to be a true empath as he would go out of his way to help his patients, whom he considered like family. His passing is a loss to Stone-

wall, the IERHA and the province of Manitoba. Majid, you will be very much missed."

Dr. Scott Gregoire, vice-president of medical services and chief medical officer, said Zahiri left a mark by providing exceptional care to patients in the Interlake-Eastern region for the past nine years.

"Dr. Zahiri has been an integral part of the care team in Stonewall, and we can't thank him enough for his contributions to our region and our province," Gregoire said.

"His dedication to providing compassionate care to his community alongside his colleagues will not be soon forgotten. We offer our deepest condolences to Dr. Zahiri's family and friends, his patients and every-

one who knew him."

On social media, tributes flooded in with shared memories and appreciation for the hard-working doctor. One person, who dropped off flowers at the hospital, expressed gratitude for Zahiri's years of care in the community.

"We are here to show our support to our Stonewall hospital staff and our love we had for such an amazing soul," she wrote.

It's a terrible loss for the Stonewall community, noted another person on social media.

"I'll miss seeing his big truck parked outside the hospital and his assortment of hats," she wrote. "Dr. Zahiri was such an intelligent man and an incredible doctor."

Another person described Zahiri as an extraordinary individual who touched countless lives, including her own.

"Your kindness, compassion and generosity inspired me to be a better person," she wrote. "I'll carry your memory with me always."

Something Beautiful closes; Stonewall council updates projects

Stonewall's mayor reflected on the impactful contributions that Something Beautiful has made to the community.

The café and gift shop closed its doors on Sept. 26 after operating for more than a decade as a social enterprise through Community Living Interlake.

"We are deeply grateful to Community Living Interlake for their vision and commitment," Mayor Sandra Smith said. "Something Beautiful truly lived up to its name, enriching lives and strengthening our community through compassion, creativity, and inclusion. We applaud their continued service as they focus on core programs that support individuals and families more directly."

Something Beautiful and Community Living Interlake will also not be running the canteen as planned at the Veterans Memorial Sports Complex for the 2025-26 season. As a result, the town is current looking at alternative options for canteen operations.

IN OTHER COUNCIL NEWS:

Council authorized a Thunder Hill Drive resident to keep three dogs for companionship through an excess animal permit for a one-year period. After that, the permit will need to be renewed.

The applicant moved to Stonewall from Winnipeg in January and wasn't aware that a maximum of two dogs is allowed per household in town. She recently got a puppy through her job at a veterinary clinic, which works closely Manitoba Underdogs Rescue.

"The idea was a slow transition because we have an 11.5-year-old and a 7.5-year-old who are very, very bonded together," she said in reference to her other two dogs.

Mayor Sandra Smith welcomed her to Stonewall and thanked her for following proper procedures by obtaining the permit.

The Town of Stonewall continues to work with the property owner who purchased the former Texaco gas station site across from The Kiln. The property owner's plan is to put a Dairy Queen on the site.

Archie Gray Park to install new base material around the play structure for accessibility.

"By changing out the pea gravel, we will improve the accessibility for those with physical barriers," said CAO Wally Melnyk.

Council gave second and third readings to a bylaw related to the borrowing and spending of funds for a roadwork project to upgrade about 560 metres of Limestone Bay from gravel to asphalt. The town is looking to borrow \$500,000 at an estimated 5.5 per cent interest per year from 2026 to 2035. The total estimated cost of the project is \$600,000 and the remainder would be covered through the town's Canada community building reserve fund.

To pay the debenture, the funds will be generated from the increased assessment that has occurred due to the recent investments made by a number of businesses in the industrial park," Melnyk said.

The town is participating in the 100 Radon Test Kit Challenge.

"It's free. It's an awesome thing to do," said Coun. Kimberly Newman, who is putting up posters around town. "As a homeowner, it gives you that peace of mind."

- Council also gave first reading to a bylaw to establish new water and wastewater rates and to regulate fees for licensing septic haulers. They plan to resubmit the request to the Public Utilities Board due to the recent change in the PUB linking rate increases to the Bank of Canada rate.
- The Town of Stonewall is applying for funding through the provincial government's Growth, Renewal and Opportunities program, which aims to address critical infrastructure needs under the themes of renewal, innovation and climate resiliency. The town will apply for 50 per cent funding of a project to expand its multi-use active transportation infrastructure in an effort to improve safety, climate resiliency and accessibility while also fostering physical activity. The other half of the funding would come from the town's Canada community building reserve.
 - Stonewall's mayor, council-

lors and CAO are authorized to attend the annual Association of Manitoba Municipalities fall convention from Nov. 25 to 27 at the RBC Convention Centre in Winnipeg.

- The Town of Stonewall will enter into a licence renewal agreement as well as a lease and easement with Rogers Communications Cana-
- Council conditionally approved a request from the Stonewall Kinsmen to hold a Christmas food drive in support of the Stonewall food bank using a truck, trailer, inflatables and music.
- The town supports an annual increase to the Manitoba Water Services Board's capital budget to \$100 million from its current \$24 million.

"This is a request from the Manitoba municipal administrators and they're looking for support," Smith said.

Council had previously approved a change in plan for the kiln project, which involves demolishing the two kilns that haven't been restored. The project will also create public space and develop an amphitheatre. The town will accept a \$74,000 proposal from Scatliff + Miller + Murray to provide architectural advisory services and to complete design work for the public space and amphitheatre portion of the kiln redevelopment project.

Over the course of the winter, they'll do the rest of the design work for the amphitheatre, walkway, green space ... and then hopefully we'll be able to go to tender in spring and the work can be done as part of the 2026 construction season," Melnyk said, adding that a provincial grant will help to cover the costs.

In addition, the town will accept a \$22,100 quote from Crosier Kilgour for consulting engineering services related to removing the two unrestored north kilns. Council also approved an application for a municipal heritage permit for the Quarry Park interpretive area and kilns.

The town will accept a proposal from Parkka for professional services supporting the capital campaign for the Stonewall and district

Province sees progress in hip, knee surgeries at Selkirk hospital

The Manitoba government says it's making steady progress on reducing surgical wait times, with nearly 400 hip and knee replacements now completed through the new outpatient program at Selkirk Regional Health Centre.

As of Oct. 16, the program has performed 399 procedures — nearly halfway to its target of 800 by the end of the fiscal year — Health, Seniors and Long-Term Care Minister Uzoma Asagwara announced this week.

"This investment is about helping more Manitobans live free of pain so they can get back to what they love," said Asagwara. "Too many Manitobans have had to wait a year or more for a relatively simple hip or knee replacement, but we are helping the 'long waiters' by investing in the Selkirk program. We're seeing progress as our waitlist drops, but we know we have to keep going."

The province invested \$5.7 million in March to launch the outpatient surgical program, expanding operating space and hiring additional staff. Provincial data shows the number of patients removed from the hip and knee waitlist rose sharply this year — from 104 in February to 378 in June.

Asagwara said more Manitobans are now receiving surgeries than being added to the waitlist. In September 2024, the list grew by 167 patients, but this September, 213 patients received their surgeries, marking another de-

Dr. Ed Buchel, provincial surgery specialty lead for Shared Health, said the program's success reflects strong collaboration between Selkirk and Winnipeg surgical teams.

"By adding 800 surgeries — about 11 per cent of the roughly 7,000 joint replacements in Manitoba — we are taking a major step toward reducing the wait list and helping people access care within recommended timelines," said Buchel. "We're already seeing the number of people waiting and the time they wait going down.'

The government has also expanded

health-care capacity across the Interlake-Eastern region, adding 30 medicine beds, a 15-bed transitional care unit and funding for seven-days-aweek discharge at the Selkirk hospital. Construction is also underway on a new 95-bed personal care home in Lac du Bonnet, with additional projects planned for Arborg and Winnipeg's Transcona neighbourhood.

For Selkirk resident Ronald Borecky, the expansion made all the difference.

"I didn't expect to be the first hip replacement after the expansion, but then in March I got the call," he said. "Everything went smoothly from the moment I walked in. The doctor and nurses were kind, they explained everything, and the hospital looked impressive. I couldn't believe I walked out of the hospital hours after my operation.'

Since October 2023, the Manitoba government has added more than 3,400 net new health-care workers provincewide, including 285 physicians and over 1,100 nurses.

Farmers invited to safely dispose of old pesticides, animal meds

Manitoba producers will have an opportunity to safely dispose of unwanted farm chemicals and expired livestock medications later this month through Cleanfarms' free collection program, running Oct. 27 to 31 at 20 sites across the province.

The initiative, supported by the Canadian Animal Health Institute and crop protection industry partners, helps farmers responsibly manage hazardous materials and reduce environmental risks.

"This is one of our longest-running programs and continues to provide meaningful environmental benefits across the country," said Barry Friesen, Cleanfarms' executive direc-

tor. "We're proud to offer Manitoba farmers a free drop-off and a trusted way to dispose of these materials."

Local collection sites include:

Drop-off hours are 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day.

Farmers can bring obsolete agricultural pesticides with a Pest Control Product number and livestock or equine medications bearing a DIN, serial number or notification number. Items not accepted include treated seed, sharps or needles, medicated feed, aerosol containers and household pesticides or medications. Cleanfarms reminds producers to ensure materials are clearly labelled and

securely packaged before drop-off.



Manitoba Hydro inspecting Natural Gas meters and regulators

Manitoba Hydro employees and contractors will be visiting homes and businesses over the next 12 to 14 months to conduct a province-wide audit of natural gas meters and regulators.

The audit will take place in communities across Manitoba — both urban and rural — and will include about 90,000 residential and commercial customers, the utility said.

If Hydro personnel need to enter a premises to inspect a meter, customers will not have to provide their names, account numbers or any other type of personal information. Personnel will also be displaying a Manitoba Hydro identification badge.

"Meters measure the volume of natural gas consumed. Regulators control the pressure. The meters and regulators may be located together or in separate places outside or inside a residence or business," said Manitoba

Hydro in an Oct. 9 news release. "This audit is critical for the continued safe and reliable delivery of natural gas to our customers. It is a separate process from meter reading."

In addition to their identification badge, Manitoba Hydro employees and contractors will be wearing specific Hydro-branded high-visibility shirts or vests.

"The personnel will inspect natural gas meters and regulators if they are readily accessible, but if necessary, they will come to the door and ask to be directed to the gas meter and regulator," states the release.

Customers should be aware that Manitoba Hydro employees or contractors performing this work will display their identification, be working from sunrise to sunset (as adjusted to the season) and may also work later hours in rural areas, may ask to enter a private residence or business for the purpose of auditing gas meters



and regulators, and will not ask for names, account numbers or any other personal information.

Federal funds to boost Manitoba's manufacturing sector

Nine Manitoba manufacturers received a funding boost from the federal government, including one in the heart of the Interlake.

Eleanor Olszewski, minister of Emergency Management and Community Resilience and minister responsible for Prairies Economic Development Canada (PrairiesCan), recently announced more than \$21 million in federal investments for nine Manitoba-based businesses. These investments will help companies expand, improve productivity and remain competitive on the global stage.

"Manitoba's innovators are turning bold ideas into real opportunities for their businesses, their communities and our families," Olszewski said.

"The Government of Canada is not only investing in these projects, but we are also investing in the people behind them as they take their innovations to the next level. This is how we are helping businesses grow, create high quality jobs and strengthen one Canadian economy."

Northquip Inc. in Woodlands is receiving PrairiesCan support to commercialize a line of zero-turn mowers by investing in advanced manufacturing equipment and undertaking market development activities, including equipment demonstrations.

Northquip is receiving \$3,331,700 in funding.

In Winkler, Schnell Industries Inc. is receiving \$423,699 in federal funding to design, build and market a fully electric transloader, which is engineered to facilitate the loading, unloading or transferring of granular materials.

Also in Winkler, ICON Technologies is receiving \$4,998,688 in funding. The company will use the support from PrairiesCan to expand their recreational vehicle plastic component manufacturing capacity through investments in equipment and personnel. The funds will also support marketing activities to increase both domestic and export revenue, leading to the creation of more jobs.

In Morden, Decor Cabinets Ltd. is receiving \$3,221,003 to increase manufacturing capacity and efficiency to enable Decor to supply new markets, increase market share and grow rev-

In Portage la Prairie, Manitoba Organic Alliance Inc. is receiving a PrairiesCan investment of \$278,438 to create a digital marketplace to grow the organic grain industry in Manitoba by connecting producers and buyers. This project will improve trade readiness and industry growth by providing critical business information and trade insights regarding the factors

that will influence future supply and demand.

In Crystal City, PhiBer Manufacturing Inc. is receiving a \$4,135,000 PrairiesCan investment to expand their manufacturing capacity to scale up production of innovative agricultural equipment to meet a growing demand.

In Glenboro, Prairie Fava Ltd. is receiving \$1,501,178 in funding to optimize their processes and expand the grower network to meet the increasing demand for fava beans.

In Notre Dame de Lourdes, UKKÖ Robotics Inc. is receiving \$529,284 to expand production of automated agricultural equipment and carbon soil sensor technologies to meet current unmet demand and to position the company for future growth in both domestic and international markets.

In Winnipeg, Security Glass Ltd. is receiving a Prairies Can investment of \$2,705,000 to expand their flat glass manufacturing capacity, which will boost local manufacturing and job creation in Manitoba.

In 2024, Manitoba's manufacturing sector employed approximately 63,000 people, about 10 per cent of the province's total workforce. These new investments are expected to support about 285 new jobs.

In just two weeks, I'll be making my 23rd trip to Israel, the land of the Bible, as I am hosting a tour group of 18 folks. I must say that I still greatly enjoy these trips, even if I've been there so many times.

One reason is because on each trip I still get to see something new. Many of these are recent archeological discoveries that've been made. For example, on my trip in November 2014, I made my first visit to Magdala, a fishing village that had been situated on the western shores of the Sea of Galilee. Magdala was the home of the well known follower of Jesus Christ, Mary Magdalene (lit. "Mary of Magdala").

The site of Magdala was only recently uncovered, in 2009. Magdala was built in about 30 BC and then destroyed in 66 AD by the Romans during the First Jewish Revolt. And then it lay covered by debris, untouched for 20 centuries.

When archeologists began digging, they uncovered the city's original synagogue. You can still see the mosaic floor tile and the stone seats used by worshippers. As I stood there looking at those tiles and stone seats, I realized that Mary Magdalene, as a worshipper of God, would have regularly attended that synagogue. She would have walked on those very tiles and sat on one of those same seats! And, no doubt, when Jesus had spoken there (we are told in the Bible that He preached in all the synagogues around Galilee), she would have decided to follow Him.

So for me, my faith was once again strengthened. I appreciate that because almost daily you can read skeptics scoffing and ridiculing people like myself for believing a "Book of Myths", called the Bible.

And yet, every turn of the archeologist's shovel brings more and more confirmation of the truthfulness, accuracy and reliabilty of that very same Book.

And that refreshes me and my

So I can hardly wait to get back to Israel, once again!

Rockwood advances 'aging in place' housing project

Rockwood council news in brief

The RM of Rockwood is taking steps towards a project that will provide an opportunity for seniors to age in the community.

Council approved architectural and design build plans by Mistecture Architecture for the project in the Stony Mountain area.

"There's going to be two-bedroom units, single-bedroom units and, as far as I know, two bachelor suites. It's a need for our aging citizens. This will give them an option if they don't want to stay in their houses and they still want to be part of the community," Reeve Wes Taplin said.

"The lift station that it's going to be tied to is being worked on as we speak. The excavator is in the field north of Allard Place."

In addition, council authorized the South Interlake Planning District to approve and issue the required building and development permits prior to the required application for conditional use.

IN OTHER COUNCIL NEWS:

The RM of Rockwood is withdrawing from JohnQ Public, which is is a voluntary Municipal Participation Corporation. Founded in 2018, the co-

operative organization supports community infrastructure development and economic growth in and around Winnipeg.

"We've had some great projects from them like the daycare and climate resiliency. But lately their direction and our direction have been getting farther apart with what their priority and their visions are," Taplin said.

"Council has talked about this numerous times. At this time, council is choosing to withdraw from it."

- Council authorized selling two old recycling sheds from the Winfield Transfer Station to a bidder for \$4,100.
- The RM of Rockwood will preserve trees and remove ballast from the rail line south of Balmoral for about 200 metres. Council also ordered the removal of all structures and personal items from residents who are encroaching on the rail trail property.



Teulon Day Care celebrates 50 years of caring

The Teulon Day Care Centre marked a remarkable milestone on Thursday, Oct. 17, celebrating 50 years of nurturing and supporting local families.

Families past and present, staff, board members and community leaders gathered to honour the centre's legacy and the people who helped build it. The evening included speeches, cake and presentations recognizing decades of dedication to early childhood education in Teulon.

"It makes me so full of pride to reach this milestone," said Lori Malcolm, director of Teulon Day Care. "It is so important that we are able to allow young children to be brought up in a small community, and for it to be 50 years is just amazing."

A highlight of the celebration came when Selkirk-Interlake-Eastman MP James Bezan presented a commemorative plaque to acknowledge the centre's 50 years of service. Joining him for the presentation were staff member Roxanne Pawluk; Sharon Waluk Green; Nienke Kolster, the centre's first director; Malcolm; Mayor Todd Campbell; current board chair Niki Strick; and former chair Brittany Phill.

A special moment was shared between Patti Solumundson and her mother, Moira Solumundson, whose family helped found the daycare. Moira and her husband Herb were among the original visionaries who brought child care to Teulon, and Patti holds the distinction of being the very first child ever enrolled at the centre.

What began as a program caring for eight preschoolers and one staff member out of the Christian Education Building has since expanded to care for four infants, 37 preschoolers, 35 before-and-after-school program participants and an average of 14 staff. The centre moved into a new building in 2007 and also operates out of Teulon Elementary School.

"We began so small, and to see how much we've grown just takes the words right out of my mouth," added Malcolm. "It's obviously a great place to work and be. Our standards

are high and we are proud of that. We are proud of our long-term staff because it shows they are dedicated, nurturing and caring. We are proud of our multi-generation families because it shows they enjoyed their time here when they were young and want their children to have that same experience. These are just small examples of what makes us proud to operate in a small community."

Kolster, now retired, said she never expected the daycare to grow into what it has become when she started offering programs in 1975. The inspiration came from a group of parents who saw a need for a nursery school and daycare to help socialize their children.

"It's amazing how we came from something so small and have come to be a fantastic day care," she said. "We've seen many children grow up with us and be a part of our making."

In her first year of operation, one memorable story stands out — a "toilet paper forest." For the first two months, everyone had to use an outhouse. One time, Kolster sent a child there alone, and they proceeded to decorate the surrounding bushes with five rolls of toilet paper. Kolster quickly made bathroom use a group

activity but still laughs about the moment to this day.

Over five decades, Teulon Day Care has had only two directors — Kolster and Malcolm — a testament to the centre's stability and community con-

"They say it takes a village to raise a child, and the community support we've received has been absolutely vital," Malcolm said. "Often it is the community stepping up to help make our dreams come true with their generous donations."

Kolster echoed Malcolm's gratitude, noting it's the people who make the job rewarding.

"It's the children and their families who kept me motivated," she said. "The fact that there are no two days that are the same — you get to learn, play, grow and evolve with the community and see that the services you provide are needed."

The centre has faced its share of challenges, particularly in balancing its budget. Malcolm said they strive to pay staff a livable wage while maintaining enough funds to continually buy supplies for the centre. Thankfully, during the pandemic it became clear how essential child care was, and funding was increased annually after a freeze from 2016 to 2023.

"When the world changed, it became clearer than ever," said Mal-

colm. "Essential workers couldn't do their jobs, so daycare centres started getting the recognition they deserved - it was a positive ripple effect that brought more investment and more accessible funding."

Looking forward, Malcolm said she hopes the centre will always be there for local families and continue to receive strong community support, noting there will always be a need for child care.

The evening closed with the cutting of a beautifully decorated anniversary cake, made by Blue Skies Bakery,

which added to the festive atmosphere as attendees reminisced and looked ahead to the next chapter.

Attendees expressed their gratitude to everyone who has helped the centre thrive since its beginnings in 1974 — from founders and early educators to today's teachers continuing the legacy of care.


"Thank you to everyone who has been a part of our family — including our volunteer board of directors we couldn't have done this without you," said Malcolm.

Lakeside MLA calls for urgent repairs to crumbling rural roads

The deteriorating condition of provincial roads in the Lakeside constituency is raising serious concerns about safety, accessibility and economic impact, says Lakeside MLA Trevor King.

King told the legislature earlier this month that residents have been "raising the alarm" for months about the state of several key routes, including provincial roads 323 and 220. Both are vital transportation links for farmers, businesses and families in the region, he said, yet have become almost impassable after rainfall.

"PRs 323 and 220 are key routes for hauling grain, delivering supplies and getting kids to school. Yet they remain in such poor shape that even basic travel is becoming dangerous," said King.

King said the roads are plagued by deep ruts, soft shoulders, standing water and washouts that appear faster than they can be repaired. The conditions affect not only local commerce but also emergency services, school transportation and workers commuting to nearby Hutterite colonies.

"The roads are the veins of rural Manitoba and vital connectors between communities, farms and businesses," King said. "Yet, despite how important they are, these roads are falling apart while this government looks the other way."

In his Oct. 8 grievance, King listed "most" of the provincial roads in his riding that require attention, including PRs 321, 424, 334, 332, 322, 518, 427, 227 and 241. He emphasized that the problem is not with the provincial maintenance crews but with leadership at the ministerial level.

"It is with the priorities and leadership at the ministerial level," he said. "All of these roads lack material to maintain them properly, to withstand any amount of rain or spring thaw."

King tabled photos in the legislature showing extensive rutting and pooling water after a recent rainfall, and questioned Transportation and Infrastructure Minister Lisa Naylor about why "critical provincial roads" have been allowed to deteriorate throughout Lakeside and the rest of Manitoba.

Naylor responded that the poor conditions stem from years of neglect under the previous Progressive Conservative government.

"If members opposite think that these roads have fallen into disrepair over one year or two years, they are

sorely mistaken," she said during question period. "This is the result of years of neglect by members opposite."

Naylor added that the government is "fully focused" on infrastructure renewal and pointed to new rural investments announced earlier this summer. Well-maintained roads are essential to Manitoba's rural economy, King said, enabling the movement of agricultural products, goods and services that sustain small towns and local industries.

"Without reliable infrastructure," he added, "rural Manitoba simply can't move forward."

Mollard said she was inspired to create the fund by her parents' love of their community and by the power of endowment giving.

"Working with non-profits, I have seen firsthand the positive impact of endowment funds in communities," she said. "I wanted to honour my parents and recognize the love they had for Stonewall and Stony Mountain. To honour their memory, the Katherine and Ron Mollard Fund will be there in perpetuity to help offer stability of funding for organizations with their projects."

The newly established community fund will provide ongoing support for activities and initiatives specific to the Stonewall and Stony Mountain areas, continuing the Mollards' legacy of service and connection.

When asked what stands out most about her parents' legacy, Mollard said their community spirit was unmatched.

"It would be difficult to think of what they weren't involved in," she said. "Both Mom and Dad were active in the community, and I remember the biggest thing that they did was give of their time. I no longer live in Stonewall, but I am, and always will be, a Stonewall girl — and this is my way of giving back to two pretty amazing towns."

She added that her parents would be proud to see their names supporting local causes for years to come.

"Mom and Dad would be pleased that the fund will help to continue to make Stonewall and Stony Mountain great places to live and raise a family," she said. Tracy Holod, executive director of the Interlake Community Foundation, said the fund will have a lasting impact on the area.

The ICF permanently invests the donations, and we make grants from the income earned on the funds. To pay for our operations, we charge a small fee to each fund, which again comes from the income earned, not the principal."

Holod said the foundation works closely with families like the Mollards to ensure their legacy continues to benefit the community in meaningful

"We are here to help," she said. "I love talking with people, businesses and organizations to help meet their philanthropic goals. Once all the details are decided, we draft a fund agreement with the particulars of the fund. With permission, we also create a page on our website to share photos and stories about the people being

On a personal note, Holod said this fund holds special meaning for her.

"Mrs. Mollard was my principal all through elementary school," she said. "I remember her passion for music

and horses. She was strict but fair. I remembered Merilee as a child, and it has been so great to reconnect with her and meet her husband, Charlie."

Interlake Eastern Health Foundation celebrates record year of community impact

The Interlake Eastern Health Foundation (IEHF) is celebrating a record year of community investment after directing more than \$524,000 toward local health-care facilities and programs in 2024-25 — a 52-per-cent increase over the previous year's \$344,000.

The milestone was announced at the foundation's annual general meeting on Oct. 1, where leaders highlighted growing donor support, new fundraising initiatives and expanding partnerships across the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority (IERHA).

"These investments are only possible because of our donors," said Terri Otto, chair of the board of directors. "Every dollar helps ensure care is available close to home when it's needed most."

Funding supported specialized medical equipment, facility upgrades, staff training and community wellness initiatives such as Camp Stepping Stones, a grief camp for children.



In total, 151 initiatives received funding for equipment, training and renovations benefiting patients, staff and communities across acute care, rehabilitation, long-term care and community wellness.

New initiatives such as the KinKar Raffle, One Great Lottery and a new 50/50 Payday Payout helped fuel the record growth. KinKar and One Great Lottery raised \$4,230.08 (net), while the Payday Payout, launched in 2025-26, is expected to net about \$40,000 this fiscal year.



The foundation's \$5 Club, a staff-led giving program, raised \$25,000 and distributed the funds evenly among 13 community programs, each receiving \$1,923: Teulon Elementary School Breakfast Program; Lac du Bonnet and Area Food Bank - Satellite Food Bank (Pine Falls); Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen; Big Hearts Christmas Hamper Program; Interlake Sexual Exploitation Educators; Wings of Power; Community Bridges (Gimli); IERHA basic equipment; Hero's Youth Mentorship Program; Growing Years Family Resource Centre; Camp Stepping Stones; Lord Selkirk RFM Pipe Band; and Selkirk Friendship Centre Daycare.

For the first time, IEHF also distributed grants from its endowment funds, marking a major step toward sustainable, long-term support for regional health care.

At March 31, 2025, the endowed principal totalled \$518,358, with a 4–4.5 per cent disbursement rate based on board policy.

The Manitoba Theatre for Young People (MTYP) has launched weekly drama classes in Teulon, offering local children a fun and creative outlet to explore acting, movement and imagination.

The classes run Wednesday evenings at Teulon Collegiate, with sessions for ages 5 to 8 from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m. and for ages 10 to 13 from 5:40 to 6:40 p.m. The program continues until Dec. 14, and registration remains open.

Drama Outreach Coordinator Cora Matheson said the Teulon program came to life thanks to a partnership with the Green Acres Art Centre. which reached out to MTYP in hopes of bringing theatre to local youth.

"For these current classes, the Green Acres Art Centre is organizing all the registrations and funding the classes," Matheson said. "They've been wonderful partners in helping us make this happen."

Students in the weekly sessions can expect to get up on their feet, use their bodies, voices, and imaginations, and explore all kinds of creative exercises.

"We do movement activities where students learn to embody different characters — or even animals or ob-

jects — and we help them find confidence in their speaking voices," Matheson said. "There are plenty of chances to be silly, to tell stories and to create scenes together."

Beyond creativity, theatre helps young people build confidence, communication skills and self-awareness.

"Theatre is incredibly connected to confidence and communication." Matheson said. "Our facilitators create a safe, supportive space where every idea is celebrated and applause is given for every act of courage. She added that bringing arts programming to smaller communities is essential.

"Youth should have the same opportunities as those in larger centres, especially for programs that build confidence and let their

unique selves shine," Matheson said. "High-calibre arts education should be available to all — it helps build a healthier world in mind, body and soul."

Rosser residents reminded about wildlife safety precautions

Rosser residents are reminded to take precautions after coyote sightings in the community.

To help keep people and pets safe, Rosser residents are warned not to feed wildlife.

"Feeding coyotes or leaving food sources (like garbage, compost or pet food) outdoors can attract and habituate them to humans," states a notice on the RM of Rosser's website.

Other tips from Manitoba Natural Resources include keeping pets on a leash, supervising them outside and making noise when walking to alert wildlife. Garbage, compost and fallen fruit should be secured.

If approached by a coyote, residents are warned not to run. Instead, they should make themselves appear large and loud.

CAO Larry Wandowich said coyotes are not currently a bigger problem in the municipality, adding that they behave the same way every year.

"The reason we decided to send out some messaging is that there were a few recent sighting reported in more populated areas," he said. "We feel it's important to keep our residents informed and encourage or remind them to take general safety precautions around this type of wildlife."

Report aggressive or unusual coyote behaviour to 24-7 to the Manitoba Conservation tip line at 1-800-782-0076. The Conservation Officer Service's district office as at 14 Fultz Blvd. in Winnipeg and can be reached at 204-945-7273.

IN OTHER COUNCIL NEWS:

- Rosser council conditionally approved an application by Lilyfield Quarry to expand the current limestone aggregate quarry. Operations will begin in 2025, with the first full year of operation in 2026. The quarry is expected to be complete in 2035, but two five-year extensions could be allowed. No quarrying, blasting or aggregate transportation can begin until the long list of conditions is met and approved. These conditions help formulate the final development agreement for the expansion.
- Council gave first reading to a bylaw to regulate CentrePort lot grade and drainage. The bylaw is to provide for the protection of the surface water drainage system for the CentrePort lands within the RM of Rosser and was an update from the RM's previous Bylaw 2-17.

"The revisions made to the bylaw were more an administrative exercise to ensure the current legal and administrative standards and processes were applied in the bylaw," Wandowich said. "The study, which had been adopted in 2017, did not change and has stayed in force."

- The reeve is appointed as the presiding officer of the board of revision and the CAO will be the appointed secretary. Councillors and Bob Brown are appointed as members.
- Four staff members are authorized to attend the Safe Work Leadership Conference at the Victoria Inn in Winnipeg on Nov. 5.
 - Council is requesting an in-

crease to Manitoba Water Services Board's annual capital budget starting in 2026 to \$100 million from the current \$24 million.

"The Manitoba Water Services Board (MWSB) has been constantly oversubscribed with project requests from municipalities throughout Manitoba. An effort, led by municipalities involved in the Cartier Regional Water Cooperative, has been started to reach a target of at least 100 munici-

palities to sign on (by gaining adopted council resolutions) to lobby and influence the provincial government's budget discussions and inform the appropriate departments and ministers of the collective need of Manitoba municipalities," Wandowich said.

"Our council passed the resolution to express our support, alongside other municipalities, for an increase. The goal is to ensure that MWSB can

continue to provide the financial, professional and subject matter expertise required to support all aspects of water and wastewater projects and initiatives. This support is essential for the long-term sustainability and development of infrastructure in our municipalities."

• Council gave third reading to a bylaw to regulate the proceedings and conduct of council and committees. This bylaw was recently updated to reflect changes to the meeting times. Committee of the whole meetings will now take place on the first Tuesday of each month from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. The evening council meeting will follow on the Wednesday after the committee of the whole meeting from 4:30 to 8:30 p.m. Additionally, the daytime council meeting is now scheduled for the third Tuesday of each month from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

• Council approved acquiring an easement from the South Mollard project to construct a drain to prevent and control flooding in the municipality.

"The easement related to the South Mollard project is part of a broader drainage initiative aimed at controlling flooding and managing stormwater in the area," Wandowich said.

"The proposed drainage ditch is designed to provide relief to the BrookPort subdivision

during major storm events, while also contributing to overall detention storage capacity for the RM. To move the project forward, the RM has been working with property owners to secure the necessary land."

• Council nominated Coun. Angela Emms to stand for election with the Interlake Tourism Association's board of directors.

Gathering Thunder: Interlake to play Moosomin for RMFL championship berth

The time is nigh for the Varsity Interlake Thunder.

On Sunday, the Thunder will head into the Rural Manitoba Football League (RMFL) playoff semifinals as the No. 1 seed, taking on the fourthranked Moosomin Generals.

The season has been everything they'd hoped for and more: an undefeated regular season, a revenge win over the defending champion St. Vital Mustangs, steady growth from the entire roster, and home-field advantage secured throughout the playoffs.

Now, they're just two wins away from an RMFL championship — something they've come close to, but never fully achieved in recent years.

"We've got two left and then hopefully we're holding that trophy up, and I can breathe a big sigh of relief," said head coach Christof Hasselfield. "Looking forward to giving all those guys the hug and thanking them for everything they put into the program — all the off-season stuff they put in, everything they've done for me and the coaching staff and for the Thunder

"That's always been the goal and we're getting closer to achieving it, but there's lots of work to do still. It would mean everything to get those guys a championship in their Grade 12 year for all the work they've put in for me, no question."

In his third season as head coach, Hasselfield admits he's grown alongside the program and its players.

The Thunder's best regular season together has come as no surprise to him, given their talent and tight team bond.

The challenge of playoff success still remains, however, with three other quality teams also in contention.

Despite finishing fourth, Moosomin boasts the second-best defence in the RMFL Just a few weeks ago, the Generals stood with the Thunder as the league's only other undefeated club. The Thunder kept rolling while Moosomin suffered a few losses, partly due to injury trouble.

The two sides were slated to meet in Week 7 of the regular season in Moosomin, but injuries forced the Generals to forfeit ahead of the match—leaving both teams with an element of unfamiliarity heading into Sunday.

On the other side of the bracket, the St. Vital Mustangs and Dauphin Clippers are also vying for a spot in the finals.

The Mustangs, who defeated the Thunder in last year's Urban Division title game, once again lead the league in points scored this season. The Thunder, however, hold bragging rights after beating them in Week 1.

Interlake also downed Dauphin in dominant fashion in their lone regular-season meeting in Week 4.

On Sunday, quarterback Jessie Batenchuk is expected to lead the Thunder offence. One of the league's top passers, he'll have plenty of passing and handoff options available. The Thunder have also prepared to adapt their game plan based on whatever weather conditions arise.

Defensively, the Thunder allowed the fewest points in the RMFL during the regular season.

"We know that we are the top team and people are gunning for us and they're going to bring their all," said Hasselfield. "But for so many of these guys who've spent three years coming up as the underdog, we've got a mentality of 'bring it.'

"We've been preaching to them the whole time — it's not about the other teams. We're playing against ourselves all the time. That's why we finished a couple games with blowouts and I probably didn't have the nicest post-game talk because we were sloppy in a couple areas, but that's what

being a championship team is.

"We've told these guys the whole time that really we're playing against perfection. Regardless of who shows up, what colour they're wearing or where the game's played, you've got to do your job. We've got to take care of business."

Kickoff against Moosomin is slated for 1 p.m. Sunday at Stonewall Collegiate Field.

Camps, growth follow leadership change for AA Maroons

The Interlake Maroons AA Softball Program is entering a new chapter as longtime leader Jeff Kisiloski steps aside and a new board prepares to guide the club's next phase.

Momentum remains strong heading into 2025, with new off-season skill camps, expanded coaching support and greater outreach to players and families across the Interlake.

"We've got a strong base to build on, and the next step is continuing that player development piece while reaching more Interlake communities," said new director Amanda Donovan. "We want to make the program visible, inclusive and focused on growth from the youngest age groups up."

Kisiloski, who served as AA director for the past two years after coaching at the U15 level, leaves the program on firm footing.

"When I started, there was only a U13 team. Two years later, we've had teams at U11, U13, U15 and U17 and built a real organizational culture," he said. "We rolled out off-season development camps, secured tremendous community support through sponsorships, and created a strong base of coaches and team managers. It's the right time to hand things over to new leadership that can keep advancing the program."

Kisiloski also helped connect the Maroons with local AAA clubs, enabling nearly 20 AA players to move on to higher-level competition. The program's Strike Out Cancer winter fundraiser generated more than \$2,500 for CancerCare Manitoba, and players organized community food drives and youth clinics across the re-

"Seeing players smile, develop new skills and friendships, and move up to the next level — that's what makes

all the work worthwhile," said Kisiloski. "The AA Maroons have built something truly special."

Now stepping into the director's chair, Donovan says her focus is on player development, team culture, and program visibility. The new board aims to keep growing participation while preserving the community feel that sets the Maroons apart.

This fall, the program will launch a pitcher-catcher development camp in early November, followed by a comprehensive player development camp beginning in January 2026. Both sessions will be open to all age groups, welcoming A-level athletes as well as returning AA players.

"The camps are about giving every girl a chance to build skills and confidence," said Donovan. "AA is a bridge between community and high-performance softball, and by supporting players at every level, we strengthen the whole Interlake system — from A

Coaching development is also frontof-mind. The Maroons plan to involve coaches early, using the off-season to build relationships with players before tryouts. The board will also promote National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP) training and Softball Manitoba clinics, while bringing in current and former AAA players as guest clinicians.

"We want our coaches to feel supported and confident," said Donovan. "That means giving them access to education and mentorship opportunities right from the start."

While most off-season programming will remain based at Fines Fields in Stonewall's Quarry Park, Donovan said the Maroons hope to reach further north and east in coming years.

"We're seeing growing interest from families in West St. Paul and

the Northern Interlake," she said. "If there's enough demand, we'll look at hosting pop-up clinics or regional practices. The goal is to keep the program accessible — no matter where a player lives."

That focus on accessibility also extends to cost management. After tryouts, once teams are formed, the Maroons pursue sponsorships to help offset travel and equipment expenses.

"Sponsorships are key," Donovan said. "They allow us to keep registration affordable and ensure that financial barriers don't prevent anyone from playing. The community has always been incredibly generous."

The 2025-26 Maroons board includes six directors representing a wide mix of experience, both on and off the diamond:

Amanda Donovan, director -Longtime team manager and parent with experience leading youth softball programs; passionate about player pathways and positive culture.

Chris Arbez, director of facilities/ **equipment** — Veteran A-level coach in Stonewall; committed to growing the game region-wide.

Nikki Mathews, director of player and coach development — Two-year AA head coach, U of W kinesiology graduate and advocate for inclusive, athlete-centred coaching.

Amy Coggan, treasurer — Finance professional and longtime community softball coach dedicated to sport accessibility.

Tyson McMurren, secretary — CPA bringing organizational and systems expertise.

Karen Hutchinson, registrar Warren-based administrator with vears of experience in minor ball and multi-sport youth programming.

"We have a small but dedicated team that loves the game," Donovan said. "Everyone brings something different to the table — and that's exactly what this program needs to keep thriving."

The Maroons plan to align closely with Softball Manitoba's AA pathway, ensuring clear progression from community (A) teams through to high-performance AAA. Players must try out for AA while remaining registered with their A clubs, with gameplay restrictions lifted after the A-level provincials.

Indoor tryouts are being considered for spring 2026 to help coaches finalize rosters early and begin outdoor practices as soon as diamonds are

Donovan emphasized that the program welcomes multi-sport athletes and newcomers to softball.

"AA does require a strong commitment, but many of our players balance hockey, basketball and other sports," she said. "With supportive families and good communication, it works. What matters most is that players feel they belong here and are supported to grow."

As he steps back, Kisiloski said he's confident the Maroons are poised for another leap forward.

"Amanda and her team bring fresh ideas and real enthusiasm," he said. "They understand that this is about building not just ballplayers but leaders and teammates. I'm proud of how far we've come — and excited to see what's next."

Kisiloski added that he plans to stay connected, helping out when needed and cheering from the sidelines.

"I'll always be a Maroon," he said with a smile. "To everyone who's volunteered, coached, or sponsored over the past three years — thank you. You've helped make this program one of the strongest in the province."




