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

Extra Crispy Roast Turkey

- 1 Manitoba-Raised Turkey, fresh/thawed to taste, salt and pepper 2 tbsp (30 ml) butter, softened 1 tbsp (15 ml) olive oil 1 ½ tsp (7.5 ml) ground sage
- 1 ½ tsp (7.5 ml) ground thyme 1/3 cup (80 ml) roughly chopped carrots

1/3 cup (80 ml) roughly chopped celery 1/3 cup (80 ml) roughly chopped onions Remove bag & giblets, pat turkey dry then place on a rack over a tray to air chill for 12-24 hours in the fridge. Air chilling dries the skin resulting in extra crispy skin. Rub butter on & under skin of chilled turkey. Season with oil & spices. Add veggies to cavity. Roast turkey at 350°F (175°C) until a meat thermometer reads 170°F (77°C) in the thigh away from any bones. Let turkey rest for 20 minutes then carve. Discard veggies.

Frosty fundraiser features wooden snowmen

An altruistic couple is receiving a warm welcome to their frosty fundraiser featuring snowmen decorations.

Blaine Wall and Val Ruth have been creating crafty wooden snowmen as yard decorations for the past three years. They sell them for a minimum donation of \$30 apiece and then turn over the funds to a variety of non-profit and charitable organizations.

But they've now reached their max-

imum production capacity and have had to put a pause on orders for this

"We've had to stop because we have so many orders to fill. We're hoping we can do it again next year," said Ruth, a Westwood resident who previously lived in Warren.

"Of course, everyone wants them for Christmas, but we're pretty much out of lumber so we can't do any more until next year. It's a bit heartbreaking for us to turn people away, but they

all seem very understanding about it."

The wood for their project comes from packing crates, which they've discovered work better than pallets.

"Blaine cleans them up and takes them apart. Then he cuts them and rebuilds them into a snowman. The boards get painted black and white. Then I get them and paint faces and put scarves on them," said Ruth, who continued to paint while speaking about their fundraiser.

"Some of them are pretty big — we've even had some up to six feet."

It's always exciting when they spot their snowmen adorning local lawns, especially when it takes them by surprise, she added.

"All of our neighbours have them, and it's surprising to see how far they go," Ruth said. "The other day, we spotted one of our snowmen in a yard while we were driving home. It's fun to see them when we don't expect it."

Last year, they raised an impressive \$7,600 through their artistic efforts, which they donated to numerous organizations including North End Women's Resource Centre, Agape Table, Siloam Mission, the Children's Hospital Foundation of Manitoba, Willow Place, 1JustCity, Christmas Cheer Board, Ikwe-Widdjiitiwi and Ronald McDonald House Charities Manitoba Chapter.

This year, they're poised to surpass that amount since they've already sold more than 400 snowmen so far this season.

"Our project serves a double purpose," Rush said.

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Manitoba Government issues 2022 fall conditions report

Manitoba Transportation and Infrastructure's Hydrologic Forecast Centre has released the 2022 Manitoba Basins Fall Conditions Report, which indicates soil moisture levels at the time of freeze-up are near normal or below normal in most Manitoba basins, Transportation and Infrastructure Minister Doyle Piwniuk announced Monday.

"Hydrologic conditions at the time of freeze-up combined with weather this winter and upcoming spring will be the main factors that affect the extent of low- or high-water events," said Piwniuk. "At this time conditions in most areas appear somewhat favourable. The long-term spring flood risk will be dependent on fu-

ture weather conditions including the amount of precipitation received over winter and into spring, as well as the rate of snowmelt."

Most Manitoba basins received record to near record precipitation this past winter and spring creating significant flooding. Hydrologic conditions improved over summer and fall with normal to below-normal precipitation. In October and November, southern, western and eastern Manitoba basins received below-normal precipitation, while central and northern Manitoba basins received normal to well-above-normal precipitation.

Due to precipitation levels in summer and fall, soil moisture at the time of freeze-up is near normal to below normal for most Manitoba basins,

with some areas in central Manitoba and the Interlake region having above-normal soil moisture.

Factors that affect the extent of spring run-off include water levels on rivers and lakes prior to freeze-up that indicate how much capacity exists to receive spring run-off. Lake Manitoba and Lake Winnipeg are within operating ranges. Lake Winnipegosis, Lake St. Martin are near normal to slightly above normal. Dauphin Lake is well above normal for this time of year. Inflow into Lake of the Prairies (Shellmouth Reservoir) is tracking near-normal conditions.

Winter and spring precipitation also affects spring run-off potential. Environment and Climate Change Canada's long-term precipitation forecast for this winter and spring has predicted above-normal precipitation for northern Manitoba and near-normal precipitation for southern Manitoba.

The Hydrologic Forecast Centre continues to work collaboratively with Environment and Climate Change Canada, the National Weather Service and flood forecasters in neighbouring jurisdictions to monitor watershed conditions and winter precipitation patterns. Manitoba's Emergency Measures Organization continues proactive preparations for emergency response efforts should the spring run-off result in flooding.

The minister noted that further basin condition updates, as well as spring flood outlooks, will be released as necessary.

Influenza deaths on the rise; **COVID** bivalent vaccine for kids

Hospitalizations and deaths from influenza have sharply increased in Manitoba while COVID continues unabated.

Twenty-two people died from influenza and four died from COVID, according to the provincial government's weekly respiratory surveillance report for the period Dec. 4-10 (reporting Week 49).

There were eight COVID deaths reported the previous week.

There were 59 new hospital admissions for COVID with 15 intensive care unit admissions in Week 49. The previous week's report showed 76 admissions with seven people needing ICU intervention.

There were also 154 new COVID infections diagnosed by restricted PCR testing, down by 97 cases from the 251 infections reported the previous week. Provincial data are an undercount of the true number of COVID infections circulating in communities because PCR testing is restricted and rapid antigen tests aren't tracked.

Wastewater surveillance data to Dec. 8 shows "sustained activity" of COVID in Winnipeg and Brandon.

The government noted another delay in reporting laboratory results for influenza in Week 49. This is the second reporting week a delay has occurred. In spite of the delay, the test positivity rate for influenza increased to 27.2 per cent, higher than the positivity rate of 21.5 per cent observed nationally.

WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION COVID-19 WEEKLY EPIDEMIOLOGICAL UPDATE COVID infections in North America, Russia, parts of South America, Africa and the middle east - including Oatar which hosted the World Cup - are on the uptick again. In the Region of the Americas, the countries with the highest number of deaths were Canada with 242 deaths, the U.S. with 2,934 and Brazil with 603.

ry results within the provincial Public Health Information Management System (PHIMS)," states the report. "As a result, the influenza case counts for week 49 are lower than expected. We anticipate an update to these data in next week's report," states the report.

The government reported 231 cases of influenza A and zero cases of influenza B in Week 49. There were 331 hospitalizations, with six people needing intervention in the ICU, and 22 deaths. A total of 1,701 influenza cases have been reported so far this season.

There were also 82 respiratory syncytial virus cases reported.

The number of emergency department respiratory visits in young children, especially those under five years of age, and the number of hospital admissions continued to increase from early November, states the report.

Other health news:

The Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority declared a COVID outbreak on Dec. 13 at the Rosewood Lodge Personal Care Home in Stone-

"We've suspended visiting on Appleyard Bay but general visitation continues on Shura Lane," said an IERHA spokesperson. "We are monitoring for symptoms in all residents and testing. The test we use detects different respiratory viruses including COVID-19.

The COVID outbreak declared on Nov. 4 at the Selkirk Betel Personal Care Home continues as does the COVID outbreak declared on Dec. 7 at the Pinawa hospital, according the IERHA's website.

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

Enhanced 511 service to help drivers with highway info

New features, functionalities enhance travel safety

The Manitoba government has relaunched the Manitoba 511 highway and traffic information service following enhancements to the Manitoba 511 website, mobile app and 511 phone system, Transportation and Infrastructure Minister Doyle Piwniuk announced on Dec. 15.

"Manitoba's 511 is a valuable resource for transportation information and we encourage all Manitobans to check 511 when planning trips", said Piwniuk. "The new enhancements to the service will provide more information and help drivers move around the province safely."

Enhancements include faster and more interactive map features, new customized notifications and handsfree audio alerts, as well as:

up to three route options with corresponding travel times and hands-free audio alerts for selected routes when a destination is entered in the mobile app; notifications for traffic incidents and road closures with registered accounts; and interactive voice response

on the 511 phone system to allow hands-free access to road conditions and traffic alerts on preferred routes.

Manitoba 511 is a free traveller information service operated by the Manitoba government. The service is available by phone, computer and mobile device. In 2021, there were approximately six million visits to the Manitoba 511 site and telephone line.

Manitoba 511 can be accessed on a computer or mobile device by visiting the Manitoba 511 website at: www. manitoba511.ca or by downloading the app to a mobile device. It can also be accessed toll-free (within Manitoba) by calling 511.

Current users of the Manitoba 511 app will receive an automatic update when it is launched today. Users who do not have the auto-update feature enabled on mobile devices will need to update the app to continue to receive current road condition and driver information

Travellers should always check the Manitoba 511 website for current road conditions to ensure safety prior to making the decision to travel. The website is updated regularly by road patrol, but conditions can change in a matter of minutes. Manitobans can also follow @ MBGovRoads on Twitter for closures or incidents.

-The World Health Organization says COVID cases worldwide increased by two per cent, with over 3.3. million new cases reported the week of Dec. 5-11. Deaths that week also increased by over 10 per cent, with over 9,700 new fatalities.

The Region of the Americas (North, Central and South America) shows a 27 per cent increase in new COVID infections over the previous reporting week, with countries such as the U.S., Brazil and Argentina reporting the highest infections. The number of new deaths also increased by 37 per cent over the previous week, with the highest deaths reported from Canada, the U.S. and Brazil.

There have been over 6.6. million deaths from COVID reported globally.

-The IERHA is reminding residents that Eriksdale's 13-bed hospital remains open for inpatient admissions but the emergency room is closed for December. Eriksdale's physicians are continuing to see patients at the Eriksdale Clinic.

-Manitoba children aged five to 11 are now eligible for a bivalent COVID booster vaccine.

"Children in this age group have previously been eligible for a booster dose with the monovalent (original) Pfizer pediatric vaccine. This is the first bivalent booster vaccine available for this age group," states Manitoba Health in a Dec. 13 COVID bulletin.

The government says COVID boosters are important because protection against the virus – whether from a previous immunization or an infection – declines over time.

Regulation enacted to support Manitoba's capital planning region

The Manitoba government has enacted a regulation that delivers on its commitment to enhance collaboration, improve pathways for investment and economic growth, and deliver lower costs to taxpayers through shared regional infrastructure and services in Manitoba's capital region, Municipal Relations Minister Eileen Clarke announced Friday.

"Manitoba's capital region accounts for almost 70 per cent of our total GDP and each municipality within it brings unique strengths that contribute to the growth of our province as a whole," said Clarke. "This regulation enables the creation of a regional planning board with members from capital region municipalities that will balance municipal perspectives with-

in a broader vision for all of Manitoba, and play a central role in optimizing economic growth while reducing duplication and delivering better services at a lower cost to taxpayers."

The new board that includes at least one director from each of the 18 member municipalities in the capital region will be a forum for regional collaboration to achieve common goals, while ensuring the unique and distinct character of each community in the region can flourish and grow together, noted Clarke, adding that board members will bring unique local perspectives to the table, while also working collectively to harness regional opportunities and long-term growth of the region."

The province will add up to four additional board members to facilitate

conversations among municipalities and add provincial perspectives and relevant expertise, the minister said.

Nominations and applications for the board of directors will begin in early January.

The new regulation builds on the positive legacy of the Winnipeg Metropolitan Region (WMR). Regional collaboration has existed in some form since 2000, when the mayors and reeves of the capital region created a non-profit corporation to unite decision-makers around a long-term vision built on the pillars of collaborative regional development, the minister noted. The province will work with the WMR to transition to the new planning region framework that is supported by legislation to deliver for the first time a regional plan set in

by-laws that are developed and informed through public engagement.

The minister noted the approach, which supports broader public benefits such as housing affordability, enhanced transportation systems and stronger economic outcomes has been adopted in other major Canadian cities and other jurisdictions.

The Manitoba government held an online consultation on the new regulation from July to September 2022, in addition to hosting 10 public engagement events and receiving formal written submissions over the last three years.

Mountain Ridge Park continues to progress in Stony Mountain

Work is underway for a new Stony Mountain residential development that is expected to be complete in the summer

Mountain Ridge Park Development is a four-phase residential development with a total of 81 single-family homes in the first three phases. Phase 4 will offer multi-family dwellings.

Services are currently being installed for Phase 1 of the development, which is located at the junction of Maple Drive and School Road in Stony Mountain. In spring 2023, Phase 2 service installation will begin. After that, Phase 3 will begin late 2023 and followed by Phase 4 in 2024.

The developer, Kenaston Development, is a Winnipeg-based company with ties to the Interlake.

"We have successfully developed several projects, which includes the Stony Mountain Industrial Park expansion project," said Melissa Gleich, director of Kenaston Development Inc.

Mountain Ridge Park Development will be on the cutting edge of plumbing, electricity, internet connections and functionality, she added.

"Residents of the development will feel safe knowing that all connections and construction are new and won't need replacing or repairing for years to come," Gleich said.

"We are appealing to families with young children. We've received calls from families who are interested in purchasing homes in Mountain Ridge Park because they have extended family living in Stony Mountain."

She also draws attention to highlights of living in Mountain Ridge Park, which include high-speed internet, walking trails, walkout lots and close proximity to Stony Mountain baseball diamonds.

"A new development brings new residents," she said, "along with new friendships, new businesses, services and other positive contributions to the town."

However, not everyone sees the project in a positive light. Stony Mountain resident Mark Gawthrop feels dismayed to see drastic changes in the community where he's lived for 23 years.

"They're building all around my property. I'm on Maple and Memorial, so there's no getting away from it for us. Nobody came and knocked on my door or called us to ask about our concerns," he said.

"The small town aspect of Stony Mountain is leaving. Someone wants to make this into Stonewall, and that's the path we're on."

Rockwood CAO Chris Luellman said he understands residents' concerns since the area was previously green space.

"I appreciate the sensitivity because it used to be an old farm site located in town. It's a change in the community, but it's always been a space for residential development," Luellman said.


"We're trying to grow the community. Really, the only way to get services into Stony Mountain, such as gas stations and stores, is to bring a population base to it."

So far, Rockwood council has approved the subdivision applications for Phase 1 and 2, he added, and the rest of the development is conceptual at this time.

"It's an urban atmosphere development, no different than Stonewall. It will fill a housing need but the rollout is slow, over a couple years at least," he said.

"Council is enthused to have another residential development within Stony Mountain. We hope to further develop the community as time goes on. Kenaston Development is a very community-minded developer and I think we will share many successes going into the future."

How to celebrate Christmas with four legged pets

Most pet parents agree: their animals are part of what makes the holiday season so magical. While it's an excellent opportunity to integrate furry family members into all the special holiday traditions and make memories together, there are a few things you should keep in mind to keep your pet safe and healthy throughout the festivities:

- Opt for pet-friendly decorations: Many favorite holiday decorations need to be kept out of pets' reach. Mistletoe, pine needles, ivy garland, holly, lilies and poinsettias can be toxic to pets when consumed. This is why I recommend artificial Christmas trees to those with particularly curious pets that like to chew on plants. If you don't choose an artificial tree, it's important to note that some water additives for real trees can be toxic, so you should make sure your pet can't access this water source. When decorating your tree, it's best to avoid tinsel and breakable ornaments to prevent potential hazards, and you should always secure your tree to prevent a climbing cat from tipping it
- Keep pets warm and dry: As the weather gets colder, pets may need a few extra layers to stay comfortable and safe while outdoors. Booties can help prevent a pup's paws from getting ice in them and offer protection from salt-treated walkways. At home, use pet-safe ice melt rather than salt, which can be irritating to pets' paws, mouths and stomachs. You can keep

them feeling warm and looking stylish on winter adventures with sweaters and jackets. A cozy handwarmer lead will help keep you warm as well while you're out and about. When you return home, always dry off their coats and paws to remove debris and ice clumps in fur and between paw pads.

- Choose and wrap gifts wisely: Make sure pets only have access to and open presents while supervised so they don't ingest any paper or tape. I recommend sticking to wrapping paper for pet gifts, as ribbons, bows and accessories can be dangerous when ingested.
- Be aware of toxic holiday foods: Common holiday foods such as chocolate, turkey skin and bones, ham, grapes and raisins, garlic, caffeine, alcohol, onions, certain spices and sweets, especially any containing xylitol, should be avoided. For festive pet-safe foods, there is a variety of sweet and savory dog treats just for the holidays. If you think your pet has accidentally ingested a toxic food or other material, contact your veterinarian immediately.
- Prioritize pet health and wellness: Involving pets in holiday traditions can mean taking them along for a road trip, introducing them to new people or staying in unfamiliar environments—all things that can cause anxiety in pets. It's important to keep your pet's mental health top of mind during the holiday season and year-

round. When possible, pets should be introduced to new people and pets in a neutral environment, individually and at their own pace. For pets that experience anxiety in the car, practicing with short drives or sitting in the car while parked, followed by treats and positive reinforcement, can help the adjustment and prepare them for

a long ride. Calming products can help mitigate anxiety in pets, and you can also consult your veterinarian for anxiety or motion sickness treatments to help make travel easier. Training in advance of any holiday plans is also a good idea.

Toy safety tips from Health Canada

Health Canada is reminding holiday shoppers to closely examine children's toys for potential safety hazards.

Toys can contain components such as button batteries or magnets that can be swallowed and cause serious injury or death. Gifts for older children and adults might also contain small pieces that can cause injury to small children.

"Look for sturdy, well-made toys that are appropriate for your child's age, size and abilities," said Health Canada product safety officer Susan Talbot in a safety message. "Many toys contain small parts that make them unsafe for younger children. Some playthings that come to mind are puzzles and building blocks that

have small pieces, or toys with battery compartments that don't close securely."

Talbot said there are a number of toy safety tips people can keep in mind such as following the safety messages and instructions that come with toys, considering toys that have battery compartments which require screws rather than slide-to-open levers, throwing out or recycling all toy packaging like plastic bags, plastic wrap, foam, staples, ties and protective film right away as a child can suffocate or choke on these items, and teaching children how to safely use their new toys.

Incredible Creatures: Pileated Woodpeckers: attractive ant-eating architects

We were treated to an incredible bird sighting in our front yard recently when the largest species of woodpecker in Canada showed up in our front yard to feed on some crabapples from our crabapple tree, then went off to feed on what it could find on the bark in another tree in our yard. This large woodpecker, that gets to nearly the size of a crow, is called the pileated woodpecker. This article explores the interesting appearance, architecture and appetite of the pileated woodpecker, and why they are of such great value ecologically.

Red Crested Ant Eaters

There are twenty-two species of woodpeckers in North America, excluding the ivory-billed woodpecker, which is largely believed to be extinct, and eight species that can be found in Manitoba. My wife and I have seen seven of the eight, and just have to track down the three-toed woodpecker. The pileated woodpecker is the largest living woodpecker in North America, and third largest in the world after the great slaty woodpecker, found in southern Asia, and the black woodpecker, found in Europe and parts of Asia. Pileated woodpeckers are about 42 cm (a foot and a half) in length, and about two

and a half times taller than the petite downy woodpeckers, that are more common visitors to peoples' yards.

Pileated woodpeckers are mostly black, with a triangular red crest and bold white stripes on head and neck. The bill is long and chisel-like, and about the length of the head. The woodpecker in the photo is a male; just the males have the red stripe behind the beak (scarlet mustache), while in the females' this mustache is black. Both males and females have the distinctive red crest, but the male's extends further toward the bill.

Pileated woodpeckers eat mostly ants and other insects, but also fruits and nuts. Carpenter ants may be up to 60% of their diet; although they will also eat other ants (rarely digging into anthills on ground), larvae of wood-boring beetles, and other insects such as flies, spruce budworm, caterpillars and grasshoppers. Compared to other woodpecker species, pileated woodpeckers prefer to forage in dying and decaying dead trees, using their bills to chisel oval or rectangular holes in search of prey. About one-quarter of the diet may be wild fruits, berries, and nuts. They may occasionally visit feeders, and are especially fond of suet.

The Value of Dead Wood

Pileated woodpeckers nest almost exclusively in standing dead trees. They are the bird's home and nursery. Pileated woodpeckers prefer deciduous and coniferous forests with larger, old growth trees that can support their spacious cavities. In spring, the hole made by the male attracts a female for mating and raising their young. The entrance hole is oblong rather than the circular shape of most woodpecker holes. Pileated woodpeckers don't line their nests with any material except for leftover wood chips. Cavity depth can range from about 25 to 60 cm (10-24 inches).

Once the brood is raised, the birds abandon the hole and do not use it the next year. Abandoned holes of pileat-

ed and other woodpeckers provide good homes in future years for many forest songbirds and a wide variety of other animals. Owls and tree-nesting ducks, such as wood ducks, may largely rely on holes made by pileated woodpeckers in which to lay their nests. Ecologically, the entire woodpecker family is important to the well being of many other bird species.

For those of you that remember the cartoon character Woody Woodpecker, cartoonist Walter Lantz is believed to have based the appearance of this character on the pileated woodpecker. They are a fascinating bird, and one to watch for this winter, as they do spend the winters here and can be found in towns and cities.

Cowan started the season with Winnipeg but was traded to Spokane. He went from an Ice team that is currently 26-4 and leading the Western Hockey League's Eastern Conference to a Chiefs' squad that is 6-22-0-2 and last in the Western Conference.

"It was a bit of a shock," he admitted. "But it's been a good experience and it will help me out in the long run. I think I can grow from it because it's pretty big moving away from home at

a young age and away from my family. It's a pretty cool experience and a big step in my career. I just love the game so much so if that means I get to play the game that I love at a high level, that's where I'll be."

Cowan is enjoying his time playing for a team located in eastern Washington and playing in front of home crowds that have exceeded 8,000.

"It's a lot of fun," he said. "It's awesome. (The city) is really nice and there's really nice people...and a really nice arena. Every game the arena is full. I'm just really lucky to be in Spokane, it's such a great organization. They treat me so well here."

Cowan has a 5-6 record this season with a 3.80 goals-against average with a .892 save percentage.

"I think I've been playing well, but obviously I feel I could be a lot better," said the 17 year old. "It's been really good so far this season and I hope to keep it going."

The Chiefs have their share of Manitobans on their roster with six while the team's head coach is Winnipeg's Ryan Smith. Smith was the head coach of the Selkirk Steelers for five



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
