Inwood post office helps raise over \$123K for children's charity

Canada Post will be honouring Inwood's postmistress for having helped raise over \$123,000 for the corporation's children's charity and making Inwood its No. 1 fundraising post office in Canada.

Malinda Skogan and her three staff helped raise \$2,195 from community donations and \$494 from a community barbecue and garage sale for Canada Post's Community Foundation for Children. And Inwood and 100 other post offices across the southern Manitoba region sold 15,000 raffle tickets for a trailer and raised over \$120,000.

Skogan's area manager, Bernie Stahn, who oversees the southern region, received the trailer from a generous donor in Steinbach.

The total amount raised was \$123,060.24 and all the money will go to the charity.

"The reason I was able to hit No. 1 was because not only do the post offices raise money, but also our local area supervisor [Erin Lachman] raised money in the background, and this year she chose me because of all the hard work our office has been doing," said Skogan. "So all the money she raised she gave to our office so we could hit our targets. She's amazing. She's such a good supervisor, always helping and has great ideas."

Skogan said her staff members Cheryl Stark, Stacey Bender and Barb Strick really stepped up and "made everything possible" during the various fundraising activities.

"I have really great staff here. I can't really take any credit because if it wasn't for my staff, this post office would not be half as good as it is," said Skogan, who's been postmistress for four years."We really try and help this charity for the kids. In April people who want money for a kids program put in a grant application and they [may] get money."

Canada Post's Community Foundation for Children helps local organizations, registered charities and schools. In 2018, 112 children and youth organizations shared \$1.2 million in funding, according to the foundation's website. Over the past seven years, the foundation has provided money to build libraries and fund sports, breakfast programs, anti-bullying initiatives and education and life-training skills for at-risk youth.

Skogan's post office also earned the "Most Improved" post office award and will receive a plaque for the honour.

In addition to helping fundraise for her employer, Skogan volunteers and helps fundraise for good causes in Inwood and surrounding communities.

"See a need, fill a need," she said. "If you see something you can help with, vou just do it."

She's president of the Narcisse Women's Institute, chair of the Inwood Community Group, volunteers for the local Welcome Wagon and Inwood's Old Fashioned Christmas event and, for the third year in a row, is helping distribute Christmas tins to spread around a little cheer.

"A bunch of ladies bring in cookies and we package them all up in nice Christmas tins, and everyone at the manor (senior's home) gets them and anybody who needs cheering up."

She's also undertaking a clothing drive for Winnipeg's Siloam Mission, helping the Teulon District Cheer Board collect money and groceries for Christmas hampers and organizing a Season's Greeting board that people can have their names on.

"We also do the Season's Greetings board every year where we collect money for a specific cause. This year it's going to the Inwood swim program."

The Old Fashioned Christmas event has a little bit of everything, including storytelling, singing, a Christmas message, gift bags and "cookies galore."


"I don't know who this is, but somebody is a wonderful giver because every year we've hosted this we've had an anonymous donation of a Christmas hamper. It's four big boxes of stuff and we raffle it off," said Skogan. "It's a good community connecting event. It's like a revival for the community. People and neighbours that haven't seen each other for a year or two get together and it's so good to see that."

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Local dairy farm makes three variation requests

Rockwood council news in brief

A crowd of supporters and opponents gathered at the Rockwood council chambers on Dec. 12 for a public hearing about a proposed dairy operation expansion.

Lifewind Farms owners Christophe and Monika Roulin have made three variation requests for their property, which is located about two miles west of Stony Mountain on Road 74N.

For their dairy operation consisting of 720 animal units, they are hoping to reduce the minimum separation distance between the earthen manure storage facility and the nearest residence from 1,886 feet to 1,400 feet.

They would also like to reduce the minimum separation distance between the earthen manure storage and the nearest rural residential designated area from 7,546 feet to 4,200

For their third variance request, they are seeking permission to reduce the separation distance between the barn and nearest rural residential designated area from 5,020 feet to 4,200 feet.

They received conditional approval on Oct. 18 to expand their dairy operation from 140 animals (280 animal units) to 360 animals (720 animal units) within a confinement facility. One of the conditions is that the applicants require approval of the three variances.

The Province of Manitoba's Technical Review Committee (TRC) wrote in their report that the information contained in the site assessment submitted by the proponent generally meets provincial requirements. In addition, they determined that the proposed operation"will not create a risk to health, safety or the environment, or that any risk can be minimized through the use of appropriate practices, measures and safeguards."

Taking the TRC's assessment into account, the South Interlake Planning District does not oppose the varianc-

Council will consider all the information provided to them before they make a decision.

Kenton Byle of North Mountain Storage requested conditional use for the placement of a general advertising sign on the property owned by CCJ Farms Ltd. The 80-square-foot sign would be used to increase awareness and visibility of his business. The South Interlake Planning District indicated that they do not have any significant concerns with the proposed advertising sign.

Lana Knor requested conditional use to replace their current mobile home with a brand new mobile home. The new mobile home would be four feet wider and would also be setback 200 feet from Road 95N. Council approved the request.

Brody Leathwood requested a variation to allow for minimum side yard setback of five feet to accommodate an existing attached deck. The South Interlake Planning District indicated that they do not oppose the variation request.

Camryn Dewar adds to her vocal achievements

A local songstress hit the right note by earning another gold medal for her collection.

Camryn Dewar of Stony Mountain earned the Royal Conservatory of Music's gold medal for Level 8 voice for Manitoba — making it her sixth gold medal in total.

Each academic year, gold medals are awarded to exam candidates who achieved the highest mark for their level, discipline and region.

For her Level 8 exam, she had to prepare five pieces, all in differing languages, time periods and techniques. As well, she had to showcase her technical skills through singing scales, identifying intervals, sight singing and more.

At this level, she also had to sing a recitative as well as two preludes, which are similar to technical exercises in the form of a piece.

"In opera, there will be a spoken faster-paced part and then there will be the actual long ballad aria that everyone waits for," explained 18-year-old Dewar.

"So once you get to Grade 8, they figure that you're going to be going into opera so they try to train you on how to do that style of singing."

Since graduating, Dewar has moved into residence at the University of Manitoba where she is studying music.

"University is going very well. My marks are very, very good," she said.

"Doing my RCM exams and gold medal competi-

tions has really prepared me for that."

Dewar is already part of the opera theatre ensemble, although first-year students rarely have the opportunity to be involved in that group.

In addition, she is studying with Monica Huisman, a renowned soprano who is currently in the opera Don Giovanni. As a private instructor, Huisman meets with Dewar once per week for an hour-long lesson

"I've already noticed big differences in my singing, like improvements from myself singing this year at the gold medal ceremony versus singing last year," Dewar said.


"It's a night-and-day difference because of all the things I've learned in only one semester, which is pretty phenomenal."

Already, Dewar has made a great group of friends who are also achieving high marks at university.

"We have a huge range of different instruments and backgrounds. We have a couple trumpet players in our friend group, a couple singers, a couple pianists, a couple trombone players and a tuba player," she said.

"We're all really close and it's fun because we're all so different. We have different points of view on things, but we can also make a little band if we wanted to."

Although Dewar is busy at university, she will continue to come home on weekends to work at her family's business, Stony Mountain Ski Area, throughout the winter.

Seasons' greetings my friends.

To a young Steve Morovek the tall pines and spruce trees around the shore of Lake Eleanor were mountainous, as were the huge round rock out cropping.

Now, thinking back, he remembered his father "Big Steve" standing beside him along with other boys and their fathers when they went up there to the Winnipeg Transit lodge each year for ice fishing just before Christmas. They stood admiring the sun gleaming off the pure white snow field of the lake when they first arrived then piled into the lodge. The men made a fire in the wood stove and heaters and the boys fought over which bunk would be theirs for their stay. The wood burning in the stove warmed the lodge as the men filled the air with the smell of hamburgers, eggs and toast being cooked. Dishes rattled, and the tables that had stood silent for so long now held mounds of food. Laughter and joking mixed with the sounds of men young and old eating together seemingly brought the old lodge back to life.

Afterwards, at dusk, with the fire in the stove slowly going down and cloaked in the dim soft orange light of lanterns, the men sat talking in hushed tones as the boys lay half asleep on the floor. The men put the boys to bed then sat around the stove laughing as they recalled their Christmas experiences here when they were kids.

The boy Steve awoke at dawn and padding across the main room to the windows facing the frozen lake saw his dad not far from shore making holes in the ice with a chisel. He watched his dad raise the dark rod high then plunge it into the ice time after time making ice hole after hole. Then young Steve could hear others rising, making muffled sounds then hustling outdoors dressed only in underwear and heavy boots to find the outhouse.

Soon, the sun rose blazing through the large win-

dows drawing the excited boys eagerly to the ice. They hastily made short work of toast, bacon and eggs, threw on their clothes and ran skipping and screaming carefree across the ice to the holes. It was Steve's joy to show his boy and the others how to work the homemade pop-ups he had built. He could not contain his laughter as one of the pop-ups flag sprung up signifying a fish had been caught and the young lads dashing for it "pounding the heck out of each other" to claim the fish.

This great Christmas fishing story was shared by Steve when I met him a few weeks ago. It's easy to see by his picture holding a fair sized fish that he is just as taken with fishing today as he was so many years ago at the lodge. Thank you Steve.

Last week on the Red ice upstream of Selkirk I ran into a couple of guys tailgate fishing. I pulled up to them and slipping out of "old red" asking them if they had caught anything. They both held up a pickerel with pleased looks on their faces. The younger had a short white beard, dark eyebrows and a ready smile under a bright yellow touque while the elder had a magnificent moustache that flowed down to the sides of his chin. His eyes seemed serious which proved to be the opposite of his character. When I asked the elder Jules Du Puis of Winnipeg for a fishing story he thought for a minute then broke into a smile saying as he looked at Al Trudeau, his buddy, "yea, remember when a boat took off by itself?"

Apparently, Jules and Al along with twenty other guys went up to Grand Rapids and Cedar Lake and a little too much eating and "coffee" drinking got in the way of fishing the first day out.

The next overcast windy morning they were a little slow in getting moving. They were standing around on the shore talking, pan frying a breakfast of bacon, potatoes and coffee on their portable barbeque when Jules looking out to the water saw one of their

Don't let an auto theft Grinch spoil the holiday season

The number one cause of auto theft in Manitoba is the use of vehicle keys. Last year in Manitoba, more than 3,100 vehicles were stolen 90 per cent involving the use of keys.

With the arrival of winter weather, Manitoba Public Insurance urges all vehicle owners to avoid running vehicles unattended - whether to warm up or while dropping off holiday packages - unless equipped with a secure remote starting system.

Of all the vehicle thefts reported using vehicle keys last year, nearly 50 per cent involved keys left in the vehicle ignition or stowed somewhere else within the passenger compartment, according to Manitoba Public Insurance data. In other cases, vehicle keys were taken from homes or from purses and coats left in public places.

"Nearly all vehicles in Manitoba are now protected from theft with aftermarket or factory-installed electronic vehicle immobilizers," said Satvir Jatana, vice-president responsible for Communications, Manitoba Public Insurance. "While these devices prevent a vehicle's ignition from being defeated, they are rendered completely ineffective when auto thieves have access to vehicle keys or key fobs. This is why it is so important for vehicle owners to safeguard their vehicle keys at all times."


Vehicle thefts last year cost Manitoba ratepayers about \$17 million. Stolen vehicles are also used in the commission of other criminal offences and represent a significant public safety risk when driven erratically or at high speeds, often through residential neighbourhoods.

Holiday shoppers are also reminded to never

leave shopping bags and other valuables in plain view when a vehicle is left unattended. Doing so can result in vehicle break-ins and create unnecessary stress over the holiday season. Valuables should always be removed from unattended vehicles or securely locked in the trunk or cargo area out of plain view.

How to protect your vehicle from theft

- Never leave your vehicle running when unattended
 - Never leave your vehicle keys unattended
- Park in well-lit areas
- When parking your car, always close the windows and lock the doors
- Put valuables and packages in the trunk, where they're out of sight



Interlake-Eastern

On Nov. 13, Kyle Nutzenberger and Jim Greig from Northern Goose presented a report to council to provide a comprehensive analysis of effluent water testing by both Northern Goose Processors Ltd. and the Town of Teu-

The results differed between the two different bird species processed by Northern Goose. The Chinese species was often below the daily limits, but the Emden species often exceeded the limits. Northern Goose is collecting information for a corrective action plan.

Northern Goose is currently evaluating ways to upgrade and improve its diffused air floatation system. The company also plans to consult with its engineering company to investigate how residue build-up and increase water flow rates might contribute to high test results.

Mayor Debbie Kozyra would like them to meet with the town after they have conducted some investigation into the issue.

In other news:

- Council passed third reading of a bylaw to regulate the proceedings and conduct of council and commit-
- Council also passed third reading of a bylaw to govern the Town of Teulon and the committees thereof.

Rosser community looking for ISD financial support

Students and staff of Rosser School, the community and surrounding area and members of the Rosser Central Community Centre (RCCC) are hoping the Interlake School Division will help out financially in revitalizing the community centre.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees on Dec. 10, RCCC committe members Jessica Beachell and Andrea Schutz approached the board to request that the division cover the capital cost of the gymnasium floor and installation at a cost of approximately \$89,000 (including tax).

"Rosser School is the only school in the division without a gymnasium. Rosser has no daycare or before and after school care. Both of these are now requirements for all new schools being built today," Schutz said.

She also stated that Manitoba Physical Education curriculum outcomes are not being fully met due to the lack of space and there is a lack of equal opportunity for Rosser students in comparison to other schools in the division.

Beachell explained that Rosser School and the RCCC have a unique relationship with the proximity of the properties that share the same parking lot.

The purpose of the RCCC is to promote the general well being of the community and surrounding area.


The plan is for a multi-use facility including a gymnasium and daycare. A facility where Rosser School can provide more opportunities for students. In the division there are basketball programs for Grade 4 students that Rosser school can't participate in because they don't have a facility to learn the skills.

"We would like to enter a partnership with the ISD in order to reach this goal," Schutz said.

There will be advantages to the ISD.

Using the gymnasium at the community club will free up a room in the school that could potentially be used for a nursery school, kinder-care program, art room, music room or for increased numbers of students, potentially saving the cost of a portable classroom and would save the division bussing students to Grosse Isle once a cycle for gym class, saving time and money.

"We know the benefits of exercise and instilling healthy

exercise habits and extra-curricular activities in young children will hugely benefit the next generation of children to come, thus turning them into healthy, productive, contributing adults," Beachell said.

Phase 1 and Phase 2 is expected to be completed by September 2019, which includes the installation of Response HG Sport Court Flooring Installation.

"Your partnership is critical to making this project successful for our community and school," said Schutz.

ISD Chairperson Fran Frederickson told the delegation that school boards have been instructed not to plan for any capital expenditures.

In other ISD news

Wellness support workers Melissa Beer and Vicky Brzuskiewica appeared as a delegation to showcase the continuous improvement plan program offered at the Grades 9-12 level. They presented the direction of the well being of students and teachers in the classroom.

They reported that last year with the increase in mental health concerns, feedback suggests that students are highly influenced by social media which plays a huge impact





on their well-being.

They notice that students often blame adults on their situations and often struggle with problem solving skills and end up getting stuck in how they respond in situations and how they work through different areas in their life.

Trustees partciated in a group excercise where they tossed tossed a ball of yarn sharing a stress they felt that day and then as they rolled the yarn back up, they discussed a possible solution. The exercise was to show that through sharing and connection it is the key to actually moving through stress.

Historically research has focused on the physical growth and the hormanal changes of adolencence brain development where now it is focussing on more on the emotional growth of the brain.

Ninty-five per cent of the brain development takes place before the age of 5 or 6. A second wave of development takes place around age 11 or 12 right up to the age of 25.

All high schools in the division have a wellness goal as part of their plan.

Safety Services

The ISD has contracted 40 hours of safety services per month with Robyn Lowe of Wakefield Consulting Ltd. Lowe formerly from Stonewall has experience as a Safety Advisor in two neighbouring school divisions and will be doing school visits in January to become familiar with ISD sites.

Last year there was a half-time safety officer and at budget time it was decided to change that position from staffed to contracted service.

Upcoming Budget Process

Department heads have been asked to examine their current budgets and be prepared to discuss with Senior Administration in January.

School Administrators have been asked to meet with Senior Administration in December should they have any budget requests which they wish to bring forward. Superintendent, Margaret Ward has recommended that they remain status quo, look at current budgets and see where there is possible areas for efficiency and where there might be areas for re-allocations and think of where priorities are.

Staffing

It was moved by the Board of Trustees to delegate the powers and duties of the division for Margaret Ward to hire non-adminitrative staff for the 2019 calendar year.

Love is Breakable, Learn to Handle with Care

Is it possible to rebuild a marriage after trust has been broken? The answer is: sometimes. If the injured party believes the other can be trusted in the future, there is a chance. If the betrayal and the ensuing crisis provide a wake-up call to the one who erred, with an accompanying reassessment of values, rebuilding might be possible.

It is, however, strenuous, difficult and delicate work. There needs to be a full examination of what was happening in the marriage that could have even allowed for the possibility of lying or infidelity.

What was the level of communication between the couple? Were there unresolved issues that undermined the relationship? Problems in the marriage are never a justification for betrayal, but can help us to understand how things evolved as they did.

There needs to be an agreement about complete honesty through the healing process. There has to be disclosure. Intimacy needs to be restored, and that cannot happen without openness and honesty.

Are the feelings of love deeper, or at least as deep, as the feelings of hurt and anger? If love is still there, hope is still there. Each partner has to picture the rest of his or her life both with and without the other. If spending the future with this person still feels good and right, then chances are, if the above criteria are met, it could happen. Often, professional help is needed, to help the couple move forward. Just because a couple stays together, does not mean the marriage has been rebuilt.

The good news is that despite the struggles, a marriage can be made strong again, perhaps even better than ever. The bad news is that once a significant other has been hurt through betrayal, he or she may never again feel the same about the partner. Love is 'breakable', and should be handled with care.


In two starts for the Lightning, Fines stopped 66 of 68 shots, earning a 1.01 goals-against average and .971 save percentage.

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


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
